

Death toll 40 in ferry wreck

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (UPI)—The Argentine Maritime Prefecture set the known death toll at 40 persons today in the fiery wreck of a fog-shrouded steamer in the river Plate Estuary south of here.

The prefecture said four to seven persons were still missing but some survivors of the 3,500-ton Ciudad de Asuncion said there were as many as 30 persons missing, some of whom may not have been on the passenger list.

Rescue ships, hampered by the fog, picked up 380 survivors and brought them to shore at La Plata, 45 miles south of Buenos Aires, along with the 40 bodies recovered so far.

The Ciudad de Asuncion left Montevideo, Uruguay, Wednesday night en route to Buenos Aires and apparently ran into the sunken hulk of the Greek steamer Marisonga Kaire at 3:45 a.m. Thursday in the river Plate Estuary off the coast of Argentina.

Survivors said a loud crunching sound jolted them awake. They said all lights aboard the ship went out and within a half hour the Ciudad de Asuncion was in flames.

The collision had opened a huge gash below the water line on the port side of the vessel and water gushed in.

One report said there were only six lifeboats and many persons jumped into the water wearing life-jackets.

31 hospitalized in explosion

HASTINGS, England (UPI)—At least 31 persons were hospitalized today with injuries incurred during three huge gas explosions along this channel resort town's waterfront Thursday.

Authorities estimated that the series of blasts injured a total of 50 persons and destroyed the homes of 30 families. The explosions were believed caused by a broken gas main.

"The scene looked like a wartime bombing raid," one eyewitness said. Most of the victims were vacationers cut by flying glass.

Police said the first explosion rocked the Winchester restaurant and set it afire. Ten minutes later another blast ripped through two houses on the waterfront, followed by a third explosion in another restaurant down the street.

Indian official to visit region

The U.S. Indian commissioner, Philo Nash, is to visit the Pacific Northwest on July 22-28 and will be on the Warm Springs Indian Reservation on July 27.

This will be the first visit of Nash to the Pacific Northwest since he was appointed Indian commissioner in 1961 by President Kennedy. Robert D. Holtz, Portland area director of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Department of the Interior, said Nash's primary purpose in visiting reservations of the region will be to meet with the Indian people and their tribal officials.

Nash, former lieutenant governor of Wisconsin, will begin his tour on July 22 with a visit to the Spokane Reservation in eastern Washington. Also on the schedule are visits to the Colville, Yakima and Umatilla Reservations.

A native of Wisconsin, Nash was formerly in the cranberry business in that state and was administrative assistant to President Truman in 1952-53. He received a PhD degree in anthropology from the University of Chicago, and lectured at the Universities of Wisconsin and Toronto.

Nash is the author of publications on anthropology, race relations, and Indian affairs.

Dissolution of Central African Federation appears inevitable

Within sound of the roar of majestic Victoria Falls, a noble experiment in partnership of the races is coming to a bitter but seemingly inevitable end.

It is the unfortunate lot of British Deputy Prime Minister R. A. (RAB) Butler to preside over the dissolution of the Central African Federation, founded 10 years ago by the government of Sir Winston Churchill without African consent and floundering now on African opposition.

With dissolution complete, Northern Rhodesia and Nyasaland go their separate ways in independence.

It is Southern Rhodesia, where 233,000 whites rule 3,600,000 Africans, that is giving Britain its greatest headache of all the half-dozen former African possessions. It has eased to independence and others for which independence is planned.

The white supremacy government of Prime Minister Winston Field is demanding independence for Southern Rhodesia at the moment it is granted to either of the other two.

Wants African Voice

Butler has served notice upon Field that there will be no independence until Southern Rhodesia amends its constitution to give Africans a voice in government.

In prospect could be another Algeria or the bloody violence such as the Mau Mau unleashed in Kenya before independence.

The predominantly black governments of both Northern Rhodesia and Nyasaland already have made it clear they will not cooperate economically with a Southern Rhodesian government dominated by white supremacists.

Northern Rhodesia, with a population of around three million and one quarter of the world's copper reserves, potentially is Af-

rica's richest country per person.

With dissolution of the federation, Southern Rhodesia will lose any share in income from copper exports which last year amounted to more than \$300 million.

African Nationalists' plans for economic boycott go all the way.

Seek Oriental Replacements

They will ignore Southern Rhodesia's textiles and other products and look for their replacements in India or Hong Kong.

If Southern Rhodesia attempts to hold back coal for Northern Rhodesia's copper refineries, then Northern Rhodesia will get it elsewhere.

If there is interference with copper shipments, then Northern Rhodesia will move it out through the Congo.

Published estimates have said that a loss of the Northern Rhodesian and Nyasaland markets would mean a drop of 30 to 40 per cent in Southern Rhodesia's output.

In Salisbury, capital of Southern Rhodesia, office space already is going begging as businessmen adjust to the coming changes. Copper companies are preparing to abandon Salisbury as their headquarters and move to Lusaka in Northern Rhodesia.

Southern Rhodesia also could be left out of the commonwealth which now gives its tobacco a trade preference.

Such are the grim prospects facing Southern Rhodesia, but its government shows no signs of change.

PORTLAND (UPI)—The bodies of a woman and her seven-year-old daughter were found in the Willamette River near the Richfield Oil Co. Docks here Thursday.

Multnomah County coroner's office identified them as Mrs. Pauline J. Cockerham and her daughter, Janet Eileen.

Passengers on a pleasure craft spotted the woman about 8:15 a.m. and the girl was found about 2:30 p.m. by lumber scalers working on a log raft. The two had left their home about 4:45 a.m. according to the woman's husband, Albert Cockerham. He told them his wife had been distraught because of family difficulties.

like denies exclusion

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower has denied a report he excluded Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller and Sen. Barry Goldwater from his list of acceptable candidates for the 1964 GOP presidential nomination.

It had been reported that Eisenhower considered only Gov. William Scranton of Pennsylvania, Gov. George Romney of Michigan, Sen. Thurston B. Morton, R. Ky., and former Gen. Lucius D. Clay as potential candidates for the Republican nomination.

It was learned that Eisenhower's denial was relayed by a friend to both Rockefeller and Goldwater as well as to GOP congressional leaders.

Stated values of all stocks impressive

NEW YORK (UPI) — The New York Stock Exchange, which deals carefully in some large figures at times, has issued a report showing that at the end of June the market values of all stocks listed on the big board were \$382,966,000,000.

Even to a nation accustomed to jet age speeds, king size cigarettes, preparations for shots at the moon and consumption of seven million automobiles annually, the figure is respectable.

With other figures, when compared with similar reports issued by the exchange a quarter century ago, it is a measure of the trend to "going public" which has grown among business concerns over the years.

On July 1, 1938, there were 862 companies with 1,256 issues on the exchange; there are now 1,203 companies, about 50 per cent more, and 1,569 issues, including both common and preferred.

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Hung jury in murder trial

KLAMATH FALLS (UPI)—The first degree murder trial of Zolma Joan Ochiho, 38, ended here today with a hung jury.

Judge Donald Piper dismissed the jury at 3:30 a.m. after they announced they were unable to agree.

No date was set immediately for a new trial.

Mrs. Ochiho was charged with the rifle slaying of Florence Baker Huit, 26, in Klamath Falls last February. She was acquitted by a Klamath Falls jury in another slaying late last year.
