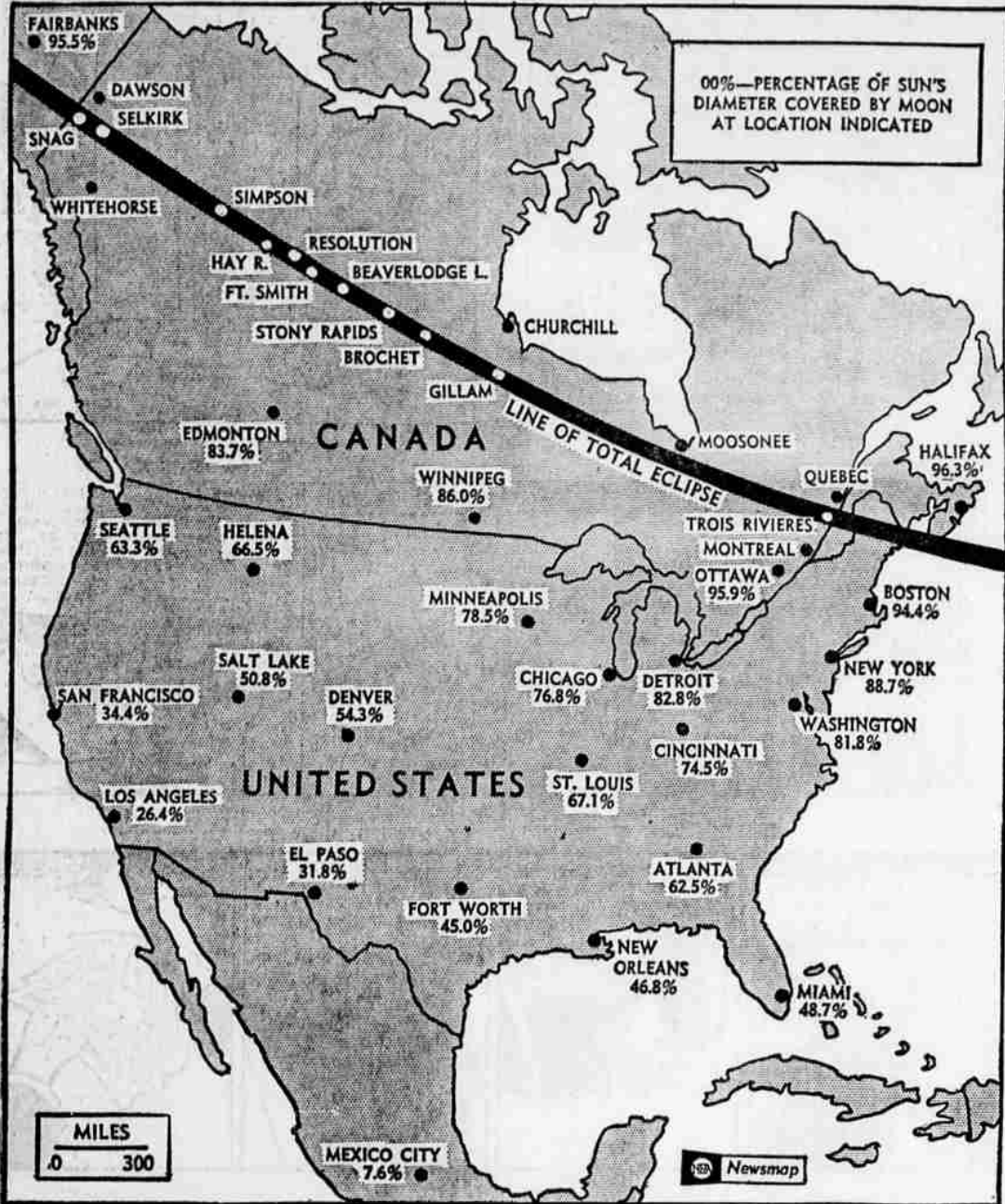


# Last View of Solar Eclipse in Many a Moon



**EYE CELESTIAL EXTRAVAGANZA CAUTIOUSLY**— Rare treat — a solar eclipse — occurs July 20 and will be visible, weather permitting, all over the North American continent, with exception of a small portion of the Pacific coast of Mexico. Next solar eclipse in North America will be in 1970. Degree to which the sun will be eclipsed depends on how close you are to the "path of totality," some 60-70 miles wide.

Percentages on Newsmap indicate amount of the sun's area apparently covered by the moon in each locality. CAUTION should be taken in viewing the eclipse. The eye can easily be burned. DO NOT use smoked glass or field glasses. Safest way: view eclipse on television. Map data as presented in the astronomical magazine "Sky and Telescope."

## Recreation areas full on holiday

Sunday, final day of the Pow Wow, will bring the last day of rock hunting. There will also be a special non-denominational church service at 10 a.m., according to Charley Robinson, Pow Wow chief.

