

Application for mining leases filed today

SALEM (UPI)—Application for mining leases on 3,000 acres of iron-bearing sand in the Clatsop Spit area south of the Columbia River near Astoria were filed today by the Bunker Hill Co., one of the nation's leading mining and smelting companies.

Lease applications were filed simultaneously with the Oregon State Land Board and the Clatsop County Court.

Charles E. Schwab, president of Bunker Hill, which has a large plant at Kellogg, Idaho, said his firm plans to explore the coastal areas to determine their potential for commercial production of iron from the sand.

Noting that the iron-bearing sands have been considered to be non-commercial because the deposits are low grade, Schwab reported Bunker Hill plans to apply new metallurgical techniques to the processes for extracting iron.

The mining lease application indicates Bunker Hill plans to locate the treatment facilities within the Clatsop area.

Schwab credited Pacific Power and Light Co., for interesting his company in the project.

The mining lease application proposes royalty payments be made to both the county and the state based on the mineral production.

Bunker Hill has mining, smelting or refining operations at Kellogg and Burke, Idaho; Superior, Mont.; and Seattle, and substantial interests in mining operations at Metaline Falls, Wash., and Salmo, B.C.

License to picket asked in Prineville

PRINEVILLE — Momentary excitement was aroused in recent days at city hall when an unidentified man appeared before the city recorder, Mrs. Francis Jurist.

Due to recent national labor unrest, bystanders thought at first, that the would-be picket might be a harbinger of local difficulties.

The man gave his reasons for wanting to picket, however, and settled any fears. He had, he related, been denied service of a beverage at a local establishment and planned to relieve his outrage by picketing the place.

There being no provision for a picketing license on the city's books, the man insisted on waiting to discuss the affair with police chief Mike Thompson. While waiting, outrage faded, and he apparently abandoned the plan.

Police note rash of gas syphoning

Vandals Sunday night syphoned gas from the parked cars of two eastside neighbors — and apparently used lengths they had cut from the owners' garden hoses to do it.

Complaints to police were phoned Monday from Lee Macker, 472 E. Irving, and Mrs. Anita Ertle, 512 E. Irving. Mrs. Ertle lost about five gallons of fuel. Macker lost about half a tank. Both discovered their hoses destroyed Monday morning.

A third party, Dick Geser, 171 E. Tenth, also found a piece sliced from his garden hose Monday morning. Police said there was no evidence that his car had been tampered with, however.

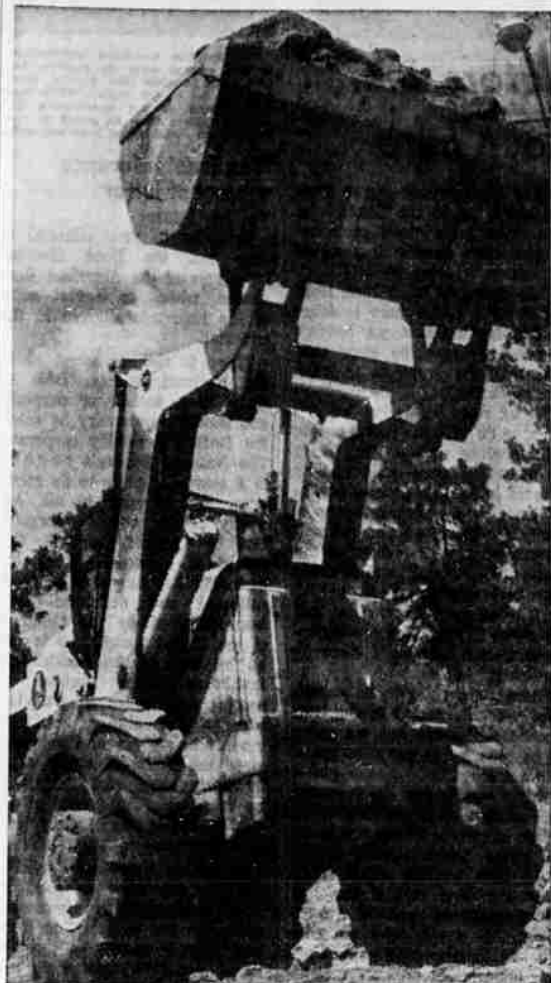

Two clash over toad 'calls'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The National Science Foundation (NSF) and Republican Rep. Richard L. Roudsbush clashed today over the importance of mating calls of Central American toads.

The Indiana congressman started the debate with a letter to voters in his home district. He attacked what he considers last-minute scrambling by government agencies to spend their remaining funds before the end of the fiscal year.

Roudsbush singled out for criticism four programs awarded NSF funds shortly before June 30, end of the fiscal year, including a \$21,200 grant to study toads in Central America.

He said the NSF should "leave the intricacies of why toads respond to toads up to the toads, themselves."

The NSF came back with a claim that the toad study not only would provide important information on man's evolution, but could result in important benefits for modern medicine.

Also labeled by Roudsbush as of dubious worth was a \$2,911 grant to study fern flora of Peru. Other expenditures termed "interesting" by the congressman were:

— \$103,000 for films of Eskimo culture.

— \$3,700 for a study of the diving behavior of the seal.

Roudsbush said it was typical that the U.S. government—faced with an \$8 billion deficit from fiscal 1963 — still would spend more than \$21,000 to study mating calls of toads.

Pow Wow draws heavy traffic

PRINEVILLE — A letter commending the Prineville city police department on its handling of extremely heavy traffic during the past holiday weekend was received yesterday by Mike Thompson, Prineville police chief.

Rotarian chief coming to Bend

Dr. William C. Jones of Eugene, governor of district 511 of Rotary International, world-wide service organization, arrives here tomorrow to visit the local Rotary club, one of the 27 clubs in the district.

In addition to addressing Bend Rotarians at their meeting, he will confer with Dr. Robert L. Bristol, president of the Rotary Club of Bend, and other club officers on Rotary administrative matters and service activities.

Dr. Jones, who is dean of administration at the University of Oregon, is also director of the University's Institute for College Teaching. He spent fall term, 1962, at Harvard University as Honorary Littauer Fellow in the Graduate School of Public Administration.

Dr. Jones has been active for many years in the Y.M.C.A., and has served on national boards and committees of that association.

He was president of Whittier College, California, from 1944 to 1951, and acting president of the University of Oregon, 1960-61.

Dr. Jones is a member and past president of the Rotary Club of Eugene. He was elected a district governor for 1963-64 at Rotary's 54th annual convention in St. Louis, Missouri, last June. He is one of 272 district governors responsible for supervising the activities of more than 11,500 Rotary clubs with a total membership of 335,500 Rotarians in 129 countries around the globe.
