Redmond hospital to re-submit 'wing' bond issue to voters

REDMOND — Directors of Central Oregon District Hospital voted unanimously Tuesday night to re-submit to the voters a \$375,000 bond issue proposal for construction of a new hospital wing.

The election will take place August 15, from 8 a.m. until 8 p.m. in the Redmond City Hall.

The new figure is \$15,000 less than the amount in the proposal defeated by 37 votes last April.

The lesser amount was made possible by expenditure of funds on hand for several items in the existing building included in the earlier proposal — intercom and fire-alarm systems, an electrical call board and other wiring.

Total cost of the new construction and remodeling has been estimated in excess of \$400,000, but a \$24,000 building fund now on hand would be utilized in the construction.

Central Oregon District Hospital recently received full accreditation from the joint commission on accreditation of hospitals in Chicago, for the first time in its decade of operation. It was stated at the time by the association that in order to attain accreditation, the hospital must carry out its proposed building program to relieve over-crowded conditions.

REDMOND — Construction has started on the new Catholic Mission Church at Sisters, reports the Rev. Francis McCormack of St. Thomas' Catholic Church of Redmond. Rev. McCormack also will serve the Sisters church upon its completion early in September.

Contractor is Hilgers Construction Company of Bend, which submitted a bid of \$20,876 on the wood frame building. The church will feature a concrete slab foundation and exposed beam roof. Area of the structure will be 1850 square feet.

Rev. McCormack reports that the Catholic Extension Society, headquartered in Chicago, has contributed \$10,000 toward construction of the Sisters church. The Society will select a name for the Mission, he said.

No purchase price was announced.

Northwest Industries specializes in fabrication of corrosion-resistant, refractory and reactive metals for use in the chemical, aerospace and pulp and paper industries. Product Engineering is the largest die casting firm in the Northwest.

President Charles W. McCormack of Northwest Industries said the Portland firm will be operated as a subsidiary and will be expanded in the fields of die casting, plastic molding and die making.
