

Fire danger forces closure of forest land

Due to extreme fire hazard from heavy logging slash, the large Brooks-Scanlon area north-west of Bend, some 40,000 acres, will be closed to unregulated entry effective on July 16, Central Oregon District fire wardens announced today on behalf of the Department of Forestry.

The Brooks-Scanlon area covers lands north of Tumalo Creek east of the U.S. Forest Service boundary and west of the Brooks-Scanlon main line road to the Sisters area. The north boundary of the Brooks-Scanlon area is south of the Three Creeks Lake road about six miles south of Sisters.

All access roads will be posted, and entry will be by permit and for business purposes only. Harry Pearson, assistant warden in the office of Mel Crawford, district warden, Prineville, said the fire situation in the Brooks - Scanlon area is very critical due to the increased logging activity in the Three Creeks Lake area where heavy logging has been carried out to get rid of mistletoe infested stands.

Also closed to entry on July 17 will be the Little Squawback area 16 miles north of Sisters. This is about 10,000 acres.

The Central Oregon state district has had 26 fires to date. Seven were man caused, and 19 were caused by lightning. Of the total, 17 fires occurred in the Prineville - Sisters unit.

Pearson said lands are drying rapidly.

5 Oregonians die in traffic

Five Oregon residents lost their lives in separate traffic accidents during the weekend.

One of the accidents occurred in Washington state.

Gerald Jensen, 3, Florence, was killed when he was struck by a car on State Highway 36 near his home Sunday night.

Mrs. Joanna Bowcutt, 40, Gladstone, was killed when her station wagon collided head-on with a car three and one-half miles northeast of Shelton, Wash., early Sunday.

Benjamin Maxwell, 45, Dayton, died at a Portland hospital Sunday from injuries suffered Saturday when the pickup truck in which he was riding crashed into a light post in Portland.

Edgar Charlton, 47, Hermiston, died at a Pendleton hospital Sunday from injuries suffered in a one-car accident on State Highway 208 in Umatilla County Saturday.

Larry Sade, 20, Roseburg, was killed when he fell from a moving car at the city limits of Roseburg early Saturday. Police said a door opened accidentally.

Two held on murder charge

ROSEBURG (UPI) — Gerald Oden, 25, Wolf Creek, and Norman Thomas, 22, Grants Pass, were being held in the Douglas County jail today on charges of first degree murder.

They are charged with the death of Lloyd Harper, 48, Grants Pass. Harper was found lying in a ditch along Interstate Highway 5, two miles east of Grants Pass Friday night. Cause of the death still is under investigation.

Oden and Thomas were arrested near Roseburg. A 16-year-old girl from Walla Walla, Wash., who was with them was taken into protective custody and turned over to juvenile authorities.

John Dean held in murder case

KLAMATH FALLS (UPI)—John Wesley Dean, 37, Klamath Falls, was being held on a charge of second degree murder in the Klamath County jail here today following the death of his brother, Hagan.

Arraignment was scheduled later in the day.

Hagan Dean, 54, died Saturday morning at a Klamath Falls hospital from knife wounds suffered during a fight last Monday.

His brother was arrested Wednesday on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon. The charge was changed after the death.

John Morgan retires after 66 years

John V. Morgan, 81, has retired after 66 years of continuous service in office work. A Bend resident 41 years, he was a bookkeeper for The Shevlin-Hixon Company for 25 years, and for the past 16 years, has been bookkeeper for Oregon Trail Box Co.

Mr. and Mrs. Morgan returned recently from a vacation trip to Colorado Springs, where they visited their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Paul A. Otey. They were accompanied on the trip by their other daughter, Mrs. Herbert Butcher, and her daughter.

Morgan started work as an office boy at the age of 15 for the J. Neils Lumber Co. in Sauk Rapids, Minn., holding various positions until coming West to Everett, Wash. He made the trip across the continent in a Model T Ford, in 18 days.

Morgan was employed in Everett as a dock tallyman, until coming to Bend to work for the lumber company. He still rides a bicycle, and for a number of years, has used this conveyance for his daily trips to the postoffice.

Rails studiers report Friday?

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A special presidential committee studying the facts in the railroad work rules dispute "hopefully" will submit its report Friday to President Kennedy, a Labor Department spokesman said today.

