### Commissioners hear traffic safety expert

A visiting traffic-safety expert Monday told city commissioners that Bend in 1962 had fewer auto accidents than in 1961, but more injuries. Presenting a compilation of figures on local traffic mishaps was Mrs. Vinita Howard, informational representative of the Oregon Traffic Safety Commission. Pointing out that in 1962 some \$500,000 was lost to the city in expenses resulting from accidents involving Bend residents, she urged the establishment of a citizens' safety council, and made other recommendations. The Bend area, Mrs. Howard said, appeared to be most in need of an active organization for traffic improvement. Her suggestion was for an independent council composed of from 35 to 100 members representing civic and service clubs and local industries. Bend for several years had such a committee but it is now defunct. In summarizing her figures, Mrs. Howard complimented the city's traffic engineering and traffic court programs, but suggested greater progress could be made in such areas as school and public traffic safety education. She also advised that more traffic offenders should appear in court, rather than merely post bail for their offenses.

### 'Don Juan in Hell' well received by play audience

Bill Bowers is well cast as the eloquent Don Juan, and George Tadevic is a smooth and philosophical devil, Shirley Snively is poised as the aristocratic Ana, the eternal mother type who defends her conception of manners and morals. Bryant Hilliard, the commander, gets many of the laughs as the military statue, riding a hobby horse. Appearing competently in opening scenes is Jan Mouser, as the old woman. The play is recommended for an evening that is both entertaining and intellectually stimulating. Relaxing summer theater, it provides a refreshing change of pace. Characters in the abstract dream sequence mouth some of the best observations of the pithy English playwright, the late George Bernard Shaw. Controversial subjects that have made for good conversation through the ages are discussed with a candor that was considerably more shocking when the play was written than it is today. Politics, war, religion and man's questionable superiority over the other animals are targets of Shaw's expert needling. Coming in for only slightly less pointed stabs are many traditional institutions and philanthropies. Marriage, government, patriotism, virtue, wealth, prestige, power — all these and more are ribbed glibly, often cleverly. Emotions such as fear, love, hate, loyalty, jealousy and pride are scrutinized in the manner of modern psychologists.
