Teamsters rap Bobby, urge he quit

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The 1.7 million member Teamsters union today launched a blistering attack on the administration for its civil rights record and said its best service to the cause would be the resignation of Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy.

Sidney Zagari, testifying for the Teamsters before a House Judiciary subcommittee, attacked President Kennedy's civil rights package as "hesitant, limited and loosely drafted."

The Teamster attack came as the attorney general was appearing before the Senate Judiciary Committee in support of the legislation. He insisted that stronger legal weapons than presently available are needed to break down racial discrimination.

Other Capitol Hill developments on civil rights included:

—Leaders of the nation's three major religious faiths joined in giving unqualified backing to the administration program in testimony before the House Judiciary Committee.

—Labor Undersecretary John F. Henning, urging approval of the President's proposal for fair employment practices legislation, testified before a Senate labor subcommittee that without congressional action, many labor unions and employers who want to halt discrimination "cannot or will not move."

—Harvard Law School Dean Erwin Griswold, one of the nation's top legal experts, told the Senate Commerce Committee there is ample constitutional authority on which Congress could base the civil rights proposals.

He advocated use of both the commerce clause and the 14th Amendment — and also threw in the 13th Amendment banning slavery and "involuntary servitude."

In his testimony calling for the attorney general's resignation, Zagari — spokesman for Teamster officials who have frequently attacked Kennedy — said the administration civil rights bill "proposes very little... and what little it attempts to do is not supported by mandatory powers inherent in the bill."

"Instead, you are requested to give a number of discretionary powers to an attorney general deeply involved in the pre-election action strategy of his political party," said Zagari.

"With all due respect to the attorney general's position and his interest in the civil rights issue, may I humbly suggest that the greatest service he could perform in promoting a truly bi-partisan policy in this Congress on the issue of civil rights is public announcement that he will resign..."

The religious leaders told Congress in a joint appeal for passage of the administration program that it is a moral and practical necessity. They said lawmakers should approve the program after praying that the racial struggle "will remain a social revolution and not degenerate into civil chaos."

Lumber strike to be extended to more mills

An official of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union said today that both the LSW and the International Woodworkers of America will strike Hines Lumber Co. and Pope and Talbot, Inc., plants Thursday.

Don Ferrier, business agent for the Coos Bay District of the LSW, said Hines operations in Eastern Oregon at Westfir will be affected, as will Pope and Talbot plants at Oakridge and Port Gamble, Wash.

It would be the first strike against members of the Timber Operators Council, except for some firms who also are members of the Big Six bargaining group.

Neither Regional President Harvey Nelson of the IWA nor Executive Secretary Earl Hartley of the LSW were available for comment on Ferrier's statement.

Earlier today, the LSW extended its strike against Georgia-Pacific Corp. to that firm's logging operations at Pilot Rock.

Plan to keep Africa nuclear-free offered

Harris seeks 30-day delay on work rules

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House Commerce Committee Chairman Oren Harris formally asked the railroads today to delay putting their proposed work rules into effect for 30 days.

Harris appealed to the railroads to give Congress more time to consider the complicated dispute presented to it by President Kennedy. He asked for an answer within 24 hours.

The Arkansas Democrat said that Congress could not act on Kennedy's proposal for averting a strike by next Tuesday, the date the railroads said they would put the new work rules into operation. The rail unions have stated they will strike if the rules are put into effect.

Harris issued his plea as his committee began hearings on Kennedy's plan for settling the dispute through the Interstate Commerce Commission.

In an unexpected move, railroad spokesmen arose from the back of the crowded hearing room and asked Harris for permission to make a statement.

Daniel P. Loomis, president of the Association of American Railroads, told Harris that it was not authorized to respond to the request, but he said he wanted to make the railroads' position clear.

Shots ring out in Syrian capital city

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) —

Shooting broke out today in the Syrian capital of Damascus — scene of last Thursday's abortive revolution — and a number of explosions rocked the city, according to reliable reports reaching here in neighboring Lebanon.

Soviet-built MIG jets of the Syrian air force took to the air, according to the reports. They were maintaining a constant patrol over the city.

Citizens fled to their homes even though the night curfew had not yet begun, according to the reports.

The shooting was reported to have broken out shortly after Damascus Radio announced the execution of seven more persons accused of taking part in the abortive coup d'etat last Thursday morning that was crushed by tanks of the Syrian army.

Syrian authorities earlier had reported the execution by firing squads and the hanging of 28 officers, soldiers and civilians.

About 1,000 persons were killed or wounded in five hours of street fighting last Thursday, according to reliable reports from inside Damascus.

Seven hundred persons have been reported arrested as the Baathist government hunted down its enemies.

