

Nuclear test ban talks continue jovial air

R. Kennedy to be Rights witness

Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy will take the witness stand Wednesday to testify on the administration's proposed civil rights legislation and Negro leaders in racially torn Cambridge, Md., vowed more anti-segregation demonstrations.

Kennedy will appear before the Senate Judiciary Committee, headed by Sen. James O. Eastland, D-Miss., to testify on the President's omnibus civil rights legislative program.

Mrs. Gloria Richardson, a militant Negro integration leader in Cambridge, said demonstrations in the eastern shore town would continue even if it meant the arrest of every integrationist willing to march.

Philip Savage, a field secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), promised new demonstrations today and a rally tonight.

The two leaders spoke several hours after 14 demonstrators were arrested and released by National Guardsmen, called in last week to enforce limited martial law in Cambridge. Mrs. Richardson was among those arrested and later released.

In Savannah, Ga., a racial boiling point last week, Negroes who were thwarted in a demonstration march Monday night turned to vandalism and harassment. The demonstrators, mostly youths, broke up in small groups.

Police said one group mounted an overhead railroad crossing and bombarded passing cars with rocks and bricks. They also reported that the rear windows of two automobiles had been demolished by gun fire.

A police riot squad moved into an intersection in the Negro quarter and dispersed a large crowd. Earlier in the evening two groups of Negroes, numbering about 150 persons, attempted to march from the Flamingo Club, a Negro night spot, but were stopped after about 100 yards by a barrier of local police backed by state troopers.

When city manager Arthur Mendonza asked them not to march the Negroes fell to their knees and recited the Lord's Prayer, then rose and returned to the Flamingo Club.

Authorities announced that a new 12-man riot squad will begin training today. The new unit will relieve and aid the 12-man squad which has been working almost around the clock in the port city.

Firm petitions to quit service

A Public Utilities hearing on the application of Consolidated Freightways for authority to abandon service in Central Oregon was held here today, with only one observer present as the meeting opened. He was City Manager Hal Puddy.

Later in the morning, several spectators dropped in, to listen to the proceedings, conducted by Cameron Woods, examiner for the Public Utility Commissioner. Also present was Darrell L. Wright, PUC transportation rate analyst. The hearing was in the Circuit Court Room.

Ray F. Halloran of Portland, general manager for Consolidated Freightways western area, was the principal witness for the applicant as the hearing opened. The Bend hearing was a continuance of one that opened in Burns on Monday.

Halloran testified that Consolidated, in an effort to make its Central Oregon operations pay, had in recent years engaged in a "severe austerity program," with costs cut some \$25,000 a year. But despite this move, which included the sale of the Bend terminal to Bend - Portland Truck Service, the firm has been operating in the red, Halloran said. As recently as the June 3 to 22 period of the present year, the firm, with expenses of \$6,646, showed a deficit operation of \$7.78, he said.

Soviets ask all heads of state be at UN anniversary

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI)—The Soviet Union has proposed that all heads of state and government attend the 20th anniversary session of the U.N. General Assembly in 1965, according to U.N. sources.

Tass, the Soviet news agency, confirmed the report today. The suggestion raised the possibility of a summit meeting between the major East and West powers in conjunction with the U.N. session.

The Soviet recommendation was contained in a letter from Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko handed to U.N. Secretary General Thant Monday by Nikolai Fedorenko, chief of the Soviet mission, the U.N. sources said.

Gromyko's letter was a reply to a message from Thant asking for the views of all member governments on an "international co-operation year" for 1965 voted last year by the General Assembly.

According to Tass, Gromyko also advocated nuclear-free zones separating nations of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) from Warsaw Pact countries, normalization of trade between all countries and an end to colonialism by 1965.

The General Assembly has voted to set up a 12-member committee to make plans for the 20th anniversary of the founding of the United Nations in 1945. Thant polled the 111 U.N. members on their views on the resolution.

The Soviet suggestion came at a time when East-West cordiality at the nuclear test ban talks in Moscow led to hope for a relaxation of tensions and the possibility of a top-level meeting among leaders of the major world powers.

Diplomatic sources in London said Monday that President Kennedy does not favor a summit meeting with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev and other Western leaders at this time.

MOSCOW (UPI)—Soviet and Chinese delegates today took an apparent recess from their talks on the split in the world Communist movement.

Continuing press attacks showed the split was widening. The Peking negotiating team met alone at the Chinese Embassy, Communist sources said, indicating that it was waiting for new instructions from the Chinese leadership and would not meet the Soviet ideological negotiators today.

The instructions were presumed to deal with the unprecedented attack on China published in Sunday's Pravda.

