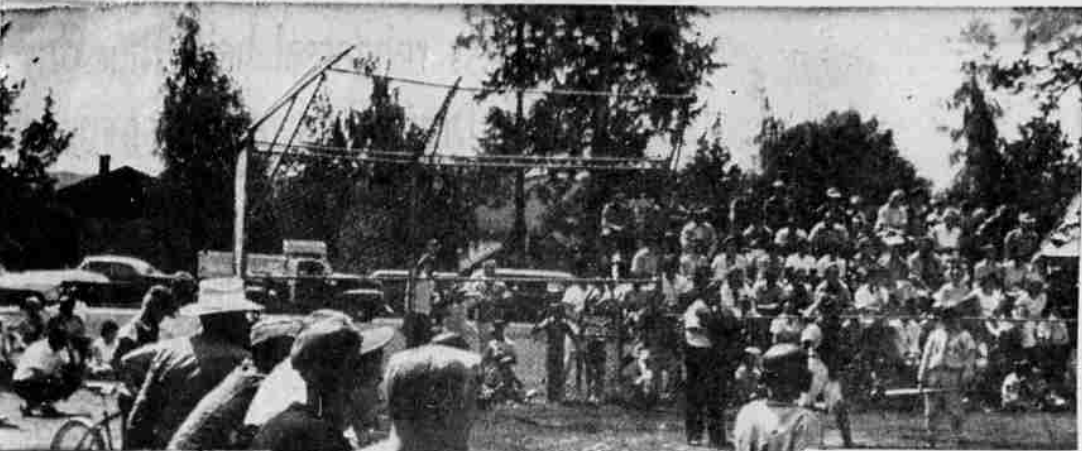




Brian Sternberg still paralyzed

SEATTLE (UPI) — Brian Sternberg, 20 holder of the pending world pole vault mark at 16 feet 8 inches, remained paralyzed from the neck down at University Hospital today.

Sternberg was conscious and coherent but spoke with some effort.

The University of Washington vaulter suffered the injury Tuesday night while working out on the trampoline to keep in shape for a trip to Europe with a U.S. track and field team.

Sternberg vaulted 16 feet 8 inches at Compton, Calif., and that mark is up for consideration as a world record. He did 16-4 in the national AAU meet in St. Louis to win his berth on the U.S. squad.

Dr. George Ojemann, resident neurosurgeon at University Hospital, said there was considerable swelling in the injured area and this must subside before a proper analysis could be made.

Ojemann said case histories of this type indicated a three-day observation period. It was hoped the extent of the paralysis could be determined today.

Cards to have four infielders on all-star nine

CINCINNATI, Ohio (UPI) — Because manager Alvin Dark ignored the players' "mandate," the National League All-Star team will present an historic "first" next Tuesday when all four starting infielders will be members of the St. Louis Cardinals.

Usually All-Star managers in picking reserves for their squad stick mighty close to the way the players themselves voted earlier in choosing the starting lineup.

Dark followed that practice in most cases, too — but in picking a second baseman he skipped over Ken Hubbs of the Cubs, who was runner-up to Bill Mazeroski of the Pirates in the voting for the starting team, and instead picked Julian Javier of the Cardinals. And that's what will make history in the midsummer classic at Cleveland.

For Mazeroski is bowing out of the game with an injured leg muscle.

And that makes Javier a starter right alongside his three Cardinal teammates who were voted into starting berths — first baseman Bill White, shortstop Dick Groat, and third baseman Ken Boyer. It will be the first time in All-Star history that the entire starting infield will be composed of members of the same team.

Dark had to make one extra selection because of Mazeroski's dropout, but instead of another second baseman he picked pitcher Larry Jackson of the Cubs.

Dark ignored the players' vote in two other spots, passing over two Cincinnati Reds who were runners-up in the balloting — left fielder Frank Robinson and center fielder Vada Pinson. His outfield choices were Roberto Clemente of the Pirates, Willie McCovey of the Giants, Duke Snider of the Mets and Stan Musial of the Cardinals.

In addition to Spain and Jackson, other pitchers picked by Dark were Juan Marichal of the Giants, Ray Culp of the Phillies, Jim O'Toole of the Reds, Hal Woodeshick of the Colts, and Don Drysdale and Sandy Koufax of the Dodgers.

In addition to Javier, other infield reserves picked by Dark were first baseman Orlando Cepeda of the Giants, shortstop Maury Wills of the Dodgers, and third baseman Ron Santo of the Cubs.

To back up elected catcher Ed Bailey of the Giants, Dark picked Johnny Edwards of the Reds, and Joe Torre of the Braves.