American embassy building, grounds grabbed by Castro

HAVANA (UPI) — The Castro

government today expropriated the United States Embassy Building and grounds in a move believed unprecedented in diplomatic history.

The action was taken in reprisal for the freezing of Cuban government accounts in U. S. banks, according to the expropriation decree.

The Swiss mission protested verbally both the expropriation decree and a Cuban government request that they evacuate the premises as soon as possible. The

Reading from typed sheets of paper, he said he was "disturbed" at the request for postponement because further delay could bring more harm to the hard-pressed rail industry. He contended that the mere threat of a strike was driving business away from the railroads.

Harris then told Loomis that the committee recognized the railroads' problem. He added, however, that Loomis' statement "gives substance to what I say about 30 days being too short a time to consider this matter."

Congressional leaders, backed by AFL-CIO President George Meany, also have appealed to the railroads to delay the showdown.

Chief management spokesman J. E. Wolfe said Tuesday night that "as it stands now, our promulgation of work rule changes will be made effective at 12:01 a.m. Tuesday, July 30." The rail unions have announced they will strike if the rule changes are made.

The House Commerce Committee called Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz to testify at the opening of hearings on President Kennedy's proposal to shunt the dispute to the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The Senate Commerce Committee, which heard Wirtz testimony on the bill, scheduled testimony today from Wolfe and Daniel Loomis, president of the Association of American Railroads.

The railroads endorsed the President's plan Tuesday by a unanimous vote, but Wolfe said that only enactment of the proposed legislation could head off work rule changes Tuesday.

Chairman Oren Harris, D-Ark., of the House Commerce Committee said Congress could not complete action on the measure by the management deadline. And it shouldn't have to, he added.

Harris told a reporter that Congress should be given enough time to act carefully on a matter that he described as "so sensitive, so delicate and so important."

Four robbery suspects taken

PORTLAND (UPI) — Four robbery suspects were captured and one of them shot in the climax to a high speed chase in southwest Portland after a grocery store robbery Tuesday.

Glenn Wahl, 44, was shot in the left arm by a Multnomah County sheriff's Deputy Joaquin Nevell after he allegedly fired at the officer.

The other suspects were identified as Ruth Maridia, 45, Gerald Burnham, 60 and Virgil K. Lane. They said they were from Seattle.

They were caught about two miles from the Hillsdale Piggly Wiggly store about an hour after it was robbed.

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Bend rattled by thunder in pre-dawn

A night thunder storm, second of the season, rattled Bend in the pre-dawn hours this morning and light, scattered rains fell over the Deschutes country.

Foresters reported several lightning strikes from the night storm, but there were no "going fires" today.

The current forecast for the Deschutes country calls for cloudy weather with more thunder-showers tonight. Partly cloudy weather is forecast for Thursday, with the chance of scattered afternoon or evening thunder-showers to continue.

The five day forecast calls for temperatures averaging a little below normal for mid-summer, with a chance of a few showers or thunder-showers about Friday and again on Sunday east of the Cascades.

The scattered rains reported from various parts of Central Oregon last night apparently were light. Bend measured a mere 0.02 of an inch.

Disease threat forces dropping of horse show

The 4-H Horse Show scheduled for Tuesday, July 30, as an opening feature of Deschutes county fair week in Redmond has been cancelled.

The cancellation was made because of the danger that a concentration of horses might result in a spread of equine influenza, should there be any in the region.

Cancellation of the Horse Show was the result of action by the Deschutes County Fair Association, in cooperation with the Deschutes County Extension Service and the State Veterinary Department. Deschutes County 4-H Agent John Schmid said the action was taken for the safety of all 4-H club member horses.

A check in Redmond today revealed that there are no definitely known cases of equine influenza in that area, but that there are some suspected cases. Dr. James Locke, Redmond veterinarian, noted today.

It was reported that the disease is on the increase in the Northwest.

Earlier, there was a case in which Redmond horses taken to Portland races developed the influenza while there. It is not known whether the animals contracted the ailment in their home stables or in Portland.

Schmid said that for the safety of all horses owned by 4-H club members it was recommended that no groups of 4-H horses be brought together for shows, training or club meetings for at least three weeks.

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Test ban is still unsigned in Moscow

MOSCOW (UPI) — Premier Nikita Khrushchev today offered guarantees to make the African continent a non-nuclear zone if the United States and other nuclear powers agree.

Khrushchev made his offer as American, British and Soviet negotiators met for what diplomats said could be the final round of talks aimed at a limited nuclear test ban treaty that would be the first major cold war settlement in eight years.

His remarks came in a message to African nations which took part in the recent conference at Addis Ababa, Ethiopia.

In his message, Khrushchev pledged further Soviet efforts to ease world tension.

