

Bend wins one, loses two to Hillsboro in legion baseball

Bend's American Legion baseball nine showed signs of being a real contender in the Oregon Legion championships this summer in the first game of a three game series with Hillsboro here this Saturday and Sunday.

But only in that first one.

The Bend club played good ball behind the pitching of Paul Wardlaw and got their base raps when they needed them most to post a come-from-behind 4-3 win in the opening game of the series Saturday night at municipal ballpark.

Sunday's double-header was a completely different story as the Bend boys got good pitching efforts from Bob Warrington and Mike Metke but blew the show with 10 infield and outfield boobos for the afternoon. The result was that Bill Bauer's boys had lost another pair of games, by 7-5 and 5-2 scores.

The second game of Sunday's twin bill was first delayed and then finally cut short by rain. The contest went only five and one half innings.

Saturday's game was a real thriller. Wardlaw looked up with Shawn Mosely in a 9-0 pitching duel for the first five innings. Then Hillsboro got to Wardlaw for five of their eight hits in the top of the sixth inning and scored three runs to take the lead 3-0.

Bend bounced right back to score two runs in their half of the inning and make the score 3-2.

Hillsboro held that same margin going into the bottom of the ninth inning when Chris Kirby started things off for Bend by banging a single. Val Lewis advanced him to second with a sacrifice bunt and Kirby kept going into third standing up when the third sacker forgot to get back to his bag after fielding Lewis' bunt. Kirby scored to even things up at 3-3 when the third baseman bobbled George Woodworth's ground ball. Woodworth went to second on a passed ball and scored the winning run when the right

fielder misjudged Jerry Welle's fly ball and let it drop in behind him.

The Murray Brothers nine forgot to give starter Bob Warrington any support in the first game of Sunday's double-header as all five of the tallies scored against Warrington were unearned. Bend appeared as though they still might pull the game out of the fire in the late innings when they began to get to the Hillsboro chucker, Larry Barnett, scor-

ing one run in the fifth and three more in the sixth. However, they failed to get a threat going in the last of the seventh to end all hope of victory.

In the third game, the scoring decided the contest in the first inning as Hillsboro got five of their seven hits for the game in that stanza to score four runs.

Hillsboro scored once again to put the score at 5-2. Bend failed to threaten again and the score

remained the same when the game was finally halted after five and one half frames.

Don Watrous led the Bend batsmen for the series with four hits and Val Lewis was right behind him with three base hits for the series. The visitors were led by Doug Brunswick, Dick Webb and Bud Sousee with three hits each.

Bend came back with two runs of their own in the bottom of the

Hassle doesn't stop Barron in senior tourney

LYTHAM-ST. ANNES, England (UPI) — Herman Barron earned the admiration of English fans with the sportsmanship he displayed in winning the World Seniors professional golf championship.

The 53-year-old U.S. Seniors champion from White Plains, N.Y., won the title by defeating George Evans, the British titleholder, 3 and 2, Sunday on the old St. Annes links.

It turned out to be a mighty successful weekend for Barron, who had qualified for the British Open only 48 hours earlier over the same course.

Barron, though, had to recover from a mild hassle on the third hole before outlasting Evans, a former chauffeur who turned pro only two years ago.

The incident occurred on the third green when Barron, thinking Evans had conceded the hole after the Yank putted to within a foot of the cup, picked up his ball. Evans, 51, immediately claimed the hole, although officials ruled Barron could return his ball to approximately the same spot and attempt to hole out.

Barron declined the offer, pointing out that "he (Evans) claimed the hole and he's got it."

It was a decision that could have cost Barron the title, for he and Evans finished even at the end of the morning round and were still deadlocked after 27 holes. However, Barron finally barged ahead with a birdie on the 31st green, won the 32nd when Evans three-putted, and led by three after the Englishman caught the rough with his drive on the 33rd.

Barron then walked off with the title when they halved the 34th. It was the eighth time an American had won this match between the U.S. and British Seniors champions since it was launched in 1954.

29 batters, two over the minimum.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Cuban Ultimo (Sugar) Ramos will attempt the first defense of his world featherweight crown Saturday night at Mexico City since he won it on March 21 in his tragic fight with the late Davey Moore of Springfield, Ohio.

In what appears the week's outstanding match, Ramos will defend his 126-pound title against top ranked Rafiu King of Nigeria.

Ramos won the championship at Los Angeles on an upset 10th-round knockout over Moore, who never had been stopped in his previous 42 fights. Moore died three days later of brain injuries.

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Muncey drops Gold Cup

Miss Bardahl sets modern speed mark

DETROIT (UPI) — Pint-sized Ron Musson turned giant killer Sunday to upset all-conquering Bill Muncey and set a blazing new speed record in winning the 56th running of the famed Gold Cup race.

Musson, a mere 5-7 and 155 pounds, powered Miss Bardahl around the three-mile Detroit River course at a sizzling average of 105.212 miles per hour to edge Bill Cantrell and Gale V for the \$10,000 first prize and the coveted Gold Cup.

Musson and Miss Bardahl had 1,500 points, to 1,400 for Gale V, which won the final heat.

Muncey and the famed Miss Thriftway, winners of the last two Gold Cup races, finished sixth in the field of 12.

Miss Bardahl won all three of her preliminary heats to pick up 1,200 points going into the final heat. Gale V and Tahoe Miss each had 1,000 points and had a chance to win it all if Miss Bardahl faltered.

Cantrell, a former Indianapolis "500" race driver, made his bid

for victory by picking up 400 points as he made a farce out of the final heat. But Miss Bardahl picked up 300 points for finishing second and that was more than enough for victory in the overall point system.

Miss Bardahl, owned by Ole Bardahl of Seattle, set a Gold Cup lap record of 114.650 miles per hour in the second heat.

More than 200,000 fans jammed the course.

Ortega spoils Bello's debut

NEW YORK (UPI) — Victorious Gaspar Ortega, welterweight contender of Mexico, Mex., and young Billy Bello of New York may be re-matched for another television 10-rounder at Madison Square Garden Aug. 24, promoter Harry Markson said today.

Markson was delighted with Saturday night's nationally televised bout at the Garden, where Ortega stretched his unbeaten string to eight fights and spoiled Bello's big-time debut by winning a split decision.

It was 20-year-old Bello's first TV fight and first Garden main event.

Ortega, 27, won the verdict, 5-4-1, 5-4-1, 4-5-1. One judge favored Bello. The United Press International had Ortega ahead, 5-4-1. And a poll of seven writers at the ringside favored Ortega, 6-1.

Gaspar scored his 88th win in 118 fights as Bello suffered his sixth loss in 24 starts.

Ortega, the 2-1 favorite, weighed 150 pounds to Bello's 151.
