Legion returns from season ending trip

SALEM — Bend's Murray Brothers Construction American Legion baseball squad dropped both ends of a doubleheader here Sunday to conclude a five-day road trip which saw them win one game while losing six. The final game of yesterday's doubleheader also finished regular season play for the Bend nine.

Bend's Legion team lost the first game of the trip by a 6-5 score when they gave up an unearned run in the bottom of the ninth to the Klamath Falls Falcons.

The locals then moved on to Sweet Home, where they picked up the only win on the tour, 8-5. Bend's squad then dropped five games in a row, losing to Sweet Home 5-4, Lebanon 5-4, Silverton 7-2, and Capital Post No. 9 of Salem twice by 5-3 and 5-0 margins.

Bend overtook a four run deficit last Wednesday at Klamath Falls, only to let a run score with the score knotted at 5-5.

Mike Metke was charged with the loss in that one. Metke relieved Bill Bauer in the seventh with the score tied. Bauer had relieved Darold Parsons in the fourth frame.

The race in the Northern Division of the league is a different story. The Seattle Mariners are 18½ games in front of the next closest team, the Portland Sea Dogs.

Tacoma, after whipping the Spokane Indians 8-0 Saturday night, handed the visitors a 5-4 beating in the ninth inning first game. Bob Garibaldi worked the entire game, allowing eight hits to 16 for his club. He aided his own cause in the bottom of the ninth with a run-producing single after Spokane tied it in the eighth on a base on balls and a home run by Jim Barber.

Portland's Lew Krausse chalked up his 10th victory but needed help from Rudy Hernandez in the second game of the doubleheader against Salt Lake City. Hector Martinez drove in two runs for the Beavers with a double and a single.

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Faltering LA Angels due for shakeup

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Manager Bill Rigney threatened to shake up his faltering Los Angeles Angels today and hinted some heads might fall unless the team snapped out of its listless playing soon.

"I don't know if our men are playing up to their capacities or are just up to their capacities," he said.

"It appears we need some new blood and we may have to do something before we leave home at the end of the week." The Angels only ended a 10-game losing streak Saturday.

As his first move, Rigney benched his hitting star, Leon Wagner, for today's afternoon clash that closed out the three-game series with the Boston Red Sox. The All-Star outfielder's average has dropped to .317, still good enough for fourth best in the American League.

Wagner failed to get a hit in either of the contests Sunday. In the first game, however, he cashed in a pair of walks for runs as the Angels capitalized on bases on balls to score a 10-8 victory. But in the second game the veteran Chet Nichols with the ninth inning help of Dick Radatz recorded a 5-0 shutout.

In the first game, Dan Olesinski took over for starter Paul Foytack in the fourth inning to snatch up the victory although he needed the help of Art Fowler in the ninth.

The Red Sox gave up five runs in the first two innings but took them back in the third when they pushed over five runs themselves, four on Lou Clinton's bases-loaded homer, his 14th home run of the season and third in five games.

But Angel second baseman Billy Moran doubled in fifth to drive home two runs and put Los Angeles ahead by one run, 7-6, and he started a three run rally in the seventh by knocking in his third run.

Those three runs provided the Angels with their margin of victory as Carl Yastrzemski hit a two-run homer in the top of the ninth before Fowler could come in to put out the fire. Earl Wilson took the loss for Boston.

Now in his fourth season with the Red Sox, Nichols had not gone more than six innings since joining Boston. But the 32-year-old veteran pitched eight shutout innings and when he put two men on base in the ninth, Radatz was ready for his 36th relief appearance and put out the fire.

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
