High marks set by area cows

Cows on standard Dairy Herd Improvement Association test in Central Oregon celebrated June Dairy Month by producing 1,254,710 pounds of milk, with 1,200 cows from 23 herds in Central Oregon on standard test, reports Gail Swanson and Mrs. Helen Livingston, Central Oregon supervisors.

In addition there were eight herds with 103 cows testing under the owner-sampler plan during the month.

Roy Burk's herd from north Redmond led the Association milk production with an average per cow for the month of 1,357 pounds. His herd was followed closely by the 120 cow herd of Walter Smead of Bend with an average monthly production of 1,310 pounds of milk. Jim Reeder's herd of 24 cows located also in the north Redmond area averaged 1,233 pounds of milk per cow in June. Cows completing a years production of 305 days making the State Honor Roll included: two Holsteins from the Walter Smead herd of Bend, four Holsteins from the Bertil Nelson herd near Bend, three Holsteins from the Oswald Hanson herd, Bend, one from the Carl Robertson herd, Bend, and one from the D. J. Ward herd, Bend; five Holsteins from the Sunny Butte Ranch of Bend, one registered Guernsey and one registered Holstein from the Lawrence Allen herd of Bend.

Top producers among this group were "Mirandy," a four year old grade Holstein from the Nelson herd, who completed the 305 day lactation period with 18,400 pounds of milk and 691 pounds of butterfat. Another cow from the same herd, a four year old grade Holstein averaged 17,650 pounds of milk and 650 pounds of butterfat.

Klamath Falls firm gets road construction bid

A contract for construction of campground roads at Miller Lake has been awarded to W. D. Miller Construction Company of Klamath Falls, it was announced today by Forest officials. The contract to Miller was awarded for an amount of \$20,602.38. The road construction job at Miller Lake consists of clearing and grubbing of approach roads, loops and parking areas for a campground on the southwest shore at what is known as Digt Point. The camp construction is being undertaken in stages, with the road development being the first improvement to be installed.

Forest officials indicate they are hopeful that construction work can proceed next season to provide a completed camp facility.

Miller Lake is near the northwest corner of the Winema Forest, approximately ten miles west of Chemult, and is accessible from Highway 97 on the first road north of the Chemult Ranger Station.
