

Court of Appeals made unusual move in vote order

The U.S. Court of Appeals acted with an unusual degree of urgency in ordering a Mississippi voting registrar to put 45 Negroes on the registration list and to stop discriminating against other Negroes who want to vote.

The appeals court—with judges from Texas, Louisiana and Georgia acting unanimously — told Forrest County (Hattiesburg) registrar Theodor Lynd Monday to comply with its orders within 10 days or face a trip to prison. Other phases of his case are pending.

It is highly unusual for a federal court specifically to order individuals to be registered for voting. In the only recent case like it, a U.S. court handed down a similar order for a larger group of Negro registrants in Montgomery, Ala.

WPPSS carries Snake Dam battle to SEC

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Washington Public Power Supply System carried its battle to block private construction of a dam on the middle Snake River to the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) Tuesday.

Attorneys charged in a brief filed with the SEC that Northwest Power Co. was seeking "blanket exemption" from regulation by the commission.

The company—formed by Washington Water Power, Pacific Power & Light, Montana Power and Portland General Electric—plans to build the High Mountain Sheep Dam between Oregon and Idaho.

The WPPSS opposed the application and asked to build the Nez Perce Dam farther downstream or, failing that, to build the High Mountain Sheep Dam. A Federal Power Commission examiner ruled in favor of the private plan and the case is now before the full commission.

Torrential rains douse Chicago

Torrential rains struck Chicago's southern and western suburbs early Tuesday during a night of harsh thunderstorms in the Lake Michigan area and the southern plains.

Lightning and thunder filled the Chicago skies and rainfall was heaviest from Dolton to the southside to Joliet to the southwest and as far west as Rockford, Ill.

A funnel cloud was spotted in suburban Tinley Park but it apparently did not touch the ground. At least 1.45 inches of rain had fallen midway through the night.

Some streets on the south side were flooded and power was knocked out in some areas. However, police said damage was negligible.

Heavy rain and large hail also struck east of Liberal, Kan. Columbus, Miss., got 1.45 inches of rain during a thunderstorm and Greenwood, Miss., received 1.16 inches during an afternoon storm Monday.

U.S., Canada will have some warning

WASHINGTON (UPI) — North America will still have "acceptable" warning of enemy attack after 28 of the 66 radar stations in the Distant Early Warning (DEW) line are shut down.

The United States and Canada gave this assurance Monday while announcing the station closings as "certain adjustments... in the equipment configuration."

The United States had recommended the move to Canada after a reappraisal of the DEW line's effectiveness.

The stations were understood to be "gap fillers," or those assigned to detect aircraft at lower levels. They operate between the main stations with big, rotating radar scanners which cover a long range and high altitudes.

Soviets may, may not try putting man on the moon

MANCHESTER, England (UPI) — Sir Bernard Lovell, director of the Jodrell Bank Radio Astronomy Station, said Tuesday Soviet scientists are debating whether it is worthwhile to proceed with a program to put a man on the moon.

Lovell said Mstislav Keldysh, president of the Soviet Academy of Sciences, planned to raise the question of getting international agreement about the comparative value of concentrating on getting a man to the moon or obtaining information by instruments.

The British scientist gave his impressions to newsmen after a three-week visit to the Soviet Union where he visited observatories and met top Russian scientists.

Lovell said the Soviets hope to be operating an optical telescope from a space platform orbiting the earth and manned by scientists within five years.

But he told newsmen he had revised his opinions about Soviet intentions in their space program. He said Russian scientists were discussing whether it was worthwhile for man to attempt a voyage to the moon.

Lovell said the Soviet scientists felt they could obtain 90 per cent of the information they wanted about the moon with instruments before they could solve all the problems of getting a man to the moon and back.

One of 59 who defied Cuba travel ban, dead

KEY WEST, Fla. (UPI) — The body of an American artist who drowned on an illegal junket to Cuba was to be picked up from the U.S. naval station here today by a funeral director for shipment to Brooklyn, N.Y.

A Cuban Britannia airliner brought the remains of Hector Warren Hill, 29, of Brooklyn, here Tuesday from Havana.

Newsmen were not allowed at the naval station to see the plane land, but Key West funeral director F. A. Johnson Jr. said federal authorities told him the plane had landed and Hill's body taken to the U.S. Naval Hospital. He said he would pick up the body today.

Hill was one of 59 Americans who defied a State Department ban on travel to Cuba and visited Cuba as guests of the Castro government. He drowned Sunday in a Santiago, Cuba motel swimming pool.

FBI ordered to stop heckling Chicago hood

CHICAGO (UPI) — A federal judge Tuesday ordered the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) to stop its "harassment" of Sam (Mooney) Giancana, reputed boss of the Chicago Crime Syndicate.

Federal District Court Judge Richard B. Austin also placed Marlin W. Johnson, chief FBI agent in Chicago, in contempt of court for refusing on orders from Washington to answer questions in court.

Giancana, an international playboy who is reputed to have direct control over vice and gambling in Chicago, was in court as he won his victory over the FBI.

His saturnine face was dour as the judge began speaking, but it brightened steadily as Austin laced into the FBI for its "rough shadowing" techniques and refusal to withdraw a small corps of agents from around the mobster's suburban home.

"I know there are some not interested in civil rights and not concerned with privacy who will in the future approve of this type of harassment," Austin said. "I cannot give my sanction. This conduct, if it were by a private citizen, would be actionable in court."

In a preliminary injunction, Austin even spelled out how close the FBI can get to Giancana on the golf course.

Giancana had complained that a foursome of FBI agents dogged his heels whenever he went onto the links. Austin said the FBI golfers would have to let another foursome intervene between them and Giancana.

Guerrillas wound 14 Americans

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI) — Fourteen American soldiers were wounded Tuesday night, three of them seriously, in an attack by Communist guerrillas, it was reported today.

The Americans, members of a U.S. special forces unit, were not identified pending notification of their relatives. Two South Vietnamese soldiers also were wounded.

The Communists struck just before midnight near Can Tho airfield south of Saigon, firing 16 to 20 rounds from a mortar into a camp where the U.S. and Vietnamese troops were staying.
