

Dodgers split with Phils, so do Giants

Willie McCovey is closing in on a National League home run record and there'll be no asterisk alongside his name if he makes it. The free-swinging San Francisco Giant outfielder hit his 27th and 28th homers of the season Tuesday night when the Giants split a pair of 3-2 decisions with the Pittsburgh Pirates. The two blows gave him a total of 10 for the month—only six fewer than the NL mark set in 1949 by Ralph Kiner of the Pirates.

Kiner's mark doesn't have the prestige of Babe Ruth's 60 in 1927 so there won't be any national uproar to disturb Willie's comic-book reading. Baseball's poobahs put an asterisk alongside Roger Maris' name when he hit 61 homers in 1961 on the grounds the season was longer than when Ruth set his record in 1927. But as far as anyone knows nobody in baseball has suggested that the month of July is longer now than it used to be.

It only seems longer to NL pitchers, who have been coping with McCovey during his current rampage. The big guy has hammered away at a 322-chip since June 20 and has lifted his season average to .281.

McCovey's 27th homer came in the ninth inning of Tuesday night's opener and gave the Giants their victory. Willie also homered in the first inning of the nightcap and had a second hit during the game but the Pirates earned the split on the strength of a nine-hit attack that included two triples by Dick Schofield, one by Bill Virdon and doubles by Roberto Clemente and Bill Mazeroski.

McCovey has now hit safely in 21 straight games during which he has hit 14 homers and drove in 24 runs.

The Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 5-2, before suffering a 10-2 loss. The St. Louis Cardinals nipped the Cincinnati Reds, 5-4, in 10 innings, the Chicago Cubs defeated the Milwaukee Braves, 1-0, and the New York Mets topped the Houston Colts, 4-3, in other NL games.

In the American League, Washington downed Chicago, 3-1. Baltimore defeated Detroit, 3-2. Kansas City routed Boston, 11-0, and Los Angeles scored a 2-1 victory over Cleveland.

Sandy Koufax pitched a perfect game for six innings and wound up with a six-hitter that earned him his ninth straight victory and his 16th of the season. Wally Moon's homer, a single by John Roseboro and a double by Jim Gilliam were the big blows of the Dodgers' 12-hit attack.

Dallas Green pitched an eight-hitter in the second game as John Callison hit two homers and Tony Taylor and Roy Sivers had two hits for the Phillies.

Chukar season opens Sept. 7; bag limit raised one

PORTLAND (UPI) — The State Game Commission made few changes in 1963 hunting regulations for doves, pigeons, grouse, chukar and Hungarian partridge at a meeting Tuesday.

The bag limit on chukars and Huns was increased from six to eight daily and from 12 to 16 in possession. The season will open Sept. 7 and close at a date to be set later.

The season on mourning doves and band-tailed pigeons will be Sept. 1-30. Bag limit for pigeons will be eight daily and one same number in possession. The bag limit on doves is 10 daily and 20 in possession.

The season on blue and ruffed grouse will be Sept. 7-23 in Eastern Oregon and Sept. 1-7 west of the Cascades. Bag limit again will be three daily and six in possession.

The commission eliminated sage grouse hunting in Lake County this year and cut the big limit to two daily and two in possession. It had been two and four, but wildlife officials said the number of birds was lower this season. Hunting will be allowed in Harney County and that part of Malheur south of U.S. Highway 30.

The commission also set the hunting season for silver grey squirrels Sept. 1-Oct. 31 in southwest Oregon. The bag limit was

cut from five to four daily and in possession.

The season is open all year in northwest Oregon and there is no bag limit.

Work started on park route

PRINEVILLE — Work has begun at long last on the two-mile access road which will lead to a large new county park site on the north shore of the Prineville reservoir, according to county judge Ervin Grimes.

Construction of the road, and the ensuing development of the county park, will allow a greatly increased number of recreationists to find facilities at the lake shore. The only park for the two seasons since the lake was formed has been the state park some 17 miles southeast of Prineville.

In recent weeks the state park has literally burst at the seams with campers and fishermen, and many have set up camps at various places along the ten-mile lake margin without sanitary facilities or access to pure drinking water.

Entrance to the county park is to be about a half-mile from the entrance to the state park, Judge Grimes said. The road will run east on a slope above the state park to a level area at the lake side of 150-200 acres, extending along about a mile of shore line.

Construction of facilities for a major recreation area at the county park will be leased to some private individual, Judge Grimes said.

"Our men and women came here to compete as a team and I will be happy to have the victory fought on a combined basis," said Jordan, the U.S. men's coach. The statement apparently surprised other officials accompanying the American team.

Dan Farris, retired secretary of the Amateur Athletic Union, was quick to point out that Jordan was not an official spokesman and his statement did not signify an official change of policy, which currently states that the men's and women's meets be scored separately.

The separate scoring system is woven into the fine print of the current Soviet-American agreement covering the annual meet of the two track and field giants.

The trouble stems from the fact that the Soviet press has always combined the men's and women's score in their reporting and claimed overall victory on the basis of total points. In the forthcoming meet, to be held at Lenin Stadium this weekend, the American men are again expected to win, but the Soviet women are favored to run up a larger score over the American girls, thereby giving Russia another "overall" victory should the scores be combined.

"Anybody can add the two together if they want to, but the team victory will not depend on the combined basis," commented Ferris.
