

Palmer plans three changes

DALLAS (UPI) — Arnold Palmer, noted for his charging on the fairways, changed his tactics today as he began his bid for the PGA, the only major golf championship he never has won.

Due to tee off at 1:06 p.m. (CST) when the searing Texas heat is usually at its blistering worst, Palmer planned three changes in his game.

Because he has been driving poorly, he is going to try his No. 1 iron and his No. 3 wood off the tee whenever possible; because of the heat he is going to walk slowly between shots, and be-

cause of the big greens on the DAC Country Club course he planned on lagging his putts.

"You are going to have to be careful on the greens here or you are going to wind up with a lot of three-putt greens," Palmer predicted. "So when I leave myself long putts, I'm going to concentrate on lagging the first putt up there in the hope I'll leave myself a short second."

As for giving up on his driver, he hoped that his one iron and three wood would give him more accuracy.

"You are going to get hurt

here if you don't keep your drives on the fairway because of the heavy rough," he said.

This is Palmer's sixth try for the PGA title. The closest he has come was in 1961 when he tied for fifth.

Palmer, U. S. Open champion Julius Boros, Masters champion Jack Nicklaus and the PGA defending titleholder, Gary Player, were rated as the players to beat in this 45th annual tournament for the nation's golf professionals.

But at least a dozen others in the 167-man field were rated as good bets — including big George

Bayer, Tony Lema, Mike Sou-chak, Don January, Phil Rodgers, British Open champion Bob Charles and Bo Wininger.

Except for the heavy rough on the 7,046-yard course with its par of 36-35-71, the golfers found the DAC layout to their liking.

The field starts teeing off at 7 a.m. with Ed Whalley of Newton Centre, Mass., hitting the first ball. The last threesome will tee off at 3 p.m. After Friday's second round, the field will be cut to the low 75 and ties for the final two rounds of play on Saturday and Sunday.

NEW YORK (UPI) — The New York football Giants, who regard old age as a virtue and experience as a professional necessity, are counting on a knee operation this past spring to restore the greatness to aging halfback Hugh McElhenny.

McElhenny, 34, was acquired by the Giants from the Minnesota

Vikings Wednesday in exchange for two future draft choices and a player to be determined prior to the start of the 1963 National Football League season.

fore joining the new Minnesota franchise in 1961.

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Legion team readies for district play

Bend's American Legion baseball team will play The Dalles in the first step on the long road to defending their Area 1 baseball championship this Saturday and Sunday at The Dalles.

Bend finished the season with a 14-23 won-loss record this year and will go into the best-of-three series with The Dalles in the role of underdog, even though Bend has come out on top in the only game that the two teams played this year.

Bend beat The Dalles by a score of 5-1 several weeks ago at a tournament in Roseburg.

Last year, Bend took the three game series for the district title against the same The Dalles team by winning the last two games by 17-0 and 9-2 scores after dropping the first game 7-2.

Eastern Oregon is divided into four leagues which make up Area 1. This year the two southern most leagues travel to their northern neighbors' home fields for playoff action. The winners of the two district crowns will then decide the Area championship on the eastern-most home field.

This means that Bend will travel north to play The Dalles and, if they win there, travel to the east to play the winner of the district winner in the extreme east of the state, with Pendleton favored to take those honors. The procedure will be reversed next year.

Bend coach Bill Bauer has not named his starting pitchers for the series but indicated that Bill Bauer and Paul Wardlaw may see action Saturday while Darold Parsons, Mike Metke, and Bob Warrington will be ready for Sunday's games.

First game of the series will be Saturday at 8:30 p.m. with the second game Sunday at 1:30 p.m. and the third game, if necessary, at 8:30 p.m. Sunday.

New pro hockey league formed

CHICAGO (UPI) — Formation of a new professional hockey league to serve as a farm system for the National Hockey League was announced today by the NHL's board of governors.

