

Bend Legion suffers 'black weekend'... loses all four

It was a black, black weekend for Bend's American Legion baseball team.

North Salem came to town, and went home with four more victories under its belt. It was a total annihilation, as far as the locals were concerned.

The scores tell the story: 18-0, 10-3, 8-1, and 5-1. Except for that final game, Bend didn't look impressive in any of them. The four contests were played as two doubleheaders, one Saturday night, and another Sunday afternoon.

In that first one Saturday night, it was 0-0 until the top of the fourth inning, and obviously anybody's ball game. But the top of the fifth brought the rain of pelted horsehides that will be long remembered at the municipal ballpark.

It all started in the fourth when minute North Salem shortstop Lute Barnes stepped to the plate to lead-off the top of the fourth for the visitors. He rapped a double. He stole home minutes later for the first tally. Though barely significant at the moment, Barnes' two-base hit opened up the contest, which was to see more hit balls than fans in the stands.

Bend's debacle came in the fifth inning. Roger Dinehart started it off with a double. He scored when Lute Barnes got aboard via an error by Bend's third-sacker Larry Barnes. Rich Quackenbush, North Salem's third baseman, rapped a single to score Barnes, and the thing went on and on.

When the dust cleared, North Salem had scored 11 runs and led the contest by 12-0. Bend from that point on, was unable to do anything. When it was all over,

Pauly takes field to win decathlon flag

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI) — America's newest decathlon champion, Steve Pauly, plans to consider his athletic future after he returns from carrying his country's colors in the U.S.-Russia meet in Moscow July 20-21.

This June graduate of Oregon State University won the 1963 national AAU title and one berth on the U.S. team here Saturday by scoring 7,862 points in the two-day 10-event test.

"I don't believe I've ever seen a better effort on the basis of his own abilities, coupled with the terrible weather," Phil Mulkey, the sixth-place finisher, said of Pauly's victory.

The 6-4, 190-pounder planned to attend school this fall, but those plans may be postponed.

"I might come back here and take a few hours so I could train for 1964," Pauly said after the victory. He lettered three years each in basketball and track at this school in the heart of Oregon's.

He came within 18.2 seconds Saturday of being unofficially the seventh man in modern decathlon history to reach the 8,000-point mark, and his point total has been surpassed only by C. K. Yang, Rafer Johnson and Bob Mathias in winning this meet in the last 25 years.

He needed a 3:35.4 clocking in the 1,500 meters to break the 8,000 point mark.

"I didn't feel very good but I thought I could do it," Pauly said. "I kept up with the pace until the third lap and then I fell behind." His 4:53.6 was still his best time for the event.

In other events, he recorded 11.3 for 100 meters, 22.10 in the broad jump, 47.0 in the shot put, 6-0 in the high jump, 49.6 in the 400 meters, 14.7 in the 110 meter hurdles, 149.1 in the discus, 12-11 in the pole vault and 241-3 in the javelin.

The final 1,500-meter race also gave Dick Emberger of the Camp Pendleton, Calif., Marines second place and the other berth on the U.S. team for the Russian meet.

Emberger scored 7,331 points to 7,328 for Dave Edstrom, a former Oregon Athlete now competing for Oxnard, Calif., Air Force base.

Behind the three leaders came Russ Hodge, Oxnard AFB, 7,112; Bill Toomey, Santa Clara Valley Youth Village, 6,822; Mulkey, Birmingham, Ala., 6,395; Charles Mosley, A La Bama, 6,385; 1961 champion Phil Herman, Army, 6,192; Dave Thorsen, Santa Barbara, Calif., Athletic Club, 5,973 and Bill Smith, Dayton, Ohio, Athletic Club 5,962.

the locals sighed a sigh of relief and walked off the field, thankful that the margin wasn't over 20.

In a game which saw more dive-bombing ball bats than fans, Saturday night's nightcap also turned into a nightmare for Coach Bill Bauer's crew. Trying to settle down, Bend made more errors.

North Salem opened the scoring in the top of the first, but Bend came right back in the frame's bottom half, knotting the score 1-1. Then, two more innings passed before anything happened. Superior North Salem batting began to take over, and the visitors began

to find the range on Bend hurler Bob Warrington. North Salem picked up two more in the top of the fourth. Bend came back in its half, but scored only one. The fifth inning saw no scoring, but North Salem wrapped up the contest in the sixth frame. Warrington was hit out of the box, and Paul Wardlaw took over.

It didn't much matter, North Salem was in front 8-2. North Salem added two more in the top of the seventh. Bend added a lone tally in its half.

Things began to settle down a little bit on Sunday, but the opener

was equally disappointing for the local Legionnaires. North Salem copped it by spreading eight runs over seven innings, to win going away, 8-1. Bend picked up its run in the fifth, when left fielder Val Lewis got aboard when third-sacker Quackenbush couldn't handle a hot grounder. Mike Metke, minute but spunky Bend tosser, brought him home when he rapped a sharp single. Metke, however, died aboard the base paths as did George Woodworth at first.

All through Sunday's first contest, North Salem took advantage of every Bend goof. Stolen bases were dime a dozen. North Salem's speedy base runners were one

step ahead of the Bend infielders. Metke tossed a sound ball game until the non-support from his infield teammates began to beat him. Metke began hurling wild pitches. North Salem base runners had a field day.

Metke managed to keep the visitors from banging any extra-base hits. All were singles. Metke gave up only six in all. Winning tosser Jim McCandish went the distance and hurled a three-hitter. Metke went the route for the loss.

Sunday's second game saw Coach Bauer do a complete reshuffle of his batting order, and make some infield player changes. It gave the Bend squad some more zip, but it wasn't enough. North Salem won it, too, 5-1.

If it's any solace to Bend fans, the fourth contest was a tighter game, and it wasn't apparent that North Salem was going to win it until the last time the visitors came to bat.

Big Bill Bauer from Madras started on the mound. His power gave North Salem batters some trouble. They didn't hit him with the same swatting regularity with which they teed-off on earlier Bend pitchers.

Bauer had one difficulty, however. He walked nine batters. Derald Parsons came onto the hill to take his place in the seventh. Bauer, however, left the field with perhaps the most exciting Bend effort in two days.

Parsons, Bend's pickup from Redmond, had troubles. North Salem wasn't about to let Bend get into its half of the final frame with the score only 3-1. Two runs in the seventh put Bend down the tube.

That final game Sunday, however was the highlight of the four contests. Fans saw what will go down as one of the biggest blasts ever hit at the municipal ballpark. With one man aboard in the top of the seventh, third-sacker Rich Quackenbush teed-off and clobbered a slow pitch over the left field fence in left center field. It was one of those line-drive hits that sailed over the barrier at about the same velocity that it left Quackenbush's bat.

It was perhaps the only homerun that has been hit over the fence since city recreation department crews moved the fences back.

Other than that, Bauer and Parsons together chucked eight strikeouts and gave up only four hits. Only two went for extra bases. Walt Looney hit a double in that last inning, after Quackenbush clubbed his circuit blast.

Ron Morgan, who started on the mound for the visitors, was credited with the win. He was replaced in the fourth by Ed Albers. Roger Dinehart, however, finished the mound chores for the visitors.

Bend hopes to get back into the win column tonight when Coach Bill Bauer's Legionnaires tackle a tough Klamath Falls team. Game time at municipal ballpark is 8:30.