There has been no direct Chinese reply to the attack as yet, but the press and radio in Moscow and Peking today made it clear no hope of reconciliation remains in the talks.

The Soviet government newspaper Izvestia charged Monday night that Peking may be preparing to proclaim itself a rival headquarters for communism.

(Peking's People's Daily criticized Soviet aid to India and warned the Soviets they were falling into a Western trap by helping India. It charged that Russian aid totaled more than the contribution of the West during last fall's Chinese invasion of India.)

"Since the United States is asking its Allies to share the military spending of its worldwide anti-Communist operations, Washington would be only too glad if someone would help India oppose communism," it added.)

Governors may take Civil Rights stand

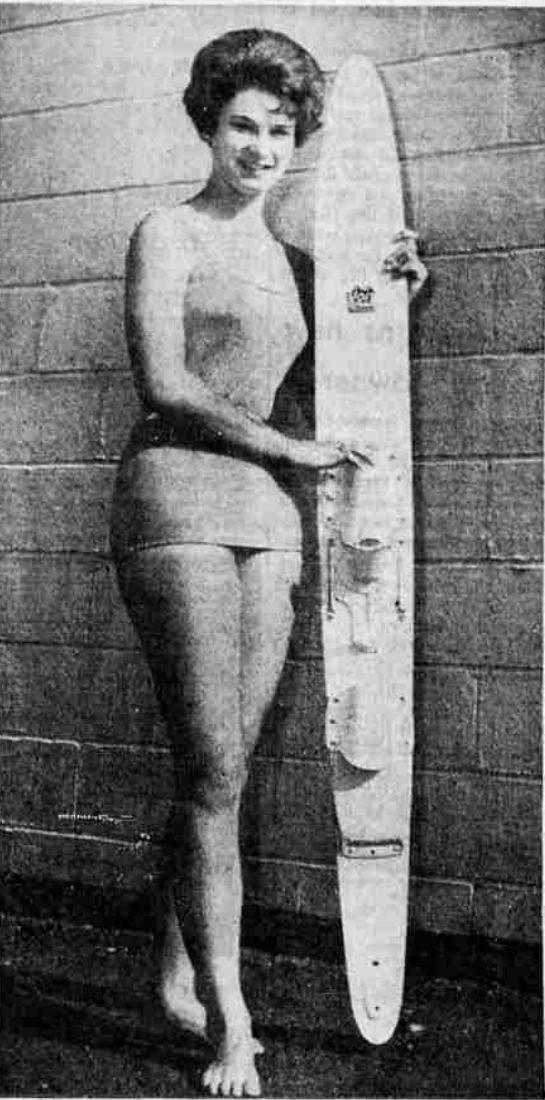
OLYMPIA, Wash. (UPI)—The question of whether the National Governors' Conference will take a strong stand on civil rights could be decided before most of the state executives get comfortable in their chairs next week at Miami Beach, the conference chairman said today.

Gov. Albert D. Rosellini of Washington, who will preside over the meeting of the nation's governors, said the critical battle will come Monday over a proposed rule change which would foredoom any effort to put the conference on record against segregation.

The proposed rule would require unanimous consent of all governors present and voting to approve a resolution.

"If it is adopted," Rosellini said, "it will mean that no controversial resolutions will be approved."

Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York has already indicated that he is opposed to the plan. Rosellini said he assumed that most of the civil rights block among the governors would also oppose it.

Defense denies Hoffa charges

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (UPI)—Federal attorneys denied Monday defense claims that they offered to "take care" of one of the defendants in the James R. Hoffa jury tampering case.

In briefs filed with District Court Judge Frank Gray, the government said it did offer, however, to protect Thomas Ewing Parks, one of the defendants, if he would testify against the Teamsters president.

The attorneys said there was nothing improper about the manner in which Hoffa and 10 others were indicted last May by a federal grand jury. They asked that defense motions seeking a dismissal of the charges or a separate trial in another city for Hoffa be dismissed.

Hoffa and the others were indicted on charges of attempting to bribe jurors and prospective jurors in Hoffa's \$1-million conspiracy trial last fall, allegedly offering \$75,000. The Teamster president could be sentenced to 25 years in prison and fined \$25,000 if convicted on all five counts.

The conspiracy case, in which Hoffa was charged with sharing an illegal payoff from a Detroit trucking firm, resulted in a mistrial last December. Two jurors and a prospective juror were dismissed during the nine-week trial and at its end, Federal Judge William E. Miller ordered the grand jury investigation.

Defense motions were filed last week and claimed that witnesses were "threatened and cajoled" by federal attorneys.

Goldwater says Rocky candidate

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The camp of Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., today viewed Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's attack on the "radical right" as notice that Rockefeller is a presidential candidate.