"We shall go on doing everything to ease international tension, to consolidate peace by implementing the principles of the peaceful coexistence of states," he said.

Toward Better Climate

The official Tass News Agency, in reporting the message, said Khrushchev believes East-West agreement to cease nuclear testing in space, in the atmosphere and under water could effect "a radical turn" toward bettering the international climate.

Tass said Khrushchev also wants a non-aggression treaty between the NATO powers and the Communist Warsaw treaty powers.

Khrushchev said in his message that the Soviet Union agrees fully with the appeal of the Addis Ababa conference to honor the "decisions on the recognition of Africa as an atomless zone."

He said that if the African nations conclude an agreement to this effect, the Soviet Union "is ready to give the necessary guarantees that, in case of any military complications, Africa will be regarded as a continent which is outside the use of nuclear arms."

Identical Guarantees

"Provided, of course," he added, "that identical guarantees are given simultaneously by the United States and the other nuclear powers."

In the past, Communist Poland's Foreign Minister Adam Rapacki has suggested that a stretch of Central Europe be declared an atom-free zone. This view has been endorsed by the Soviet Union, and Khrushchev himself has repeated the suggestion on several occasions and even has suggested the Mediterranean and other places be similarly designated atom-free areas.

Khrushchev also called for an end to racial segregation in Africa and an end to colonialism.

Tass distributed Khrushchev's message as the top-level negotiators reportedly worked out final details before initiating the test ban agreement, which had been expected some time today.

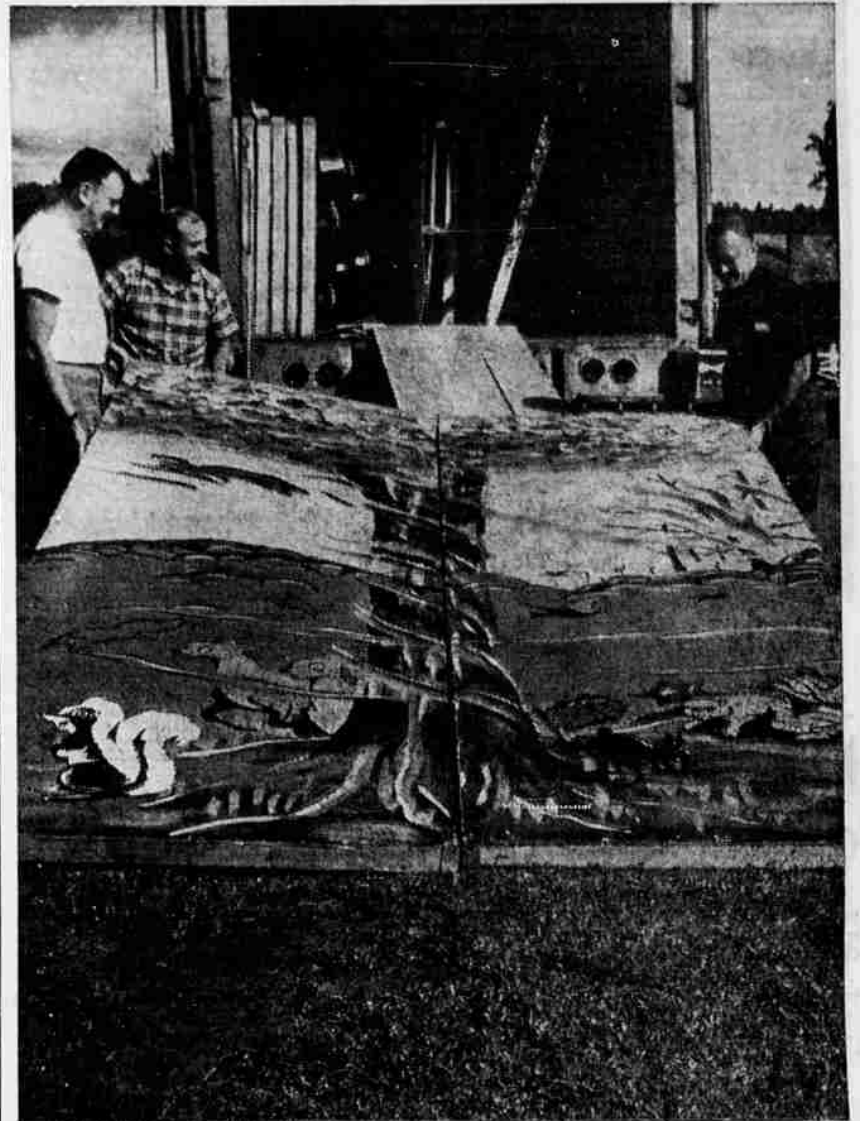
But, informed sources said, it now appeared unclear whether a drafting committee had settled on wording satisfactory to both sides.

