Ax murder of Bend woman's father apparently solved

The recent brutal ax murder of Godfrey Johnson, 78, of Great Falls, Mont., and the bludgeoning of his 73-year-old wife, Elma, seemed solved today, according to their daughter, Mrs. Margaret Douglas of Bend. Mrs. Douglas was informed in a telephone conversation last night that a 16-year-old boy, apprehended in the course of an intensive investigation, has confessed.

Mrs. Douglas returned to Bend Sunday, after attending her father's funeral Thursday in Great Falls. His wife remains in critical condition, with the loss of sight of the right eye said to be probable. She was reportedly showing some improvement last night.

Mr. and Mrs. Johnson were attacked Saturday night, July 13, in their bedroom in the home of their son, Leonard Johnson, 81, with whom they had been living.

The elder Mr. Johnson, a prominent retired farmer in the Great Falls area, died in an ambulance on the way to a hospital. His wife has not been able to be questioned. The right side of her face was "nearly beaten off," and she was severely bludgeoned in the chest area.

Examination of the slain man's body showed blows to the left side of his head crushed his skull.

Mrs. Douglas and her sister, Arleen Ferez of Antioch, Calif., joined their mother and brother after the tragedy. The elderly couple had visited in Bend with Mrs. Douglas on numerous occasions, and were here this past May.

According to information received by Mrs. Douglas, robbery was the motive for the crime, although Mrs. Johnson's diamonds, left on the dresser, were undisturbed. Mr. Johnson's wallet was found a block from the murder scene. The weapon was located several days after the crime, in a rose bush a block west of the

Johnson residence. Mr. Johnson's car had been backed out of the garage and left in front of the house. Mrs. Douglas said that the youth who confessed said that he intended to take it, but panicked when he realized that one or both of the victims might die. He had no intention of committing murder, he reportedly said.

Mr. Johnson was born Dec. 12, 1884, in Gottborg, Sweden. He came to America when he was 18 and lived most of his life in Great Falls. Survivors include five grandchildren, and a sister and brother living in Sweden.

2 grass, brush fires snuffed

Two fires broke out in grass and brush Tuesday but no sizable damage occurred.

The first was on rural property at the G. A. Lowe residence, about 1½ miles south on Highway 97. Firemen said it was sparked by open burning.

The second, started by the carelessness of children with matches, burned a small portion of foliage on the north slope of Overturf Butte.
