"I wanted to be sociable, but I'm no drinker."

Miss Winters, attending a film festival in the Soviet capital, said she became ill Wednesday morning in her hotel room. "I called a maid and in no time three very handsome Russian doctors walked in and they looked like they were ready to operate," she said. "I got scared and called the American Embassy after the doctors advised me to go to the hospital. The embassy was no help. They said I should go."

Forest ticket venders working

First operation of ticket vending machines on the Deschutes National Forest was reported by forest officials to be "going smoothly."

These ticket vending machines for collection of service fees will be operated this summer at seven different campgrounds on the Deschutes forest.

The seven sites include 335 family camping units. Picnicking, boat launching, and other day-use activities at these sites remain free of charge.

There are 35 camping units now in use at Link Creek, adjacent to Suttle Lake, and 22 at Blue Bay, also adjacent to the lake.

There will be 277 units at East and Paulina lakes. Charging for overnight camping went into effect at Suttle Lake on July 7, and will become effective at East and Paulina lakes on August 2.

Ticket vending machines are also being installed in other forests of the Pacific Northwest.

Simpson timber men confab with unions

Negotiators for Simpson Timber Co. met with two labor unions in Portland today amid unconfirmed reports that an agreement was near.

James Farmer, chief negotiator for the big independent firm, reported some progress at the last session Tuesday.

Today, the Portland Oregonian newspaper quoted an unnamed "reliable source" as saying the two sides would agree on a contract calling for a wage increase of 32 to 35 cents an hour over three years. That would be about eight cents more than the company's last offer.

The International Woodworkers of America originally demanded 40 cents and the Lumber and Sawmill Workers 60 cents.

Simpson officials met at 8 a.m. and then went into a meeting with the union negotiators about two hours later.

A dispute over a new contract in the Douglas Fir belt to replace one which expired June 1 already has idled more than 25,000 workers in Oregon, Washington, Northern California and Montana.

There was no further spread of the strike against Georgia-Pacific Corp. today. All its plants have been closed except a pine mill at Pilot Rock, Ore., and logging operations and mills at Woodleaf and Feather Falls, Calif.

Over 19,000 criminal cases

WASHINGTON (UPI) — There were 19,028 total criminal offenses in Oregon in 1962, according to the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Uniform Crime Report, released today.

The FBI listed 54 murders or non-negligent manslaughters for the year, 174 rapes, 714 robberies, 519 cases of aggravated assault, 8,268 burglaries, 6,553 cases of larceny over \$50, and 2,764 cases of auto theft.

The FBI listed 11,430 offenses in Portland and its four surrounding counties, including Clark County, Wash. The total includes 30 cases of murder or non-negligent manslaughter, 79 cases of forcible rape, 560 robberies, 239 aggravated assaults, 5,015 burglaries, 3,808 cases of larceny over \$50, and 1,699 auto thefts.

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Climber gets 'copter rescue

JACKSON, Wyo. (UPI) — An injured 18-year-old mountain climber from Grandview, Wash., was rescued by helicopter early today from 13,766-foot Grand Teton Peak.

The climber, David Wycoff, was injured Thursday when he was struck by falling rocks at about the 12,600-foot level on the majestic peak in Grand Teton National Park. A ground party moved him to the lower saddle at an elevation of 11,500 feet, where helicopter pilot Jerry Noland of Greybull, Wyo., snatched him up this morning.

National Park Service authorities said the youth was believed to have suffered a compressed skull fracture.

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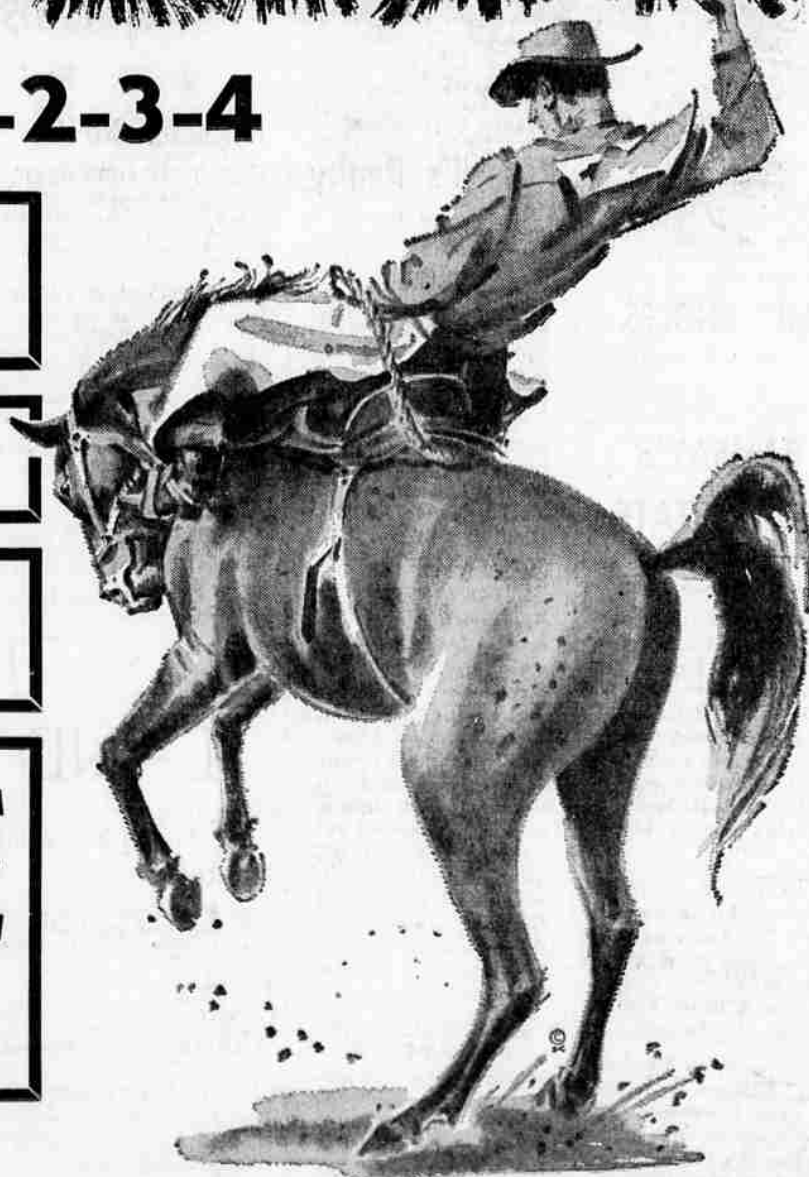
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