Western sources said only a last-minute hitch could bar the initiating of the pact by Under Secretary of State W. Averell Harriman, British Science Minister Lord Hailsham, and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko.

The treaty outlawing nuclear weapons tests in the atmosphere, in outer space, and under water would be the first significant agreement concluded between East and West since the Austrian state treaty in 1955 gave that country full independence and provided for the withdrawal of Soviet and Western occupation troops.

There had been fears that the Soviets would seek to couple the treaty with a non-aggression agreement between NATO and the Communist Warsaw Pact. The West had opposed such a linking.

The sources said, however, that both sides may have reached a compromise providing for a declaration of non-aggression in more general terms.

'Enchanted Forest' Floats take shape on Mirror Pond

Floats that will fit into the "Enchanted Forest," theme of the 1963 Mirror Pond Pageant on the Deschutes, were taking shape this afternoon behind a great arch that was virtually completed last night with a test of illumination.

The river fetes will be on Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights, with floats to move into the river as dusk comes shortly after 9 p.m., PDT. Starting time will be a bit earlier if clouds are banked on the Cascades at sunset.

Bend Chamber of Commerce workers in charge of the 1963 river show are hopeful that clouds will be missing from the mountains and that belated summer evenings will come to the Deschutes country by pageant time.

Made in Portland, the floats were moved here by truck last night and unloaded at Pageant Park this morning. The floats will receive a final lighting test Thursday night, in preparation for the opening show on Friday.

Heading the floats into the river will be that on which will ride the pageant queen. This will be the proverbial swan and cygnet float. Huge mother swan and her cygnet brood have been carefully groomed for the night show on the river.

With the arch in darkness and a fairy godmother waving her wand in black light high above the portal, a prologue will precede the parade.

Queen selection, dances tonight

One of the five princesses will be named queen, in a ceremony tonight at 8 o'clock, at the Elks Temple. Two queens' balls — one for adults and one for teenagers — will follow. Music will be by Ron Salt's orchestra, upstairs, and the Statesmen, downstairs.

Combination tickets for the program and the dances will be available at the door. Dancing will be from 9 p.m. to midnight. The event is the highlight of the pre-Pageant activities, and is expected to draw a large turnout.

ceded the appearance of the fairy-land flotilla in the river.

First float to move into the stream behind the royal swan and cygnet will be "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs." Then will come "Hiawatha," followed by "Robin Hood" of forest fame.

"Peter Pan" will move majestically into the river as lights change and blend on the arch, of entirely new design.

Following eternally youthful "Peter Pan" in the parade down river, a long 1,000 feet of plastic boom, will be "The Wizard of Oz." Then will come a character who would be at home in the tall pines on the Deschutes country — "Paul Bunyan."

"Hansel and Gretel" will drift gracefully into the river from the arch, with "Bambi" carefully spaced for the next entry. Then will come "The Fir Tree," to be followed by "Christmas Tree," in keeping with the "Enchanted Forest" theme.

Near the end of the illuminated floats will be "Alice in Wonderland," and in the anchor position at the rear of the flotilla will be a depiction of "Crater Lake," where nature has created her own enchanted land.

Heading the 1963 Pet Parade, a feature of the Mirror Pond Pageant program Saturday that will start at 11 a.m. from the former Troy Laundry field on Bond Street, will be a police car, a fire engine and Boy Scouts, Vic Kaiser, general chairman of the event for the Jaycees, announced today.

Fourth entry in the long line of march will be the Al Kadar Shrine band from Portland, in colorful uniforms. Behind the marching Shriners will ride the Pageant court, in convertibles. Directly behind the girls will be the first unit of the Lakeview Strutters.

Then will come decorated bicycles and tricycles, soap box entries and old cars. The committee has arranged to space visiting entries along the line of march, and behind the ancient car division will be the Lakeview rodeo court.

Next in line will be the walking pets and an Eastside playground float. Baseball groups will be next.

The second group of Lakeview Strutters will follow the baseball units. Then will come the Estacada water festival court, followed by carried pets.

Vikings Due

In the line of paraders behind the carried pets will be the Junction City Vikings, with their big Norse ship. This group first appeared in the Mirror Pond Pageant show last year, and won a big hand. Bewhiskered Vikings will make occasional forays into the streetside crowds to take local residents as "hostages."

Redmond's potato festival court will be next in order, followed by Westside playground float and a Cascade Boat Club entry. The Jefferson County rodeo court will follow, with the Crook County court next in line. Then will come the Deschutes County fair court, the Rim Rock Riders and the Sisters rodeo court.

"We are confident this Pet Parade will be tops among the many we have presented," Jaycees declared today.
