A second theft of gas was reported by Eugene McBride at the Oregon Trail Box plant 1, where a truck's tank was drained of its contents last evening. A police investigation is being conducted.

Crews contain school fire

A fire that started in a blow-fan conveyor pipe used to carry sawdust to the furnace, brought two fire rigs to the junior high school building about 7:30 this morning.

Within an hour crews had the fire under control, but had to remove both the fan motor and all sawdust from the bin. Chief Vern Carlon said the fire probably was triggered from a friction spark somewhere in the piping system.

The fire preceded by just a matter of days the completion of a sprinkler system which workmen have been installing in the bin, Carlon said.

Only fire run Wednesday was to the 500 block on Olney where a car's electric wiring shorted. No equipment was used and only the wiring was damaged. The car owner was not identified.
