Yankees could pull old-fashioned AL 'runaway'

It looks like an old-fashioned New York Yankee runaway—perhaps the easiest since the Yankees themselves romped by 12 games in 1947.

That's the picture in the American League today with the world champions 7½ games in front of the pack and just starting a long home stand where they almost always are at their best.

The Yankees made it four in a row on their current home stand when they whipped the Los Angeles Angels, 8-4, Monday night and opened a 7½-game lead on the idle second-place Chicago White Sox. No other major league games were scheduled in either league.

Ralph Terry, the World Series hero of 1962, staggered the full nine innings on the strength of an early Yankee assault that produced a 7-0 lead after three innings. Terry was tagged for 12 hits — including Lee Thomas' two-run homer in the fourth inning and Bob Sadowski's two-run single in the eighth — but evened his season record at 10-10.

Tom Tresh, back in the lineup after missing three games with a neck injury, sent the Yankees off in front against rookie Fred Newman with a two-run homer in the first inning.

Then the Yankees routed Newman with a five-run third-inning, featured by two-run singles by Tresh and Elston Howard, and added another run in the fifth on a homer by Johnny Blanchard. Tresh's homer was his 16th of the season and Blanchard's his fourth.

Terry, a 23-game winner in 1962, struck out four and walked one.

The Yankees won the 1962 pennant by five games and the 1961 and 1960 flags by eight. Their 10-game margin over the field in

Reed was lucky enough to be hurling when his mates were in a hitting mood at Denver Monday night. Spokane piled up a 9-6 win and Reed, possibly the loop's most solid starter, fattened his record to 12-5 for the campaign.

Ken Rowe came on in the seventh to preserve Reed's victory.

Garibaldi was working on a two-hitter with two men out in the 12th. But then Don Davis, Bob Will and Ken Aspromonte whacked singles to hand the \$150,000 bonus baby the loss and give Spokane another game lead in the Northern division.

It appears that in the Pacific Coast League, just as in the National League, the Los Angeles Dodgers have too much stuff for the San Francisco Giants. Spokane is a Dodger farm club and Tacoma a Giant franchise.

Hawaii sent Mike Lee, just called up from Tri-Cities, to the hill against Seattle.

He looked good until the fifth and even then showed some moxie as Seattle loaded the bases with no outs. A double play brought in one run and a wild pitch another.

The rest of the league took the night off, but resumes action with a full schedule this evening.

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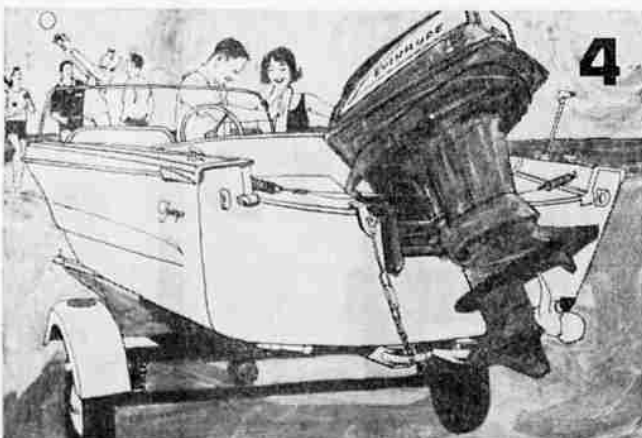


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
