Yanks road to flag may be downhill go with Mantle back

Who's Ralph Houk kidding? He claims there's "still a long way to go" but it figures to be "mostly downhill for the Yankees with a fat 4 1/2 game lead and Mickey Mantle due back in a week or so. Houk is getting a little coy about any pennant talk and that's usually the tipoff on any manager who is beginning to think about which pitcher he will use in the first game of the World Series.

"Right now," Houk says, "I'm more concerned about which pitcher I'll start in Tuesday's All-Star game." One pitcher who definitely will not start is Yankee southpaw Whitey Ford, who wasn't chosen to the American League All-Star team by Houk.

Ford could beef if he wanted to in view of the fact his 13-3 record makes him the top winner in the league. But he's just as happy to watch the All-Star game on television. Whitey not only struck out 12 and won his ninth in a row by beating the Chicago White Sox, 9-1, in Thursday's opener but he also became the pitcher with the highest winning percentage in baseball history.

Ford's six-hit triumph over the White Sox, who snapped the Yankees' seven-game winning streak by taking the nightcap, 4-2, gave him a lifetime record of 118 victories against 74 defeats for a .718 percentage. He thus surpassed ex-Yankee Spud Chandler's .717 mark among pitchers with 100 or more victories.

The only run off Ford in the opener was Floyd Robinson's ninth inning homer but by that time the Yanks had the game wrapped up, thanks to Elston Howard's 18th homer and Roger Maris' 18th. Juan Pizarro scored his 10th victory in the nightcap although

Fords outlast challenge by Chevies in 400

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (UPI)—The good name of Ford as the winner of the big ones was salvaged from the challenging Chevrolet Thursday when Glenn (Fireball) Roberts led a Ford tri across the finish line first in a hard-raced Firecracker 400 mile.

Until the 110th lap over the 160-circuit race at the Daytona International Speedway it was a duel between Chevrolet driver Junior Johnson of Ronda, N.C., and Ford jockey Fred Lorenzen of Elmhurst, Ill., and Roberts. Johnson's Chevy blew its engine on that turn leaving the field open for the Ford sweep. One fender back at the finish line was Lorenzen, tail-gated by Marvin Panch, also in a Ford. Darel Dieringer of Charlotte, N.C., was fourth in a 1963 Mercury and Ned Jarrett of Conover, N.C., fifth in another 1963 Ford. The win gave Roberts first prize money of \$11,600. Lorenzen collected \$7,015 and Panch got \$5,110.

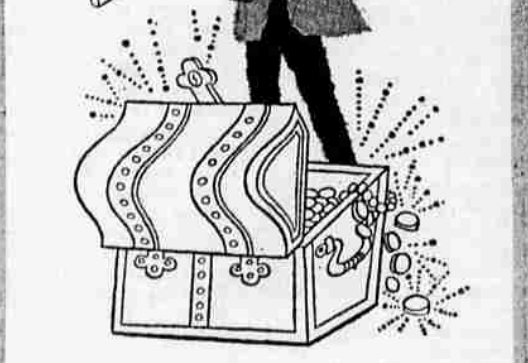
