Moscow parley sees split

Chances are improved for strike accord in railroad industry

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz' last-ditch effort to settle the nation's railroad dispute was credited today with improving chances of avoiding a nationwide strike.

Sources close to the long and fruitless negotiations said the odds still "are about 80-1 against acceptance" of Wirtz' proposals.

"But they were a million to one against reaching a settlement before, so there definitely has been improvement in the situation," one party said.

Wirtz proposed Friday that both sides agree to engage in binding negotiations for 20 days with Assistant Labor Secretary James Reynolds sitting in as sort of an arbitrator.

Red Chinese charge conclave manipulation

TOKYO (UPI) — Red China charged today that the recent international women's conference in Moscow was "dominated and manipulated" by the Soviet Union.

The New China News Agency, in a bitter commentary from Moscow, claimed the Soviets had rigged the conference against Red China.

The commentary said the jettisoning of the Chinese delegation to the conference "set an outrageous precedent for a conference of an international organization."

Without naming the Soviets directly, the commentary said "Some people, in their efforts to impose their erroneous line upon the congress, dominated the congress . . . and even used the congress for anti-Chinese maneuvers."

"During the congress, some wire-pullers planned and organized in great detail a series of anti-Chinese moves to vilify the Chinese delegation and the Chinese people," it charged.

"This proved that some people were bent on stirring up dispute and anti-Chinese agitation in the congress," the commentary added.

The commentary said the conference erupted into a "sharp struggle between two lines," one supporting Moscow's emphasis on peaceful coexistence and the other Peking's call for armed revolution.

The conference adopted a "preposterous stand" in stressing its final resolution that peace and disarmament should be the main concern of the women of the world, the commentary charged.

"Some delegates," it added, "paid lip-service to peaceful coexistence and preached loudly 'peaceful coexistence' and general complete disarmament," while avoiding completely the questions of opposing imperialism, colonialism, old and new, and especially U.S. imperialism."

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School board fired over racial tiff

The school board of Albemarle County, Va., was fired today as a result of a dispute over racial policies.

George Palmer, speaking for the board of supervisors that ousted the school officials, said he and his colleagues had "no choice" in the matter since the six-member school board refused to rescind a controversial policy order.

The order, issued last year, bans all extra-curricular activities at Albemarle County schools if they are integrated.

At Winston-Salem, N.C., today a group of white and Negro demonstrators continued picketing two all-white cafeterias, and in Danville, Va., a woman filed a \$50,000 suit against the mayor and other officials charging she was mistreated by police during a recent demonstration.

In another development at Danville, the city advertised in state newspapers for more police officers.

The ousting of the Albemarle school board was announced at Charlottesville.

Palmer said a new school board would be named July 11. He quoted school board chairman E. J. Oglesby as saying the school board would not rescind its policy despite requests to do so from the supervisors.

Albemarle is the only one of Virginia's 96 counties in which school board members served under the direction of the board of supervisors.

It was Palmer who made the motion to dissolve the school board this morning at a meeting of Albemarle supervisors. He noted that 32 Negroes have been assigned to Albemarle County schools in September, marking the first such integration in Albemarle County.

The supervisors first asked the school board to rescind the policy on June 13. Two of the six members of the school board were reported in favor of complying with the request with the other four opposing any such change.

Swim pool to re-open Sunday

Bend's Municipal Pool, subject to several acts of vandalism in recent days, will be open Sunday for regular swimming.

Pool officials at press time today said they might even get the pool open today if clean up efforts are successful.

Vandals dumped at least two sacks of peat moss in the pool sometime during the night Thursday. Pool employees found two empty sacks outside the fence yesterday.

Cleaning operations have been going on the past two days. An underwater vacuum cleaner has been used to draw the moss off the bottom of the pool.

Police are still investigating. Regular time for the pool to open is 1 p.m.

Miss Lynne Hoffman, a 1963 home economics graduate of Oregon State University, has been named Deschutes County Extension Agent with main responsibility to the 4-H club program. Miss Hoffman replaces Miss Janet Baker who recently resigned to be married.

She will start her employment, July 8, and will have her headquarters at the Deschutes County courthouse, Bend.

