

No sympathy... Wynn needs one more for 300th

There's no sentiment in baseball—none for a 43-year-old guy trying for his 300th victory and none for a floundering last-place team.

Ask Early Wynn of the Cleveland Indians, who needs just one more triumph to achieve the immortality that goes with winning 300 big league games. And, if you don't believe him, ask the Washington Senators, who can use a victory any old time just to prove they belong in the majors.

For the second time in eight days, Wynn's former White Sox teammates spoiled his try for No. 300 even though the Indians rallied in the ninth to pull out a 4-3 triumph.

The Minnesota Twins, meanwhile, cut the hapless Senators into little pieces with 11-4 and 10-3 victories that ran their winning streak to six games and moved them to within a game and a half of the American League lead. Harmon Killebrew's six hits led the Minnesota musclemans, who slammed four homers, two triples and two doubles during the doubleheader.

The Boston Red Sox defeated the New York Yankees, 4-3, the Detroit Tigers and Los Angeles Angels split 6-3 victories in a twin-night doubleheader and the Baltimore Orioles nipped the Kansas City Athletics, 2-1, in other American League games.

In the National League, the St. Louis Cardinals walloped the Houston Colts, 9-2, the Chicago Cubs beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 4-3, the Pittsburgh Pirates topped the New York Mets, 3-1, the Milwaukee Braves shaded the Los Angeles Dodgers, 1-0, and the San Francisco Giants beat the Cincinnati Reds, 7-3.

Rookie Pete Ward, who was born the same year Wynn started out in the major leagues (1939), led the assault on the old pro with two doubles. Wynn, beaten by the White Sox the week before, was tagged for five hits and three runs in six innings. Ted Abernathy, who pitched the last two innings, picked up the victory when singles by Jose Azcue, Woody Held, Tito Francona, a fielder's choice and Willie Kirkland's bunt-single produced two runs for the Indians in the ninth.

Killebrew had a homer and a double, Earl Battey a homer and a double, Jim Hall two triples in the Twins' 12-hit opening-game attack. Harmon had four more hits and John Goryl and Vic Wertz hit homers in the nightcap. Bill Pleis went the distance for his first win in the opener and Jim Kaat went 6 1/3 innings for his eighth victory in the second game.

Dick Radatz, making his eighth appearance in nine games, yielded a game-tying homer to Elston Howard but won his seventh game when the Red Sox tallied against Hal Reniff in the eighth on a walk and singles by Carl Yastrzemski and Frank Malzone. Yastrzemski and Malzone had two hits each for the Red Sox.

Leon Wagner had four hits, including his 17th and 18th homers of the season, as the Angels' Art Fowler gained his third win in the first game. Rocky Colavito's two homers, including a three-run shot, highlighted a seven-run eighth-inning rally and brought Mickey Lolich his third triumph.

First-baseman Bill White, shortstop Dick Groat and third-baseman Ken Boyer of the Cardinals were named to the NL starting team which also will include second-baseman Bill Mazeroski of the Pittsburgh Pirates, centerfielder Willie Mays and catcher Ed Bailey of the San Francisco Giants, leftfielder Tommy Davis of the Los Angeles Dodgers and rightfielder Hank Aaron of the Milwaukee Braves.

Two Americans still alive at Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, Eng. (UPI) — Frank Froehling Jr., of San Antonio, Tex., one of only two American men still alive in the Wimbledon tennis championships, met Roger Taylor of Britain today in a fourth round test.

Froehling hoped to join fourth-seeded Chuck McKinley, also of San Antonio, in the quarterfinals. McKinley banged his way into the round of eight Friday with a 6-3, 8-6, 6-3 victory over India's Jaidip Mukerjee on a day in which rain disrupted play and washed out many doubles matches.

Top-seeded Roy Emerson of Australia, shooting for the grand slam of the Australian, French, Wimbledon and American titles, plays Ramanathan Krishnan of India, Willie Bangert of Germany plays Jose Arilla of Spain, and Marty Mulligan of Australia goes against Bobby Wilson of Britain in the other remaining fourth round matches.

Fred Stolle of Australia, Christian Kuhke of Germany and second-seeded Manuel Santana of Spain gained the quarter-finals Friday along with McKinley.

In the women's singles, the Yanks have three players as far as the fourth round, including fourth-seeded Darlene Hard of Long Beach, Calif. Billie Jean Moffitt, also of Long Beach, and Donna Floyd Fales of Arlington, Va., are the others.

Mrs. Fales reached the round of 16 Friday, advancing by default over the ailing Vera Sukova of Czechoslovakia, last year's surprise runnerup. Miss Hard, ranked No. 3, made it on Thursday.

Charles Mosely of Alabama, making his first decathlon appearance, trailed Pauly by only 32 points with 4,013. He had the day's best mark with a 1:07.7 and 1,004 points in the 100 meters.

Then came Dick Emberger of the Camp Pendleton Marines with 3,900 and Russ Hodge of Oxnard Air Force Base with 3,977.

Former Oregon Athlete Dave Edstrom, now at Oxnard AFB, scored 3,937.

Phil Mulkey, Birmingham, Ala., another pre-meet favorite, was seventh at 3,814 and Paul Herman, the 1961 champion, 10th at 3,572.