The New York governor's statement also was considered in some quarters as the forerunner of a stop-Goldwater movement by other presidential hopefuls in the Republican party.

A spokesman for Goldwater Monday night quoted the Arizona conservative as saying the Rockefeller statement amounted to the governor's "formal declaration of candidacy" for the GOP nomination.

Monday night's statement was Rockefeller's second attack in two days on "radical right" groups, backing Goldwater, and the double assault was interpreted by political observers as an attempt by the governor to recover lost ground in the race for the GOP nomination.

Rockefeller was believed to be in the Republican driver's seat until his recent re-marriage to a divorced woman when, suddenly, Goldwater's stock began to soar.

Sunday, the governor lashed out at the "radical right lunatic branch," warning the Republican party was in "real danger of subversion" by this group. He said the radical right was "embarked on a determined and ruthless effort to take over the party, its platform and its candidates on their own terms."

Russian UN employee, wife, win trial delay

NEW YORK (UPI)—The attorney for a Russian employee of the United Nations and his wife won a delay in their arraignment on espionage charges today in a move to establish the couple's diplomatic immunity.

Ivan Dmitriyevich Egorov, 41, a U.N. Secretariat personnel officer, and his wife, Aleksandra, 39, were indicted by a federal grand jury Monday on charges of attempting to send U.S. atomic and military secrets to Moscow. They were brought before federal Judge Jacob Mishler this morning, but attorney William Kleinman obtained adjournment of the arraignment until Aug. 20.

Kleinman told Mishler he needed at least a month to prepare motions challenging U.S. jurisdiction in the case. He said he would object to "every proceeding" in the case against the Egorovs on the grounds that Egorov was admitted to the United States on a diplomatic passport and therefore he and his wife have immunity from arrest.

The federal government has denied that the Egorovs have diplomatic immunity, a privilege usually accorded only to bona fide diplomats in foreign delegations to the United Nations. The couple was arrested at their apartment here July 2, and another couple, who used the names Robert K. and Joy Ann Garber Balch, were arrested at the same time in Washington.

The federal grand jury which indicted them revealed that the four allegedly conspired to transmit to Russia information about atomic weapons shipments, as well as rocket launching sites and other defense matters. They allegedly attempted to "cultivate and activate" armed forces personnel and defense installations employees as members of their spy ring.

In Washington, U. S. Commissioner Samuel Wirtlieb granted the Balch's another continuance to Thursday when they appeared before him for a hearing on removal to New York today.

Wirtlieb's action came after defense counsel Edward L. Genn protested that he had not had time to consult with the Balch's, especially in view of the indictments returned in New York Monday.

Kleinman went directly to the federal court hearing to the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals to argue that bail should be granted the Egorovs, who have been jailed here without bond.

Powers confab in Spiridonovka

MOSCOW (UPI)—The United States and Britain met with Russia today in the second straight day of nuclear test ban negotiations and the session once again got off to a good-humored start.

High U.S., British and Soviet officials conferred for three hours today in a meeting in the Spiridonovka Palace guest house ending at 6 p.m.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko, taking over leadership of the Soviet negotiations from Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, struck the light note during a pre-conference session in front of photographers with U.S. Undersecretary of State W. Averell Harriman and Britain's Lord Hailsham.

Someone accidentally knocked over a chair while the three delegations were posing in the meeting room in the Spiridonovka Palace guest house. Everyone in the room turned toward the chair.

A Jovial Start
"See, there is confirmation that everyone detected it," Gromyko said, in a joking reference to Soviet-Western differences over the need for inspections to police a nuclear test ban treaty that includes underground tests.

"No, it still needs inspection," said the British delegation chief. Monday's 3½ hour opening session in the Kremlin also got off to a jovial start as Khrushchev joked and bantered with the Western delegation chiefs.

Khrushchev's action in personally opening the talks and his rollicking good humor on the occasion stirred optimism among Western diplomats here that East and West might agree on a partial test ban.

Cautious optimism continued to surround the negotiations as today's meeting got underway. The Soviet press today kept up the optimistic mood by giving Monday's opening session of the three-power conference top play.

This contrasted sharply with the virtual silence of the Soviet press on the current Sino-Soviet talks that have apparently failed to heal the widening rift between Moscow and Peking.

Khrushchev joked Monday with Harriman and Hailsham during a three-and-one-half hour meeting.

Striking Contrast
His behavior was in striking contrast to the snubs and attacks against Communist China, whose delegates were holding ideological talks with a Soviet team at the same time the nuclear conference was going on.

Pravda, the Soviet Communist party newspaper, gave the nuclear talks front-page treatment today. It has made no mention of the Sino-Soviet discussions since the arrival of the Peking delegation was reported.

