

# K-Falls tips Bend Juniors in 5-1 tilt

Were it not for a bad third inning at Municipal Ballpark Monday evening, the Bend Junior traveling team would have battled a visiting Klamath Falls Junior all-star aggregation right down to the wire.

However, the fates would have it different, as Bend tosser Ron Wyatt walked two batters, gave up a base hit, and took setbacks on two outfield miscues, enabling the visitors to tally four big runs.

Until that moment, the score was deadlocked at 1-1. Bend got the first one in the initial inning, when first-sacker Rick Nicholson tapped a single to score Rod Pitcher from third. Pitcher made it aboard the base paths via the four ball route. It was the only run Bend scored that inning, and the only tally the locals scored all night. After Nicholson's single, Steve Scott and Mike Flannery both went down swinging before Klamath hurler Brost to retire the side with the bases full.

Neither Bend or Klamath accomplished anything in the second frame. The top half of the third told the story. In the stanza's bottom half, Bend got one aboard but couldn't score him. Randy Snider beamed a single to left, but Dinnie Hanks flew out to second and Nicholson grounded to short. Brost thus was able to get himself out of trouble again.

Klamath Falls added one more to its lead in the fourth, to give the visitors the winning 5-1 margin. It was hurler Brost that did it. He got aboard via a fielder's choice, wherein teammate De-groot was forced at second after walloping a single. Right Fielder

Gray then stepped to the plate and smacked a hard one at Bend third-sacker Dick Gasbar who couldn't handle it. This enabled Gray to get aboard with an error and scored Brost.

**No Action**

Bend never got rolling from that time on. The bottom half of the fourth and the fifth frames saw no action by the locals at all. The top of the fifth proved eventless also, but Klamath had more than enough and coasted through with the victory.

Ron Wyatt was tabbed as the only and losing Bend tosser. Brost went the distance on the mound for the Klamath win. Wyatt, however, tossed seven strikeouts. Winning tosser Brost chucked six. Bend out-hit the visitors, 4-2. Garnering base raps for the locals were Randy Snider, Dinnie Hanks, Rick Nicholson, and Mike Flannery. The difference came, however, when Bend committed three costly errors. Klamath went through the fray with nary a miscue.

## Weekend's fishing looks good — report

Overall, the fishing picture for this weekend in Central Oregon looks good, a report said today from the Central Oregon region office of the Oregon State Game Commission.

By the two districts, the report is as follows:

**Ochoco District —** Prineville Reservoir is fair for trout trolling and bank fishing. It is slow for catfish, however. Bass from one to three pounds have been taken. Ochoco Reservoir is fair for trollers and bank anglers. Walton Lake is slow, but the Crooked River below Prineville Dam is fair to good for evening fishing. Pelton Reservoir is poor. The Deschutes River at Warm Springs is fair to good.

**Bend District —** Elk Lake angling is good for kokanee with the best results obtained by using bait. Three Creeks Lake reports that trolling with bait is producing nice catches of rainbow. East Lake angling is good on bait and troll.

Paulina Lake angling is good in the late afternoon or evening. The Crane Prairie Reservoir angling is again good with kokanee being taken in the Cultus and Quinn River channels. Angling at Big Cultus Lake is good for rainbow. Blue Lake lure and bait are producing nice catches of rainbow. Suttle Lake is good for small kokanee. Flies and bait are producing nice catches of rainbow and brook trout at Fall River. The Metolius River is good for rainbow on flies.

Douglas' miscue thus set the stage for the dearth of hits and Roofers goofs that followed. Third sacker McKinney was hit by a pitched ball, catcher Scrivner banged a single to left, and first baseman Patterson was hit by another pitched ball, loading the sacks.
