**Wirtz stepping into deadlocked railroad talks**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz stepped into deadlocked railroad negotiations again today in hope of finding some avenue toward averting a nationwide strike.

Wirtz put himself back into the struggle Tuesday with the announcement that a new round of talks had gone nowhere. The strike deadline, extended twice, is July 10.

"We are now in the 17th hour of this dispute which has continued for nearly four years," he said. "No effective bargaining has taken place; as a result we are facing a nationwide railroad shutdown."

He planned to meet with J. E. Wolfe, chairman of the railroad negotiating committee, and each of the negotiators for the five operating railroad brotherhoods. Friday he planned a meeting with both sides in a joint session.

Wirtz said he was looking for "suggestions that would move the bargaining off dead center" in the crucial dispute over work rules.

"I cannot reiterate too strongly the statement of the President that what is at stake here is not only the continued operation of the nation's railroads but the future of free collective bargaining itself," Wirtz said.

The dispute has gone all the way to the Supreme Court, which ruled the railroads may eliminate unnecessary jobs.

**PERMIT SOUGHT**

PORTLAND (UPI) — A fourth major oil company, Richfield, has filed for a permit to explore offshore territories of Oregon for oil.

Richfield joins three other major companies in the exploration. Standard, Union, and Gulf, already are engaged in exploration. Action will be taken on the application July 15.

**Young man from England seeks area employment**

A graduate of Cambridge University, Cambridge, England, who felt that America has "a great influence on the world and therefore it is a good idea to visit the country" has arrived for a two month stay in Bend.

**Action taken to dissolve 'Dunes City'**

EUGENE (UPI) — A suit has been filed in Lane County Circuit Court to dissolve the newly-incorporated city of Dunes south of Florence.

The plaintiffs are four property owners who claim their property would be burdened by taxation without corresponding benefits.

They seek a declaratory judgment to make the incorporation election, held June 11, and the resulting order of the county commissioners establishing the city "null and void of no effect."

Plaintiffs are C. Von Hickman of Eugene, Aaron Hunter, Globe, Ariz., Olive May, Santa Monica, Calif., and John May, St. Petersburg, Fla. They own together about 200 acres of Washink Lake and additional land on the outlet of Silcoos Lake.

Named as defendants in the suit are the City of Dunes, the county commissioners, and the county assessor and tax collector.

Hickman said Tuesday "in our opinion there will be a federal park," and that the main reason for the establishment of the city was to stop a national seashore. He said the move is too late to do that.

**Officials praise action in fire**

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Officials today praised "a particularly amazing piece of fire fighting" which halted a brush fire in Griffith Park Tuesday that blackened 200 acres and swept to within 50 feet of the famed zoo.

The fire, first thought to be minor, was declared "a major emergency" when 10 to 15 mile an hour winds whipped the flames across fire lines. More than 1,200 persons were removed from the zoo.

More than 200 fire fighters, supported by 6 air tankers, 34 engine companies and 12 patrol companies, fought the blaze at the nation's largest municipal recreation area in the center of the city. It was declared under control in the evening, but mop-up operations continued throughout the night.

Three special trucks stood by to remove some of the 1,100 animals, reptiles and birds in the zoo but the vehicles were not needed.

Dr. Wesley A. Young, zoo director, said an adequate water supply and the metal and stone animal compounds kept the danger to a minimum, though flames came within a few feet of "cat row"—the cages of lions, bears, cougars and a tiger.

Pavik has another brother who also graduated from Bend High School and West Point and is now lieutenant base commander of Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene, Texas.

Susan Pavik was born in Staussburg, Austria. She has only lived in the United States for one year.

**Safety program urged by Moen**

Police Chief Emil Moen today urged all Bend drivers to join the summer-long Oregon Safety Shield program.

"The driving you do on the highways is the same type of driving you do in your own home town," Moen noted.

"If you use unsafe driving practices in the familiar streets near home, these practices become doubly dangerous at higher speeds and on strange highways."

The Oregon Safety Shield program is a statewide program designed to remind Oregon motorists that traffic troubles are avoidable. Motorists can shield themselves from traffic trouble by common sense, courteous driving practices and observance of traffic laws.

Moen noted that bumper patches to remind motorists of their role in the traffic safety program are available free of charge at the police department. Car owners who wish to make their feelings on traffic safety known may pick up their stickers at the police office.

Moen added that the statewide program is being conducted by the Traffic Safety Division of the Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles, and needs the support of every safety-conscious Oregon citizen.