Miss Hoffman's first job in Deschutes County will be to work with John Schmid, 4-H Club Agent, in holding the Tri-County 4-H Summer Camp scheduled for the first full two weeks in July. Immediately following will be preparation for the Deschutes County Fair. Both events will give 4-H members and leaders an opportunity to meet the new agent.

Miss Hoffman, who has lived most of her life in Ontario, Oregon, has a rich background in extension and 4-H club work. She has served as a counselor at 4-H summer school, has been on the student 4-H staff at the Oregon State Fair, and has spent some time as an assistant agent in Gilliam and Baker counties as part of her OSU field experience in extension work. In 1959, she attended the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago as "state leadership" winner.

Miss Hoffman was an outstanding campus leader at Oregon State University. During her four years at OSU, she was a member of the collegiate 4-H Club and served one year as its president. She was also active in the "Y" Roundtable and the Model United Nations.

Republicans still want Cuba action

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Republicans kept pressure on the administration today for stronger action on Cuba despite assurances from the State Department that further anti-Castro steps are planned.

Sens. Gordon Allott, R-Colo., and Jack Miller, R-Iowa, members of a group of Republicans who feel Cuba is one of the GOP's best 1964 campaign issues, continued the attack on what they believe is a weak anti-Communist policy in Cuba by President Kennedy.

The criticism followed a State Department announcement that the United States intended to take additional steps of its own and would seek extended action by the Organization of American States (OAS) "which will in fact further isolate Cuba."

Meredith's remarks to an NAACP youth group resulted in a sharp hassle. Meredith was rebuked by a youth leader as being too moderate. Association officials interpreted his speech as being offensive and scolding. His main point was that certain Negro youth leaders have not acted responsibly. Immediately after the UPI reporter left, Meredith's hotel room, the newsmen, encountered Roy Wilkins, executive secretary of the NAACP. The reporter told Wilkins of Meredith's complaint. "Did he say that he was responsible for the treatment he received?" Wilkins snapped. "Did he say that he was criticized because he called the audience 'burr-heads' or did he otherwise tell why he was treated as he was?" "The NAACP is not going to issue an apology to Mr. Meredith," Wilkins said. "If anybody is going to do any apologizing, it should be him for making such statements."

Meredith said he became a life member of the NAACP Friday night. "Those cost \$500, don't they?"

Efforts to bridge gulf 'hopeless'

MOSCOW (UPI) — High Soviet and Red Chinese officials today held their first negotiating session in what appeared to be a near-hopeless effort to bridge the gulf splitting the world Communist movement into two rival camps.

Even as the top-level Communist ideologists met in secrecy at the gray stone headquarters of the Communist Central Committee, the Kremlin delivered a new indirect rebuke to Peking by publishing a peace message from President Kennedy to Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

The message expressed thanks to Khrushchev for the Soviet leader's 4th of July congratulations and told him, "The world has long passed that time when conflict can be the solution to international problems."

The pointed publication of Kennedy's message by the Soviet Tass news agency was seen as an indication of warming relations between Moscow and Washington as Red China was pulling away from its Soviet former ideological partner.

Reliable informants said the two negotiation delegations — led by Soviet Presidium member Mikhail Suslov and Teng-Hsiao Ping, secretary general of the Chinese Communist party — confined their meeting today to an exchange of position papers.

The exact contents of the documents exchanged were not disclosed. But the substance of the conflict has been clearly exposed in recent weeks.

In a June 14 letter to the Kremlin, the Chinese Communists sharply condemned the idea of peaceful coexistence with the West, as advocated by the Russians. They denied the possibility of avoiding war as long as "imperialism," personified in their eyes by Kennedy, continues to exist.

The Chinese Reds have stressed that the transition from capitalism to communism can be achieved only through violent revolution and have attacked the de-Stalinization campaign on which Soviet domestic policy has been based for the past six years.

The Soviet government has warned that the Chinese, in attempting to spread these Peking views directly to the Russian people by illegal means—have undermined relations between the two states.

Only Friday night Peking Radio defended its right to do so. It added still another attack to the flurry of bitter charges and counter-charges that set the stage for the opening of talks Friday.

The group will be in Oregon from July 14 to 27. An overnight stay in Bend is planned, with visits to various points of interest, including Bachelor Butte. Frank H. Loggan is in charge of arrangements for the Bend Chamber of Commerce.

