

Egypt reports it has built first submarine

CAIRO (UPI) — Egypt, displaying its military might on the 11th anniversary of the coup that put President Gamal Abdel Nasser in power, today announced it has built its first submarine and will test it within 15 days.

But Nasser's plans for extending the United Arab Republic appeared to be all but finished for the present. He charged in a speech Monday night that Syria, which was to have joined Egypt and Iraq in the new U.A.R. by September, "has been converted into a vast concentration camp."

He said he would never federate with Syria as long as its Baathist party rulers remain in power. He did not mention Iraq, also ruled by the Baathists.

Chief of Staff Gen. Ali Amer, reviewing today's parade of Soviet-equipped troops, declared that the armed forces were getting "up to date heavy equipment and guided missiles."

He did not say how the submarine was developed but German scientists have aided in the construction of missiles here.

(In Munich, Germany, the designer of the famous World War II fighter planes, Willy Messerschmitt, confirmed Monday that he is helping Egypt build a supersonic fighter.)

A two-stage rocket and possibly a space satellite were among the other achievements expected to be displayed today.

But the future of the enlarged U.A.R. did not look good.

Nasser told a crowd of 100,000 jammed into Cairo's Al-Ghurnah Square that "Arab liberty, freedom, and dignity are suffering a crisis" in Syria, where Baathist President Hafez Assad and Premier Salah Bitar crushed a revolt last week and obliquely accused Nasser's propaganda organs of fomenting it.

Device removes satellite sway

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Navy has put a satellite into orbit with an ingenious stabilization system that keeps the same face of the moonlet toward the earth.

The device, involving a long boom and a springlike "yo-yo," takes the sway out of the satellite as it spins around the earth, the Navy said Monday. The value of the device is to make radio communication easier and, in the case of weather satellites, to keep the cameras aimed earthward.

The Navy did not say when the satellite was launched.

GETS LIFE TERM

PORTLAND (UPI) — Circuit Judge James Crawford Monday sentenced Henry Gill, 36, Portland, to life imprisonment for second degree murder.

Gill, a construction worker, was found guilty by a Circuit Court jury here last Tuesday. He was accused of the fatal stabbing of Hubert Hayes, 41, Portland, in northeast Portland April 19.

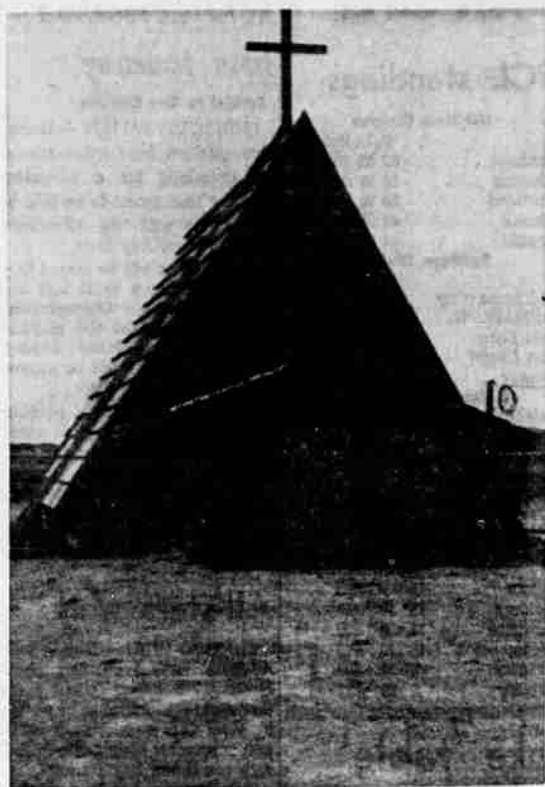
ESTIMATES FIRE LOSS

Chapel nearing completion at Christmas Valley site

CHRISTMAS VALLEY — A small rustic chapel, styled in keeping with the lodge, is nearing completion. A gift of Carlo Giuntini, president of the M. Penn Phillips Company, the builders are Coy Amacker and Owen Holmes.

Local residents will have a part in readying the chapel for use. They will finish the interior with decorative paneling. The volunteer labor will be headed by Amacker and Holmes, with Fred Kennedy doing the painting — brown with white trim is the color scheme.

The Community Church building will seat about 30 people and is the first built on the 20 acre site south of the lodge, set aside for schools and churches. Services will be conducted interdenominational, with ministers coming from more than one church to serve here on alternate Sundays. Larrie Porter, Christmas Valley resident, will lead out in Seventh Day Adventist services.

Approximately two acre sites are granted to churches wishing to build here. Lutheran and Southern Baptist groups have indicated their intentions thus far.

New Christmas Valley residents have contributed time and equipment to the chapel project. Virgil Hall cleared the site; Bob Byam's crew contributed the laying of a portion of the waterline and Lakeview Building Materials donated part of the timbers for the roof structure.

