

Trout angling said fair in Central area

Angling in Central Oregon continues in the summer doldrums... which means fair to good by State Game Commission report standards.

There are no "hot" spots although the Commission says that fly fishing, both at Sparks Lake for brook trout and at Mud Lake for Atlantic salmon has been pretty good.

The rest of the popular fishing holes are getting heavy pressure but none is yielding consistently large catches.

A few large rainbows in the six to eight pound class are still being taken at Crane Prairie Reservoir, but results have slowed from the peak of about two weeks ago. Fishermen are having the best luck dunking worms or trolling streamer flies in the evening.

Elk Lake is good for small kokanee on bait with some brook trout being taken on troll in deep water. Wickiup Reservoir has been fair for kokanee on bait. North and South Twin Lakes are fair to good for rainbow using bait.

East Lake has been only fair using salmon eggs but fishing at Paulina is reportedly picking up a bit. Good catches have been reported for trollers and fishing on the bottom in 70 feet of water with salmon eggs.

At Blue Lake, anglers have been limiting on rainbow with worms and eggs. The fish are in the 12 inch class.

Pelton Reservoir in the Ochoco district continues to be slow and Haystack Reservoir is poor. Ochoco Reservoir has been fair for bank anglers and for trollers and Prineville Dam has been fair for trollers and poor for bank anglers. The Deschutes River at Warm Springs is reported as good.

In the Klamath District, good fishing is reported at Odell Lake on kokanee and large lake trout. Crescent lake is slow as is Davis Lake. The Little Deschutes River is good for small rainbow and brown trout.

Lary blanks Seattle 1-0 in coast play

Al Lary, one of the pitching brothers who hasn't been too much in the limelight, apparently is anxious to move up to the major leagues and his recent mound performances make the trip seem possible soon.

The 33-year-old Salt Lake City right-hander turned in a neat three-hit package Thursday night in defeating Seattle 1-0. All of the hits were singles and it marked Lary's ninth victory against seven losses.

It was the second consecutive air-tight outing for Lary, who gave up but five hits July 14 in downing Portland 6-3.

Another former major leaguer, Ted Wills, pitched and batted himself to a four-hit 3-0 shutout over the Oklahoma City 80ers. The southpaw drove in shortstop Tommy Helms with the first run in the third inning and that proved enough.

The Padres added insurance tallies in the sixth and eighth innings. First baseman Rogelio Alvarez banged a homerun with none on in the eighth.

Wills struck out 10 and walked two, facing only 34 men.

Seattle came back in the nightcap to win 1-0 with Dave Busby, rookie right-hander tossing the victory. He just reported from the eastern league. He hurled six hit ball, striking out four and walking one. The Rainiers got their tally off Wayne Carlander on a walk, a sacrifice and a single by Felix Maldonado.

In other games, Portland slaughtered Tacoma 17-3, and Spokane took a pair from Dallas-Ft. Worth 5-2 and 4-3.

The Beaver-Giant game was close until the sixth when Portland scored three runs on Bill Bryan's homerun with two aboard. The Beavers added three in the seventh and seven in the eighth frames to give Bob Flynn his sixth victory in nine decisions. The loser, Bob Garibaldi, now has a record of 9-8.

The Indians won their 60th and 61st games of the campaign as Phil Ortega and Howie Reed turned in pitching gems. Ortega won the first game on a five-hitter, striking out 12.

Thursday night it was the hitting that did the damage to the Pittsburgh Pirates. With Wills leading the parade with four runs batted in, the Dodgers scored their 14th win in the last 18 games, a 10-3 victory over the Pirates.

The win kept the Dodgers 6½ games in front of second place Chicago in the National League race.

Johnny Podres, the southpaw Dodger starter, was the beneficiary of a 14-hit Los Angeles assault on five Pittsburgh hurlers.

Although Podres gave up 12 hits and three runs in six and two-thirds innings before he was replaced by reliefer Larry Sherry, Johnny notched his fifth straight victory and ninth of the season. He has lost six.

CINCINNATI (UPI) — Two young ladies from the Deep South carried one-stroke leads today into the second round of the 11th annual U.S. Women's Open golf tournament at sun-baked Kenwood Country Club.

Clifford Ann Creed of Alexandria, La., only a few months out of the amateur ranks, and Mary Mills of Gulf Hills, Miss., in her second year as a professional, led the way with two-under-par 71s.

Ruth Jensen of Bonsall, Calif.; Louise Suggs of DelRay Beach, Fla., and Judy Kimball of Sioux City, Iowa, tied for the runnerup spot with scores of 72 and were in a good position for making a run at the lead in the remaining 18 holes today and 36 on Saturday.

Reinstatement came at the All-Star break and a different Hoak is performing now, chipping in with key hits, like his triple in the ninth against the Houston Colts which helped turn a 9-2 loss into a 10-9 Phillies victory.
