Theft trail gets colder

OLYMPIA, Wash. (UPI)—The mysterious theft of the tolerance policy referendum petitions was little more than a week old today and the trail of the thieves was apparently growing colder.

Thurston County Undersheriff Don Redmond said officers were still without their first solid lead.

The petitions were taken from a safe in the Capitol late Friday, June 21, but the theft was not discovered until Monday.

Gov. Albert D. Rosellini signed a formal proclamation Friday offering a reward of \$1,000 in state money to anyone who could supply information which would lead to the arrest and conviction of the thieves.

The stolen petitions carried 82,955 signatures of persons who wanted the voters to get a chance to decide the fate of the controversial tolerance policy act, which legalized pinball machines, punchboards, pull tabs, cards and bingo games.

Secretary of State Victor Meyers certified the referendum to the ballot in spite of the loss of the petitions on the grounds that it was virtually certain the measure would have qualified.

Rosellini said he was confident the State Supreme Court would uphold Meyers' decision to place the referendum on the ballot.

But if the high court overturns the decision, the governor said, "I would give serious consideration to calling a special session of the legislature to consider the question."

Gruening asks angling action

WASHINGTON (UPI)—An Alaska senator asked Friday that individual states be allowed to prohibit foreign fishing within 12 miles of their shores.

Sen. Ernest Gruening, a Democrat, introduced a bill which would authorize the President to extend the fishing limits upon the request of the governor of a state.

The Alaskan termed the present three-mile limit "an albatross around the neck of United States fishermen" in that it did not protect U.S. fisheries resources.

Gruening pointed with approval to Canada's action in extending its three-mile limit to 12 miles to protect its fisheries.

Sen. E. L. Bartlett, D-Alaska, has urged the United States to follow Canada's lead in a general extension of the fishing limits. Bartlett also asked that the three-mile territorial limit be headland to headland rather than paralleling the coast.

Under Gruening's proposal, the President would convene a three-member fact finding board at a governor's request to study complaints of over-fishing by foreign fishermen. The President then could either prohibit foreign fishing within 12 miles of the state shoreline or establish conditions under which foreign fishermen might continue to operate off the state.

SEeks OUTSIDE SUPPORT
ALGIERS (UPI)—Premier Ahmed Ben Bella told an Algerian cabinet meeting Friday that former rebel leader Mohammed Boudaif and three other "seditionists" were seeking support from abroad. He did not give details.

A communique published after the meeting charged the four men, all of whom are under arrest, with seeking "the division and poisoning" of Algeria.

Hatfield critical of safety apathy

SALEM (UPI)—Gov. Hatfield Friday criticized public apathy and indifference to the state's mounting traffic death toll.

Hatfield, in a press release, noted that the traffic death toll is 30.3 per cent ahead of last year, and said if the present trend continues more than 600 lives may be lost in traffic accidents this year.

Hatfield announced he has written to courts hearing traffic cases urging them: to require more drivers to appear personally to answer charges of moving traffic offenses. Oregon law requires drivers to appear in court only for major traffic offenses, but courts have the authority to require any driver to appear on any charge, he said.