Charges Negro 'bigotry'

James Meredith bitter towards NAACP actions

CHICAGO (UPI) — James H. Meredith, the Negro who integrated the University of Mississippi and became a hero to his race, charged today that "intolerance and bigotry" among his own people endanger the civil rights movement.

Meredith, who was roughly treated by the audience after a speech Friday night at a session of the annual convention of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), bitterly attacked his detractors.

In an interview with a United Press International reporter, Meredith said, "I shed my first tears early this morning since I was a child. Throughout all of the other ordeals that I have encountered, I was able to maintain my composure. However, the discourtesy shown me last night by the group before which I had been invited to speak, overwhelmed me. My makeup cannot endure this kind of intolerance and stand to be so dishonored by my own people," Meredith said.

Comes to life Drake Park takes water pageant form

Bend's Pageant Park, a quiet green spot on the Deschutes River at the west end of Drake Park footbridge, suddenly came to life this morning.

Work preliminary to the presentation of the 1963 Mirror Pond Pageant, set for the nights of July 26, 27 and 28, was started.

Styrofoam to be used in booms was moved into place. Barges for floats were unloaded. Work preliminary to construction of a big arch was started.

Heading the volunteer workers was Lyman C. Johnson, chairman for the Bend Chamber of Commerce of the big committee in charge of fete arrangements.

Missing from the river scene this year are the old, water-logged booms of former years. Taking their place will be a boom of boards floating on great chunks of Styrofoam, a light, plastic substance. Nine foot sections of the

Styrofoam are being cut into three-foot lengths, to place under the 2 by 10 inch boards.

A deck 28 inches in width, much larger than the narrow space on the old booms, will be provided. Workers will move along this deck in moving floats downstream on the pageant nights.

The river walkway will be about 1,000 feet in length, reaching from Pageant Park to a landing opposite the Drake Park point.

Work preliminary to the construction of an entirely new type of arch, to be made of steel piling in place of the muslin of former years, was to get underway today.

Also hauled into Pageant Park this morning were the empty old drums which will serve as floats for the barges.

On the bank for the early work was a large crew of Jaycoes.

Kennedy notes deep ties between America, Europe

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy reported Friday that his 10-day trip abroad convinced him of the deep ties between the people of the United States and Europe.

The President said in a 300-word statement that the journey was a "moving experience" which supported his belief that "every American has reason to be proud of this nation's reputation and standing in Europe."

The report was filmed and recorded Wednesday after Kennedy's return from Europe earlier that same day. It was released Friday to television and radio networks, and other news media. Kennedy visited Germany, Ireland, England and Italy on the trip.

"There is still much progress to be made," Kennedy said. "There will still be disappointments. But today we can be more confident than ever that the Old World and the New are partners for progress and partners for peace."

The President noted that "most of us are descended from that continent" and some still have relatives there. Others have sons or brothers buried in Europe, he said, and there are cultural, intellectual and commercial ties with Europe.

"Today I can report an even deeper tie between the people of Europe and the people of the United States," he said.

"I had planned to stay here overnight," he said, "but now I am going back as soon as I can. I have a plane ticket but I'm not going to tell anybody how I'm going back or exactly what time. I will get my wife out of here and back to school."

Mrs. Meredith was in the tiny room of the Morrison Hotel, headquarters for the convention, during the interview. Meredith was clad in a T-shirt and shorts. He sat on a rumpled twin bed. Mrs. Meredith was in the other bed, with blankets to her shoulders. She said nothing throughout the interview, except goodby to the reporter.

Holiday deaths pass 300 mark

Four deadly traffic accidents, each killing five persons, pushed the nation's Fourth of July highway death toll past the 300 mark today.

Five youths died in a two-car collision west of Bad Axe, Mich., today. Less than 12 hours earlier, two men, their wives and a little girl died in another Michigan crash when a truck apparently lost its brakes and struck their car at a Lansing intersection.

Five West Virginia residents were killed when their car slammed into the side of a truck at another intersection at Mechanicsburg, Ohio. A head-on collision near Holbrook, Ariz., claimed five more lives.

A United Press International count at 11:30 a.m. EDT showed at least 310 persons had died since the 102-hour holiday weekend started at 6 p.m. local time Wednesday.
