Arnie back in form as Open starts

LYTHAM-ST. ANNES, Eng. (UPI) — Jack Isaacs of Langley Field, Va., was the first of seven Yanks off the tee today in the opening round of the British Open golf championship, which Arnold Palmer is a 2-1 favorite to win.

Isaacs, not expected to make the cut Thursday for the final two rounds on Friday, teed off in a twosome with England's John Ellis. Following him to the first tee in order were fellow Yanks Doug Sanders, Phil Rodgers, World Seniors champion Herman Barron, Palmer, Jack Nicklaus and Bob Marshall.

The 72-hole tournament is being played over the 6,836-yard Royal Lytham and St. Annes course, often described as "one long sand dune with patches of grass." A total of 120 players made up the field for the start, but that will be cut to the low 45 and ties for the final two rounds.

Palmer shot a final tuneup round 66, four under par, Tuesday and bookmakers promptly refused to accept any more bets on him. "I played real well and I feel good," said Palmer, who is shooting for his third consecutive British Open crown.

Masters champion Nicklaus, who played Tuesday in a partnership with Rodgers against Palmer and Gary Player of South Africa, was a 5-1 pick to win the title. Player was 6-1, Peter Thomson of Australia 8-1, and Rodgers and Kel Nagle of Australia 10-1.

The first prize in the British Open is worth only \$4,200 but an even bigger incentive is the place awaiting the winner in the "World Series" of golf at Akron, Ohio, in September. Nicklaus already has qualified as Masters champion and Julius Boros as U.S. Open champion.

After completing his final tuneup round Palmer said, "This is a real driver's course. You're dead if you can't drive straight, and I hope to keep mine straight until Friday night."

Field reduced to eight in Oregon PGA

SALEM (UPI) — Larry Lamberger Sr. of Portland, going after his third title in a span of 23 years, scored two victories Tuesday to lead the way into the quarterfinals of the Oregon Professional Golfers' Association match play tournament at Illahe Hills County Club.

Lamberger, who won the championship in 1940 and repeated in 1955, defeated Jay Gorman of Portland 7 and 5 and won over Boots Porterfield of Grants Pass 3 and 2 in the opening two rounds of the tourney.

Medalist Duane Bergstrom of Lebanon posted 4 and 3 wins over Gordon Marlatt of Salem and Vern Martin of Corvallis.

Also reaching the quarterfinals were Jim Warner of Klamath Falls, Harvey Hixson of Cottage Grove, Harold West of Tualatin, Jerry Mowlds of Portland, Jim Peterson of Vancouver, Wash., and Ken Irwin of Salem.

The quarterfinal and semifinal matches were scheduled today. The 36-hole finals are set for Thursday.

Alou-led Giants win from Seattle in 10th

The Tacoma Giants are probably thinking a bit smugly today that they got the better of the deal that sent slugger Jimmy Ray Hart to the parent San Francisco Giants in exchange for Matty Alou.

Hart today is recovering from a broken shoulder suffered Sunday when he was hit by a pitch in his second major league game. But Alou is already winning games for Tacoma.

Tuesday night Matty delivered a clutch single in the bottom of the 10th inning that brought Cap Peterson home with the winning run in the Giants 2-1 victory over Seattle.

Tacoma had taken a 1-0 lead in the second on Ricardo Joseph's home run, but Seattle knotted the count in the fourth on Rac Sluder's run-producing double. And that was where matters stood until Alou showed a flash of his former major league form.

Power decided the other games played in the PCL Tuesday night. The Portland Beavers crashed six home runs to score a 5-4 and 8-2 doubleheader sweep against Hawaii, and a bases-loaded double by Deron Johnson and a bases-empty home run by Bobby Klaus sparked a six-run explosion by San Diego in the eighth inning that carried the Padres to an 8-5 victory over Denver.

All other teams were idle. Home runs accounted for all of Portland's runs in the opening game. Hector Martinez and Billy Harrell started the power parade with back-to-back circuit clouts in the first inning.

Manny Jimenez added one with Harrell on base in the third inning and Gordon MacKenzie con-

cluded the Beaver scoring with a solo homer in the fourth.

Jimenez and MacKenzie homered again in the second game to pace Portland's 13-hit attack. Bonus baby Lew Krausse was never in serious trouble as he held Hawaii to eight hits and recorded his ninth win of the season.

Hawaii's Bobby Knoop spoiled Krausse's shutout bid when he slammed a two-run homer in the ninth inning.

Portland and Hawaii play another doubleheader tonight, and the strain of the schedule was having its effect on the Islanders pitching staff.

Noren on Mound

Hawaii manager Irv Noren, an outfielder during his major league days with the New York Yankees and other clubs, put himself on the mound in the second game after three other pitchers failed to contain the Beavers. Noren pitched the final two innings and didn't allow a hit.

Denver had taken a 3-2 lead over San Diego in the eighth on Lou Klimchek's bases-empty home run. But the lead was short-lived.

Jim Soul opened the Padres half of the eighth with a double. Gene Fresse singled and Art Shamsky drew an intentional walk to load the bases for Johnson. Several plays later Klaus hit his home run before reliever Noel Mickelsen could retire the side.

Starter John Flavin weakened in the ninth and Denver added two more runs. But George Williams came in from the bullpen to end the inning and preserve Flavin's sixth victory of the season.

\$50,000 purse to lure Big Three

WAUKEGAN, Ill. (UPI) — Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus and Gary Player will compete in a \$50,000 two-day golf tournament at Glen Flora Country Club Sept. 1-2, it was announced today.

The trio will play 18 holes on the 6,500-yard, par-70 course each day with the winner to receive \$25,000. Second money will be \$15,000 and third \$10,000.

In case of a tie, there will be a sudden death playoff on Monday.

It will be the first head and head competition between the three since their 1962 meeting at Akron.

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UPI)—Dick Sikes, one of the world's top amateur golfers, tees off against Dave Hellman of DeKalb, Ill., in quest of his third consecutive National Public Links golf title.

With the NCAA championship already tucked away, the tall, thin youth from Wichita, Kan., is playing at the peak of his game and is rated the favorite to go all the way.

However, medalist Johnny Joseph of Hayward, Calif., is hot and also could be the man to beat. He tangles with Wallace Smith of Pontiac, Mich., in another feature match.

Joseph qualified with a 141 total for 36 holes of play to win the medal honors by one stroke from Leroy Beasley of Dallas, Tex. His foe today qualified with 132.

Sikes, playing it cozy, qualified with 145. His opponent, Hellman, had a 152.

In another featured pairing, Beasley goes up against Jim Everman, the Bellingham, Wash., mailman.

The team title went to a trio of shotmakers from Toledo, Ohio, who posted an aggregate of 443 Tuesday to win by three strokes from Long Beach, Calif., which came in with a 446.

Playing on the winning team were Hubert Farmer, Leonard Pietras and Andrew Holmes.

Joseph wasn't too happy about winning the medal honors. He has bigger things in mind. "Winning the medal honors always seems to be a jinx," he said after accepting the trophy. "I didn't have this in mind at all."