SETS VAULT MARK

BERN, Switzerland (UPI) — John Pemei of Northeast Louisiana set a European continent record for the pole vault Thursday when he cleared 16 feet, 5 1/4 inches in a meet here. He broke the mark of 16-4 1/2 set two days earlier by C. K. Yang of Nationalist China.

Cowboys to have their own golf tournament at Prineville

PRINEVILLE — The first annual National Cowboy Golf Championship tournament will be played at the Prineville golf and country club Aug. 8-9. It is announced this week by Jerry Cloninger, club pro. It will be held in conjunction with the annual Crooked River Round-up, a three-day event running Aug. 9-11.

Plans were made for the tournament when it became apparent in recent years that many top riders on the rodeo circuit are also golf enthusiasts. Any bonafide member of the Rodeo Cowboys' association is eligible to enter the meet, Cloninger said.

Tournament play will scored on 36 holes, of which 18 holes will be played Aug. 8, and 18 on Aug. 9. It will be stroke play competition. Merchandise prizes will be awarded on the basis of 36-hole gross

total. Entries may be made by writing Cloninger at the Prineville golf club. Those cowboys traveling without their golf clubs will be provided with the necessary clubs for the tournament.

McKinley wins the Wimbledon men's singles

WIMBLEDON, England (UPI) — Little Chuck McKinley of San Antonio, Tex., won America's first Wimbledon men's singles tennis championship in eight years today when he defeated Fred Stolle of Australia, 9-7, 6-1, 6-4.

In addition to winning the world's most coveted tennis prize, the 22-year-old McKinley also put himself in position for a \$100,000 professional offer.

McKinley, who is America's top-ranked player and was seeded fourth here, is the first Yank to win the men's crown since Tony Trabert in 1955.

Trabert, now president of the International Professional Tennis Players Association, was at Wimbledon throughout the tournament and said he would talk terms with McKinley as soon as the final was over.

The 5-foot-8, 155-pound McKinley, at times short on stamina, achieved the remarkable feat of winning his seven tournament matches without the loss of a single set.

With Billie Jean Moffitt of Long Beach, Calif., pitted against Australia's Margaret Smith in Saturday's women's final, the U. S. faces an opportunity to sweep both Wimbledon singles crowns.

9-4 victory

Cascade all-stars trample Americans

Bend Little League's biggest moment of the year yesterday—the Little League All-Star game—did not pass by the board unnoticed.

Fans turned out in droves and lined the fences of Juniper Park to watch the Cascade League all-stars whip the top clubbers of the American League, 9-4.

Kevin Rea, Wayne Holloway, Steve Bjorvick and Kam Healy were the winning tossers for the Cascade League. The annual game went seven innings, with constant substituting to get all the players in the game.

All-stars from the National League were split up, with half of them going to the American League camp, and others going to bat for the Cascade Leaguers.

Cascade all-stars set the mood for the whole game right in the first inning, when Cascade batters turned on American League tosser Tony Trumbly, and golfed in four runs.

This early 4-0 lead by the Cascade Leaguers was indicative of the game's final outcome. The American Leaguers never were really in the contest, but at the same time, were not out of it, either.

American League batters finally got to clubbing the ball in the third inning. Two runs were scored when second-sacker Mike Ward bombed the ball into left field for a double. Dennis Murphy and Larry Nickolson crossed the plate for the two tallies.

It wasn't enough of an effort, however, as the Cascade League hot-shots came right back in the top of the fourth frame to score three more. It was too much, and the American Leaguers couldn't get back. The Cascade bombers scored one more each in the sixth and seventh frames. The American

League crew came on strong in the fifth for its last effort. Two runs scored when Tom Tyler belted the ball into left field for a single. Tony Trumbly and Mike Ward crossed the plate for the tallies. They both got aboard when they took bases on balls.

Losing hurlers were Trumbly, Murphy, Ward, Bobby White, and Bob Gotchy.

Longest hit of the game came off the bat of Mike McCool, Cascade League catcher, who hit a triple in the first inning.

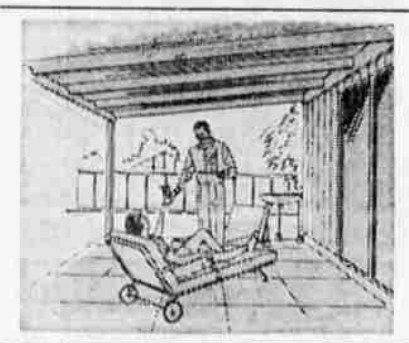