Cities represented in the new league, which will start operations this October, were St. Louis, Minneapolis, St. Paul, Omaha, Indianapolis and Tulsa, Tulsa, however, will not begin competition until the 1964-65 season until a new arena under construction is completed.

St. Louis will be the farm team of the Chicago Black Hawks, St. Paul will be affiliated with the New York Rangers, Minneapolis with the Boston Bruins, Omaha with the Montreal Canadiens, Indianapolis with the Detroit Red Wings, and Tulsa with the Toronto Maple Leafs.

The new league, to be called the Central Professional Hockey League, supplants the Eastern Hockey League which operated last year with franchises originally at Syracuse, N.Y., Sudbury, Kingston and Hamilton, Ont.

Flanker Mitchell signs 'Skin pact'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The second half of the Washington Redskins' bomb-throwing battery signed his 1963 contract today.

Flanker Bobby Mitchell, who led the National Football League in receptions last year, signed for a reported \$20,000. The Redskins announced quarterback Norman Sneed's signing Tuesday.

Mitchell caught 72 passes in 1962 for 1,384 yards and 11 touchdowns. Injuries slowed him down in the latter part of the season but coach Bill McPeak said he expects the fleet back to have a better year this fall.

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — General manager Fred Haney of the Los Angeles Angels today sought to bolster the young American League club by making a seven-player shift that included the outright release of veteran pitcher Bob Turley.

Haney held off his announcement until after the Angels had swept a twilight doubleheader with the Cleveland Indians and posted their fifth win in seven games Wednesday night.

Turley, obtained by the Angels as a free agent, had won two games while losing seven, but most observers felt that with a little luck he might have won three or four more.

McCovey still hitting but Giants lose

NEW YORK (UPI) — The San Francisco Giants keep falling apart, but Willie McCovey keeps hitting his way to possible records in the National League.

The lanky McCovey did his best again Wednesday, but the lowly New York Mets took a 9-7 decision in the 11th inning on one of the Giants' specialties — the home run.

Joe Hicks, who came to the Mets last week from the minor leagues, slammed one of Don Larsen's pitches out of the Polo Grounds to give the Mets the victory and hand the Giants their eighth loss in 10 games.

Meanwhile McCovey, who has been a one-man team for the Giants recently, hit safely in his 22nd straight game to equal a San Francisco club record which he established in 1959.

McCovey got the Giants off on the right foot in the first inning with a single that scored Harvey Kuenn and then bashed his 29th homer of the season in the fifth frame.

It was the 11th home run of the month for the big left fielder, who is now just five short of Ralph Kiner's National League record of 16 in one month.

McKinley is pushed but wins Clay Courts test

CHICAGO (UPI) — Top-seeded Chuck McKinley advanced Wednesday to the quarterfinals of the National Clay Courts tennis championships at River Forest in his closest match since before his Wimbledon triumph.

Occasionally shouting and blasting his ball high in the air, the chunky, spirited McKinley from St. Louis, was forced to three sets in defeating Jerry Moss of Miami, 6-3, 4-6, 6-4.

It was the first time McKinley had dropped a set since before his singles championship at Wimbledon.

In the other top match of the day, Ronald Barnes of Brazil, the tourney's top foreign seed, eliminated eighth seeded Arthur Ashe, Los Angeles, the nation's highest ranking Negro player, 10-8, 6-2.

There were no women's singles matches Wednesday.

In other top matches, in men's singles, second seeded Dennis Ralston, Bakersfield, Calif., ousted the second seeded foreigner, Ian Crookenden of New Zealand, 6-3, 6-2.

Edward Newman, San Antonio, Tex., defeated the No. 3 seeded foreign player, Eduardo Zuleta, of Ecuador, 6-4, 7-5.

The top-seeded men's doubles team of McKinley and Ralston defeated William Timm, Peoria, Ill., and Lex Wood, South Africa, 6-4, 6-2.

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
