**Leaders fade second day**

**OSU Golfer fires 146 to win Mirror Pond**

Bob Wolsborn, 21-year-old Oregon State College golfer from Portland, fired an even par 72 Friday as the rest of the field faded, to win the Mirror Pond Golf Tournament by three strokes.

Wolsborn's winning score was 146 based upon rounds of 74 Thursday and 72 Friday. Two golfers tied for runnerup honors.

Millard Porter, the defending champion who had fired a 72 on Thursday, skied to a 77 yesterday to total 149. Right along with him in second spot was Jerry Cudari, the former University of Oregon star, with rounds of 75-74 for his 149.

George Beecher, the one-time Oregon amateur king from Prineville, and Jim Houston of Portland tied for third with scores of 150.

Thursday's leaders virtually shot themselves out of contention on the front nine holes Friday. Porter shot a four-over-par 40 and couldn't get the strokes back on young Wolsborn, who played best when the pressure was on.

Bend's Bob Thomas, with a great 72 on Thursday which included an eagle two on the first hole, soared to an 82 on Friday and this put him out of the running.

Medford's young Doug Olson, figured to be a title threat after his opening 75, shot an 81 on the lengthened course Friday and dropped from the top ten.

Best golf of the tournament, after the first nine holes, was played by Bend's Owen Panter. Panter fired 35-36-36 for the final 27 holes of the tournament, one under par, but couldn't make up ground on a bad start. The Bend golfer, a former champion and favorite, skied to a surprising 49 on the opening round of the tournament, his highest nine hole score in history.

Wolsborn's winning score was six strokes higher than that posted by last year's winner, Porter from Madras.

Porter shot rounds of 72-68 last year for the title.

In net play in the 0-5 division, Ralph Hope Jr. of Eugene, a nd Alan Hudspeth of Prineville, each carrying six handicaps, tied for top honors with net 142s. Each shot 154 gross scores for the tournament.

In the 7-12 division, Ed Cobb of Portland was low with 158 strokes in the gross division, followed by Bruce Chase with 159.

Bend's Dr. Joe Grahlman, with a fine closing 78, won the net honors in the 7-12 division with a 140. Gil Moty, a former Bend resident and now of Klamath Falls, was runnerup with 143 and Wilfred Jossy, also a former Bend resident, followed him with 145.

In the 13-21 gross division, Bend Mayor E. L. Nielsen was the winner with a total score of 172. Runnerup to him was Dr. Arnold Inches of Portland, who had led Nielsen by three strokes after the first round of play.

Al Wyatt of Eugene won the net award in the 13-20 division with a score of 145. Bend's Don Dyer placed in this division with a score of 152.

A total of 150 entries played the two day tournament at Bend Golf Club. Entries were closed a week prior to the tournament and club officials had to turn away golfers because of limited capacity on the course.

Best shot of the tournament was the two iron that Thomas used to hole out his eagle from about 200 yards out on the first hole of play the first day.

June Robinson of Albany and Mrs. George Calderwood of Eugene took the first round lead with scores of 80.

The final round is being played at Bend Golf Club today.

**Podres hurls Dodgers to fifth straight**

Lefty Johnny Podres showed three All-Star pitchers how it should be done, although he does not plan to be in Cleveland on Tuesday.

The reason he won't be there is simple. He wasn't chosen to the National League All-Star team by manager Alvin Dark.

But he certainly looked as if he should have been Friday night when he beat one All-Star pitcher and earned a richly deserved "well done" from two others in leading the Los Angeles Dodgers to a two-hit 1-0 victory over the Cincinnati Reds.

Podres bested left-hander Jim O'Toole, one of eight pitchers chosen for the NL All-Star team by Dark. And he also bettered the two most recent performances of his All-Star teammates, Sandy Koufax and Don Drysdale.

Koufax blanked the Cardinals on three hits last Wednesday night and Drysdale also whitewashed St. Louis on five hits Tuesday night but Podres was sharper than both in pitching the Dodgers to their fifth straight victory while increasing their league lead to three games.

Provided with the only run he needed when Frank Howard hammered his 13th homer in the seventh inning, Podres struck out four batters and did not walk a man en route to his sixth triumph.

Tommy Harper's bad-bounce single in the fourth inning was the first hit off Podres, and Johnny Edwards' sixth inning single was the last. O'Toole allowed six hits in suffering his sixth loss against 13 triumphs.

San Francisco overcame St. Louis, 6-5, in 11 innings, Houston beat Milwaukee, 4-2, the Cubs topped the Phillies, 3-2, in 11 innings and the Pirates dealt the Mets their eighth straight loss, 5-1.

In the American League, Cleveland stopped the Yankees, 4-1, Boston beat Chicago, 8-3, Detroit downed Kansas City, 4-3, Washington defeated Los Angeles, 5-1, and Baltimore edged Minnesota, 4-3, but lost the tiebreaker, 7-5.

Chuck Hiller's 11th inning single off Ed Bauta snapped a 5-5 tie between the Giants and Cardinals after San Francisco knotted the score on Harvey Kuenn's single in the ninth. Willie McCovey drove in three runs with a homer and a single. Jim Duffalo was the winner.

Bob Bruce of the Colts helped himself to his fourth victory with a double and a triple against the Braves, although rookie Jim Dickson was called into the game in the eighth to preserve Houston's third straight win. Rookie Bob Sadowski was charged with his third consecutive loss.

Andre Rodgers' sacrifice fly scored Ernie Banks with the winning run for the Cubs in the 11th inning against the Phillies. Reliever Lindy McDaniel was credited with his fifth victory, which also was the fifth in a row for the Cubs. Johnny Klipstein was the loser in relief of Ray Culp. Ruben Amaro homered for Philadelphia.

Roberto Clemente's two-run homer at the expense of Tracy Stallard in the eighth inning dissolved a 1-1 tie between the Pirates and Mets. Don Cardwell gained his fifth win with Al McBean's help in the eighth.