Diplomats who thought the Soviets might be seeking peace with the West at the expense of their former Chinese allies stressed this contrast.

Outside the nuclear conference, however, there was less warmth on the part of the Soviets. At the United Nations, the Soviet delegation charged Monday that former President Eisenhower was responsible for breaking the last moratorium on nuclear testing.

(It said Eisenhower's 1959 statement reserving the right to resume tests meant the United States "officially abandoned the moratorium.") The Soviets broke the unofficial ban by a massive test series in 1961.

Warns Against China
(In London, diplomats warned that Communist China was "certain" to ignore any test ban agreement arrived at by the Soviets and Allies. It was believed that France also would continue testing if it considered it necessary for its defense program.)

A brief communique issued after Monday's negotiating session said the talks would continue today under Gromyko but had little information on what was achieved.

The United States and Britain seek a treaty banning all tests, provided the Soviets are willing to agree to adequate inspection for suspected underground tests. Failing this, they want a partial ban on tests in the atmosphere, outer space, and under water. These tests can be checked on by each nation without on the spot inspectors.

Medford widow tells court of murder, rape

RENO, Nev. (UPI)—A pretty 24-year-old widow Monday described how her husband was shot to death and she was raped twice by Lester E. Morford III, 19, who is on trial for his life.

Mrs. Patricia Foster of Medford, Ore., testified she and her husband of two days, Jack Foster, 23, were kidnapped early Aug. 22 from their Reno motel.

She said that Morford, an itinerant ranch worker whose parents live in Santa Rosa, Calif., forced them at gunpoint to drive to Truckee, Calif., and then up to Lake Tahoe.

At a wide place in the road, Morford ordered Foster to pull over. The defendant then tied Foster's hands to the steering wheel.

Morford smoked for a while, according to Mrs. Foster, and then without any warning reached across and shot her husband in the head.

The defendant then dumped the body of Foster by the road and drove off.

Circulating this week Chamber petitions favor 'parking'

Petitions will be circulated this week by Bend Chamber of Commerce members seeking signatures in favor of a downtown parking district.

This was decided at a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce parking committee last night at the C of C office. The parking district will be the same as outlined 10 days ago by Chamber officials, calling for purchase of three downtown properties to use for offstreet parking.

The committee last night rejected a plan by Darrell Liska, downtown merchant. Liska's plan would have substituted angle parking and a one-way grid for off street parking.

After hearing Liska present his plan, committee members generally praised it and said that it might be worked into a long range Bend plan in the future.

But they felt that it was too late and didn't provide an immediate answer to downtown parking problems.

Chamber of Commerce President Gordon Randall presided at the meeting in the absence of committee chairman Ray LeBlanc.

Others in attendance were Rolfe Reinhardt, Bill Healy, Al Erikson, Frank Loggan, Police Chief Emil Moon, Dick Brandis, City Manager Hal Puddy, Chet Corvill, Len Standifer, and Bob Menzies.

Moen and Puddy explained that Greenwood and Wall Streets are classed as state highways and are maintained by the state. It is doubtful, they said, if the state would allow angle parking on those streets, as called for in Liska's plan.

Members were told that the state considers angle parking more dangerous than parallel parking. Angle parking also slows traffic in one-way streets, Moen said.

Brandis said that the downtown area needs off street parking as soon as possible. He said that Liska's plan was worth study and might be incorporated into a long range plan for parking in Bend in the future.

The Chamber plans to circulate petitions urging that the city purchase property at the corner of Wall and Oregon, Bond and Minnesota and the Bancroft hotel. These properties will provide an added 125 parking spaces in the core area.

Estimated cost of land purchase and renovation is \$312,500. Downtown property owners will pay for the parking.

President Randall said he did not want anything to "delay this parking project." He said, "if we stall around and wait five more years, we will lose some of our biggest downtown stores. In addition, off street parking in five years will cost 20 or 30 per cent more than it does now if the past five years are any indication."

Standifer asked what Bend would lose in assessed valuation if the proposed three buildings were taken out of the core area. City Manager Hal Puddy said it would be about \$50,000 out of \$13,500,000 or "almost nothing."

It was pointed out that in Portland, valuation has dropped 5 per cent per year in the core area because of outlying competition and lack of parking. "If this happens to Bend, then all the taxpayers will suffer because property taxes will simply have to be raised in the residential areas," Randall said.

He labeled the proposed chamber plan "Core Area Conservation Plan" that will help provide more services to people who shop in downtown Bend.

COP FACES CHARGES
MEDFORD (UPI)—A 26-year-old Medford city police officer is being held in Jackson County jail on a charge of statutory rape with bail set at \$5,000.
