### 'Harem look' among new fashions shown in Paris

PARIS (UPI)—Knee-high gaiters and fuzzy, Moroccan-style hooded capes were the curtain raisers today at the opening of the Paris fall-winter fashion shows.

Designer Jacques Esterel, who plays a guitar and writes songs on the side, went all out for fresh ideas in a "harem look" collection that college girls might go for.

Esterel virtually eliminated coats. His attitude was, who needs one?

Instead, his models paraded capes or knee-length spats, with thick wool "walking suits" that wrapped them from top to toe against next winter's cold.

To Flood Land His capes—and you can bet the copies will flood the land before the first day of school rolls around—were cut so that they could rest on the shoulders or atop the head.

The hood and cape were in one piece, as a Moroccan peasant's "djellabah." Esterel made them in curly mohairs in such eye-stopping colors as turquoise as well as a black and gray.

One leaf green cape line with white wool was worn either over the head or draped on the shoulders over a green straight sheath dress. One New York buyer noted that since college girls like anything they can wrap around their head this Esterel idea seemed a best-seller.

His gaiter outfits brought just as many approving looks from the fashion press and buyers. One model wore a heavy camel's hair slim walking suit, the jacket two-thirds length and cut in shirt-maker style that you slip over your head.

Open At Neck The casual collar was open at the neck. On her leg were brown leather gaiters, buttoned up to the knee like grandma's and worn with high heel brown pumps.

Many full-length capes swooped to a "V" in the back and had fronts like short little laped jackets.

An orange-and-black tweed walking suit, with the same long over-the-head jacket, was shown with black gaiters and a wild black patent leather hat like an inverted coal bucket.

Another of these suits with the new extra-long jacket was of ocelot fur and buttoned up the back.

Other suits had short belted jackets and detachable hoods.

STOCKHOLM (UPI)—Health authorities indicated today they soon would declare this capital city free of smallpox after a virulent outbreak which killed four persons.

Twenty-five persons contracted the disease, believed to have been brought in by a sailor.

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Valerio Cardinal Valeri, prefect of the Vatican's Sacred Congregation of the Religious, died today at his residence in Rome, a Vatican official announced. He was 79.

Cardinal Valeri was stricken several days ago with a serious throat infection.

Pope Paul VI, informed immediately of the cardinal's death, went to his private chapel to pray.

Valeri, a widely respected man, had been among the cardinals mentioned as a candidate to the papacy, both in the 1958 conclave that elected Pope John XXIII and in the conclave on June 21 that elected Pope Paul VI.

His health in recent years had not been good. He underwent surgery last April in a Rome clinic. The nature of the operation was not disclosed.

PLANE KILLED GIRL TURIN, Italy (UPI)—An Italian air force plane crashed during an air show Sunday, killing a 17-year-old girl spectator.

The demonstration marked the 40th anniversary of the Italian air force.



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### Loophole opened in JFK's balance-of-payments plan

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Kennedy administration is opening a loophole in its proposed balance-of-payments tax on foreign securities to prevent the tax from crippling Canada's economy.

The action came Sunday after a weekend of secret talks between a U.S. team led by Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon and top Canadian financial officials who had hurried to Washington to present their country's case.

The United States in effect agreed not to apply the proposed "interest equalization tax" to new issues of Canadian securities, so long as the flow of U.S. dollars into Canada does not exceed Canadian needs, Canada agreed not to use the exemption to try to build up its foreign exchange reserves.

Similar exemptions would be the flow of needed U.S. dollars.

available in other "exceptional situations" where countries were endangered by the tax, a joint statement said. However, U.S. officials said no other countries had asked to have the proposed tax lifted.

"It is the hope and expectation of both governments that by maintaining close consultation it will prove possible in practice to have an unlimited exemption for Canada without adverse effects on the United States," the joint statement said.

Canadian Finance Minister Walter Gordon said in Ottawa he was "very much relieved."

President Kennedy asked Congress Thursday to impose a 2.75 to 15 per cent tax on U.S. purchases of foreign stocks and long-term securities. The idea was to stem an outflow of U.S. investment dollars by making it more expensive for foreign interests to borrow long-term funds in the United States.

The reason for the move was the U.S. balance of payments deficit, which totaled \$2.2 billion last year and has been running at an annual rate of more than \$3.2 billion this year.

But Canada depends on borrowing from U.S. investors to finance a major part of its industrial and municipal development, as well as to keep its own balance of payments in line. Canadian economists feared the Kennedy taxes would cripple the Canadian economy by drying up

### Eastern areas pelted by rain

By United Press International Violent summer storms strafed states around Lake Michigan and along the South Atlantic Seaboard Sunday night and early today. Up to eight inches of rain fell in Indiana.

Hail one inch in diameter pounded Montello, Wis., stripping trees of their leaves and threatening maturing crops. The hardest hit was the little town of Packwaukee, Wis.

The winds kicked up 10 foot waves on Lake Michigan. The temperature dropped 17 degrees in one hour in Milwaukee.

Large hail and heavy rains pelted the greater Chicago area, causing extensive flooding in the southern suburban areas and uprooting trees and knocking out power on both the north and south sides.

Three and a half inches of rain was measured in one place in Chicago. The Hammond, Ind., airport estimated five to seven inches of rain fell late Sunday.

Bridgeport, Conn., received 2.61 inches of rain in the 24 hours ending Sunday night.

MIAMI (UPI)—Happy Rockefeller's debut into national politics was impressive. But, it is too early to count the votes.

Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller introduced his pretty, 36-year-old wife Sunday night at a cocktail party given governors attending their annual conference. The newlyweds held the spotlight.

"Say hello to Happy," the New York governor said to most. To others, he was more formal: "I would like you to meet Mrs. Rockefeller."

The new Mrs. Rockefeller, who might play an important role in her husband's unofficial campaign for the Republican presidential nomination, was greeted warmly. Some said politely.

"She is much better looking than her pictures," one woman said. Another described her as "pleasant."

While "Rocky and Happy" appeared to be getting a friendly reception, Gov. Henry Bellmon, a Republican of Oklahoma, said his presidential rating had not been raised.

"I don't believe he stands a chance," Bellmon said. "And, his marital problems haven't helped."

### Mounties don't always get man, official admits

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The head of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police admitted today that the Mounties don't always get their man.

In fact, said Commissioner C. W. Harvison, they don't even try.

"With the tremendous variety of work we have today, it would be utterly ridiculous to continue chasing a man through hell and high water, no matter what offense he had committed," Harvison said in a copyright interview with U.S. News and World Report.

"It is true, however, that we never close a file on a serious offense," he said.

Harvison blamed Hollywood chiefly for building up the idea that the Mounties never let a suspect get away. The real motto of the Mounties, he said, is "Maintain the Right."

"We try to discourage young men who want to join the force thinking they will ride gorgeously across the prairies in their red coats to the tune of 'Rose Marie,'" Harvison said.

"We point out that life in the force is not a 'Rose Marie' type of thing."

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