Railway company and union representatives met today to inform the panel of their concept of the issues. At a similar meeting Tuesday, the parties will outline for the panel their positions on the issues.

A closed session of the special committee will be held Wednesday and "the report to the President hopefully will be submitted on Friday," a spokesman said. This would be three days before the original target date.

The special committee was appointed by President Kennedy to make recommendations for a solution to the deadlock over new work rules. Kennedy intends to use the committee's report as a basis for proposals to Congress next Monday to end the dispute.

Cabin cruiser runs aground

WASHINGTON (UPI) — I can remember when a folk singer was a guy who wore dirty undershirts. He played the guitar "by ear," which probably sounded better than if he had used his hands.

He could sing all 102 verses of "Lonesome Freight Train" and insisted on doing so. In some states, this was recognized as grounds for divorce.

Almost every community had a folk singer, along with a town drunk and a village idiot. In many communities, all three of them were the same fellow.

Folk singers performed mainly in talent shows staged in the high school gymnasium to raise money for the volunteer fire department.

They were not paid for these appearances, but as a reward for their services they were allowed to start two fires.

All of this, as anyone who has looked out the window lately is aware, has drastically changed. Folk singers now travel in groups, partly for harmony and partly for safety.

Clean-cut young men in Ivy League clothes, who studied business administration in college, are making fortunes by musically recounting the misfortunes of immigrant coal miners.

Their link with the working class is authentic, however. They have calluses on their string-plucking fingers and they wear union-made neckties. Which are real sincere.

As much as any group, and more than most, the Kingston Trio is responsible for the folk music transformation. Having been together for five years now, the Kingstons are regarded as the elder statesmen of the new breed.

Pine plywood to get standards

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The first commercial standards and specifications for the production of plywood from Southern Pine timber have been set by the Department of Commerce.

The announcement clears the way for manufacture of plywood from southern pine on a commercial basis. Georgia-Pacific Corp. started construction of the first mill at Fordyce, Ark., in June.

U. S. Plywood has announced plans for a mill in cooperation with Southern Pine Lumber Co. at Diboll, Tex.

Pine plywood will be interchangeable with widely-used Douglas fir plywood, according to T. M. Orth, who served on the standards committee.

Test runs to prove the feasibility of using pine logs in mass production of plywood were successful at plywood mills in the south and at Douglas fir plywood mills on the West Coast.

Oregon woman shot to death

GARDNERVILLE, Nev. (UPI)—A 29-year-old woman from Chilcoot, Ore., was shot through the heart and killed Sunday in what authorities said was the climax to an argument over who should buy the next bottle of liquor.

The victim was Barbara Hatcher. She had been a guest at the home of Mrs. Thomiseta Ruez, 31, for the past month.

Douglas County sheriff's deputies said the woman apparently got into an argument when Mrs. Hatcher told Mrs. Ruez she did not have money for more liquor. Undersheriff Dave McCleary said the two women had been drinking most of the previous night.

The victim was shot twice, once in the right arm and once in the heart.

Liquor board may get probe

OLYMPIA, Wash. (UPI)—State Sen. Albert C. Thompson, R-Bellevue, today formally demanded "a complete and comprehensive investigation" of the Washington State Liquor Control Board.

Thompson made his request in a letter to House Speaker William S. Day of Spokane, the chairman of the Legislative Council.

Day has indicated previously that he is in favor of such a probe.

Thompson, a longtime critic of the board, cited "many unexplained and what appears to be unorthodox activities" concerning liquor control which have been made public recently.

Although he did not mention either incident directly, Thompson apparently referred to the efforts of mysterious telephone callers to obtain money from two motels in exchange for a liquor license and the report that a state liquor store manager has directed his clerks to "push" certain brands.

Some westside timber land to remain same

SALEM (UPI) — Timber land values in Benton, Lane, Linn, Columbia and Washington counties will remain the same as they were in 1962.

The State Tax Commission today removed higher values which its valuation division had ordered. The decision came after three days of fact finding hearings held last week.

It announced further studies would be made to work out the forest land valuation problem before making future adjustments on the land values in Western Oregon.

Tax commissioners said while they believed the higher land values which were originally ordered would have been sustained in court, enough doubt had been raised in the hearings to justify the additional study.

Timber owners and forestry experts had strongly disputed the proposed increased land values.