## Solar system puts on greatest show—total eclipse—on July 20

**NEW YORK (UPI)**—On July 20 the solar system will put on its greatest show — a total solar eclipse that will be visible in varying degrees from every part of North America.

Tens of millions of Americans and scientific groups from a half dozen countries will observe the phenomenon which will come near to matching the celebrated North American eclipse of 1930.

There will not be another eclipse of the sun visible in any part of the United States until 1970. And not until 2017 will a solar eclipse be visible to so many Americans as this month.

Those living in a 60-mile-wide path stretching from Anchorage, Alaska, across Canada's Yukon, Northwest Territories, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario, and Quebec to Bar Harbor, Me., will see the dark mass of the moon completely blot out the sun.

In the blackout path, the only light left will be a sickly yellow corona around the moon, equal in intensity to a half-moon's glow. Stars will twinkle in the momentary, unnatural night, birds will cease to twitter, and the air will cool and fill with eerie rippling shadows.

**See Partial Eclipse**

Those living outside the belt of totality will see a partial eclipse, ranging from 92 per cent of total in Boston to 26 per cent in Los Angeles. But record crowds are expected to turn out from coast to coast to see the heavenly spectacle, which fortunately falls on a summer Saturday between late morning on the West Coast and late afternoon on the East Coast.

Maine and Quebec, the most densely populated area in the blackout path, are girding themselves for a tremendous influx of visitors bent on seeing the total eclipse. The Maine Department of Economic Development estimates that more than 200,000 persons from other parts of Maine and out-of-state will descend on central Maine for the two hour performance, climaxed by two minutes of darkness between 5:42 p.m., EDT and 5:44 p.m.

The American Museum-Hayden Planetarium warns eclipse watchers to protect their eyes against the harmful solar infra-red rays by looking through two thicknesses of black and white photographic film which has been exposed to the maximum density. Dark glasses or smoked glass are inadequate for peering directly at the sun and cannot prevent possible permanent damage.

**Japan to be First**

Tokyo Observatory scientists will make the initial observations of the eclipse, which will first be noticeable at sunrise in Japan, and the University of Kyoto will send a scientific team to Alaska. Also in Alaska will be delegates to the American Astronomical Society's convention near Fairbanks especially timed and located to coincide with the celestial show.

Other scientific groups taking ground observations with instrument and camera will be the Hayden Planetarium expedition in Quebec, the Harvard Observatory in Maine, Dutch and German expeditions near Great Slave Lake in the Northwest Territory, the University of Illinois in Manitoba and Ontario, and the National Research Council of Canada. Astronomers from the Dominion Observatory, Ottawa, will take observations from aircraft.

The scientists will be checking and rechecking various aspects of eclipses, including fluctuations of brightness, polarization of light in the outer corona, variances of geomagnetic and earth currents, radio characteristics of the ionosphere, and deflection of starlight by the gravitational pull of the sun. The latter, verified during previous eclipses, is a confirmation of Einstein's theory of relativity.

Eventually, scientists expect to observe eclipses from space vehicles that will be propelled beyond the earth's confining atmosphere for more perfect measurements and photographs.

## Joan Kennedy has surgery

**HYANNIS, Mass. (UPI)**—Mrs. Joan Kennedy, wife of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., had a sore throat today but otherwise was in good condition following surgery for an abscess.

She was reported "resting comfortably" at Cape Cod Hospital, through suffering from a sore throat, the after-effect of the surgery.

The 30-minute operation on her throat was performed Thursday by Dr. Frank Lathrop, chief of the eye, ear, nose and throat section of Boston's famed Lahey Clinic, assisted by Dr. Robert C. Watt of Hyannis.

It was expected that the 26-year-old mother of two, who suffered a miscarriage May 16, would be confined to the hospital for about three days.

Authorities said the surgery was for relief of a parotidular abscess. They emphasized that the ailment was not connected with the miscarriage.

Mrs. Kennedy was admitted to the hospital Tuesday from her summer home at Squaw Island, Hyannis Port. She was visited by her husband and his sister, Mrs. Eunice Shriver, before undergoing the operation.

Mrs. Kennedy's illness forced cancellation of her husband's extensive Fourth of July speaking schedule. A spokesman for the senator said Kennedy had to return to Washington next week but that he might delay his return if she were not out of the hospital by that time.

## Installation due

## Delivery taken on ambulance

**MADRAS**— Madras volunteer firemen this week received delivery of a new 1963 ambulance to replace the 1961 vehicle which has been in use here since August of that year.

Valued at about \$15,400, the new vehicle is completely equipped with oxygen, first aid supplies and radio. It has a maximum capacity of four patients through the use of hanging litters. It features a Cadillac chassis with a Superior coach body.

During the time the 1961 ambulance was in service, the department answered 619 calls transporting 663 patients. Ambulance calls logged 46,443 miles and required 2,602 man hours of volunteer work on the part of drivers and aid men.