Sen. Magnuson undergoes tests

SEATTLE (UPI) — Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash., was in Providence Hospital here today for diagnostic tests in connection with recurring attacks of fever.

Magnuson's physician, Dr. Alex Grinstein, said there was "nothing alarming" about Magnuson's condition. But he added it was uncertain how long the senator would have to remain in the hospital.

Magnuson arrived here Friday evening and was confined to his hotel room until Monday when he went to the hospital. He had been suffering from fever up to 101 degrees.

Grinstein said Magnuson's ailment may be a recurrence of an illness Magnuson contracted while in military service in the Pacific.

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India, Pakistan aid cut favored

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Foreign Affairs Committee will be asked to cut U. S. economic aid to India and Pakistan until they settle their Kashmir dispute, it was learned today.

Informed sources said the reduction would be proposed as an amendment to President Kennedy's foreign aid bill, now being considered by the committee in closed sessions.

The amendment, sponsored by Rep. William S. Broomfield, R-Mich., would order a 25 per cent slash in planned economic aid for both countries until the Kashmir issue is resolved.

This would cut assistance to India to about \$300 million. U.S. aid to Pakistan would be cut to about \$175 million.

India and Pakistan have been quarreling since the turn of the decade over control of Kashmir, an area in the Himalayas with a population of four million people and 82,258 square miles of territory.

A cease-fire was effected by the United Nations, which named a commission to arrange a plebiscite, but controversy continues over withdrawal of troops and the land remains divided.

Broomfield believes that the dispute weakens free world defenses against Red China. He feels that his amendment might help to prod India and Pakistan into an agreement, sources said.

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Israeli-U.A.R. planes clash

CAIRO (UPI) — Israeli and United Arab Republic fighter planes clashed today over U.A.R. territory above the Sinai Desert and one Israeli plane was shot down, a military spokesman said.

(In Jerusalem, an official spokesman claimed it was Israeli territory which was violated by two U. A. R. planes. The spokesman said Israeli fighters chased the U.A.R. planes back across the border, hitting one in a brief dogfight, and then returned safely to their bases.)

The U. A. R. spokesman said four Israeli planes infiltrated Egyptian territory over the Sinai, which is the U. A. R. frontier province with Israel and which lies far to the east of Cairo.

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U.S. buyers say long-skirt bombshell is really a dud

PARIS (UPI) — Designer Jacques Heim's long-skirt bombshell is a dud, American buyers said today.

After Heim opened the fall-winter Paris fashion shows Monday, a cross-section of merchandising experts from New York indicated almost complete indifference.

The experts conceded that the new heavy tweed walking suits and knee-high boots that are blossoming all over Paris could stand a skirt about an inch or two lower than usual.

But otherwise, the buyers said, they have no intention of stocking department stores this fall with longer skirts that will force a worldwide wardrobe overhaul.

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Agreement set on aid to India

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States and Britain have announced agreement on means of helping India prepare for possible air attack by the Chinese Communists.

The agreement, under which the United States will provide India with radar and related communications equipment, was announced Monday.

It also provides for joint air exercises by U.S. and British air units with the Indian air force.

The State Department, which made the announcement, stressed that the accord does not involve a U.S. commitment to go to India's aid in case of attack. The agreement grows out of last year's border warfare between the Indians and the Red Chinese and U.S. officials hope it will have a deterrent effect on Peiping.

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Couple accused of aiding spys plead innocent

NEW YORK (UPI) — A man and a woman, accused of helping a jailed Russian couple spy for the Soviet Union, pleaded innocent to espionage charges Monday and had their trial set for Sept. 30.

The two, who used the names of unsuspecting Americans to conceal their true identities, entered the pleas in federal court to indictments against them and the other couple, Ivan D. Egorov, 41, and his wife, Aleksandra, 39.

FBI agents arrested the Egorovs here, and their alleged accomplices in Washington, on July 2. Authorities said the latter couple, Robert K. Balch, 39, and John Ann Garber, 33, were using the names of a Roman Catholic priest and a Connecticut housewife.

All four were held without bail here.

The indictments, returned by a federal grand jury here last Wednesday, charged the four conspired to send the Soviet Union information about such U.S. defense matters as atomic weapons shipments and rocket launching sites.

Egorov, who was a personnel officer at the United Nations secretariat, and his wife were scheduled to enter pleas on the charges Aug. 20.

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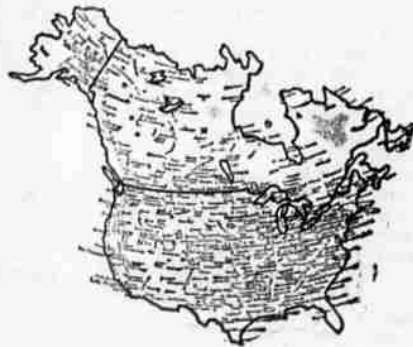
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
