

Yankees win, stay 6 games in front

When in doubt, decide in favor of youth.

That's been manager Ralph Houk's policy since he became manager of the New York Yankees in 1961 and it has paid off dramatically in the cases of pitcher Jim Bouton and first baseman Joe Pepitone.

The ultimate payoff, barring a spectacular uprising by some American League contender, looks like a romp to Houk's third straight pennant.

In May, 1962, Houk was faced with a choice between veteran Robin Roberts and Bouton. He decided in favor of Bouton. And last winter Houk approved the trade of veteran Bill Skowron on the grounds that he had 22-year-old Pepitone waiting in the wings.

Both moves have paid off handsomely. Bouton has developed into a 12-game winner this season while Pepitone is hitting .288 with 13 homers. Roberts is below .500 with the Orioles and Skowron is batting .217 for the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Pitched Seven-Hitter

Bouton pitched a seven-hitter and struck out eight and Pepitone had a homer and a single when the Yankees whipped the Minnesota Twins, 4-0, Wednesday night before a crowd of 42,034 — the largest ever to see a baseball game in Minnesota. The loss dropped the pennant-hopeful Twins 7½ games behind the front-running world champions.

The Chicago White Sox beat the Washington Senators 8-2, the Detroit Tigers routed the Baltimore Orioles, 9-1, the Kansas City Athletics whipped the Boston Red Sox, 8-1, and the Los Angeles Angels topped the Cleveland Indians, 7-2 and 1-0, in other American League games.

In the National League, Los Angeles nipped Pittsburgh, 3-2, New York downed San Francisco, 9-7, St. Louis beat Cincinnati, 3-1, Milwaukee defeated Chicago, 6-4, and Philadelphia shamed Houston, 10-9.

Ron Hansen hit a two-run homer and Jim Landis had three hits to lead a 14-hit White Sox attack that enabled Dave DeBusschere to win his first big league game. Hoyt Wilhelm shut out the Senators for the last two innings to preserve the rookie's win.

Hit Grand Slammer

Gus Triandos' sixth grand slam homer of his career was the big blow for the Tigers as Hank Aguirre pitched a five-hitter for his eighth triumph. Steve Barber was tagged for three runs and seven hits in five innings and suffered his seventh defeat against 12 victories.

Charlie Lau's three-run homer in the first inning and George Alusik's grand slammer in the eighth paved the way for Kansas City's Dave Segui to win his fifth game with the ninth-inning relief aid of Johnny Wyatt. Dick Stuart had two hits for the Red Sox.

Dean Chance pitched an eight-hitter in the first game and Paul Foytack and Art Fowler combined in a four-hitter in the nightcap as the Angels swept the Indians. Leon Wagner and Charley Dees paced the Angels' 14-hit attack in the opener with three hits each. The Angels scored the only run of the nightcap in the fifth inning on Hank Foiles' triple and Jack Kralick's wild pitch.

Pennel looks to 17 feet

MOSCOW (UPI) — Pole vaulter John Pennel of Northeast Louisiana State, who has already established himself as one of the most sensational "substitutes" in track and field history, is not one to be satisfied with a world's record.

Pennel, a 5-foot 10-inch native of Coral Gables, Fla., shattered the world record with a vault of 16 feet, 8¾ inches just three days after being selected as a replacement for the injured Brian Sternberg on the American team that duels Russia this weekend.

But Pennel has given every indication that he will be out to break the 17-foot barrier in the upcoming meet. In Wednesday's workouts, Pennel was the feature attraction as he easily cleared 16 feet, 3 inches before an admiring group of both American and Russian athletes. He has already vaulted 16-11 in practice sessions elsewhere.

Another American tabbed a "certain" winner by the experts, Hayes Jones of Detroit, appeared in top form in Wednesday's drill. Jones currently holds several world indoor records for the high hurdles.

Heavy hitting and high scoring were the rule in two of three Little League games played Wednesday night.

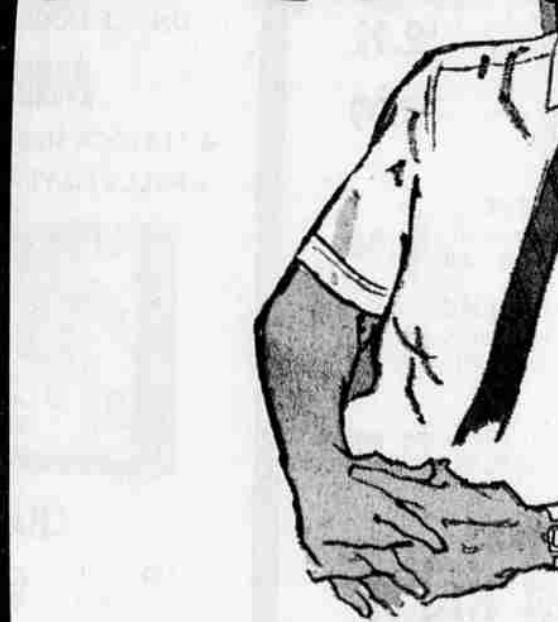

Trainer says Floyd will be 'red hot'

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) — Floyd Patterson will shadow-box in his dressing room next Monday night and come out "red hot" for his return heavyweight title fight with champion Sonny Liston at the Las Vegas Convention Center.

"He'll shadow-box four rounds after I wake him up from his dressing-room nap," co-trainer Buster Watson said today. "He'll go into that ring red hot instead of cold fish like he was at Chicago."

Watson of New York, long-time buddy of the ex-champion, said Floyd was caught "cold" by big Sonny at Chicago, Sept. 25, and knocked out at 2:06 of the first round because he had taken only about 30 or 40 seconds of light exercise in the dressing room.

Meanwhile Liston, in his final sparring session at the Thunderbird Hotel, appeared so impressive in three rounds with mediocre Fomeda Cox of St. Louis, that Billy Conn of Pittsburgh, former light heavyweight champion and heavyweight challenger, predicted:

"Liston will knock out Patterson in the first round again—maybe quicker than at Chicago." But when asked how Liston would have fared with ex-champ Joe Louis when bomber Joe was champion, Conn said: "Louis would have knocked his brains out. Louis was too fast with his hands for Sonny."

In very light wagering, Liston continued the 4-1 favorite.

FOUR CARDS SIGN

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — Four veteran members of the St. Louis Cardinals signed Wednesday for the 1963 National Football League season. They were defensive backs Billy Stacy and Larry Wilson, center Bob Demarco and offensive guard Ken Gray.

Golfers who wish to enter must post a qualifying medal score over 18 holes no later than next Thursday evening.

Defending Champion Owen Panner, who has won the title 11 of the last 12 years, is the only golfer exempt from qualifying.

Last year, Panner defeated Des Curry in the finals to regain the title he had previously held for ten consecutive years. He lost his crown in 1961 when he was defeated by Mickey Sullivan in the first round of the annual tournament. The title was eventually won in 1961 by Glenn Cushman. Cushman did not defend his crown last year but will return for a crack at this year's play.

Following qualifying, matches will be played on a flight basis. Officials said that one match must be played each week. Trophies and awards will be made at a dinner meeting in late September at the club house.

Curry, runnerup in both 1961 and '62, will be one of the favorites this year along with Panner.

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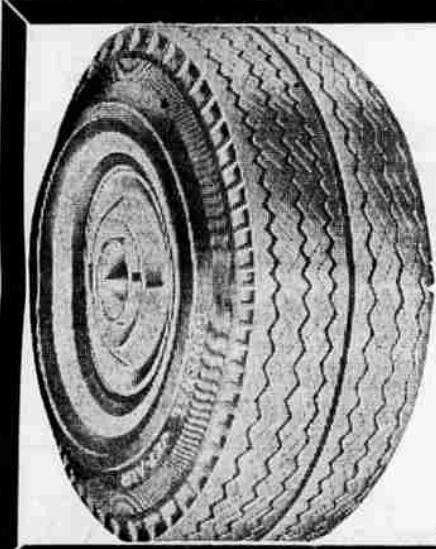
