## Weather holds key to harvest

**MADRAS** — A near record crop in terms of grass seed production is forecast for Jefferson county farmers but the weather holds the key to the harvest success of other major Jefferson county crops. Amos Blerly, county extension agent said this week.

Reviewing crop prospects in the county, Blerly said the grass seed harvest is well underway and production in terms of cleaned seed and price prospects are both figured above last year. A grass seed crop in excess of 4½ million pounds of cleaned seeds for all grass varieties is forecast. Harvesting of the Kentucky bluegrass strains is nearing completion and later grass varieties are yet to be harvested.

Peppermint, potato, grain and hay harvests are still very much dependent upon the weather, the county agent said. A cooler, wetter growing season than is normal has slowed crop growth in the area and warm dry weather is needed to permit upcoming crops to reach high yields and top quality.

The cost of the equipment, with attachments, is over four hundred dollars. However, the firemen, who have been working on the project of getting the resuscitator for over a year, have around \$300 in their fund. Less than \$100 remains to be raised by donations.

## Musa denies agreement on appointments

SALEM (UPI) — Senate President Ben Musa today denied he had violated any pledge in making an appointment to the State Welfare Commission.

Gov. Mark Hatfield, who has been attending the National Governor's Conference in Miami, has been critical of Musa for naming Ralph W. Perry Sr., Hood River, to the welfare commission while acting as temporary governor.

"The pledge the governor said I violated I remember very distinctly," Musa declared today.

### Pledge Quoted

He said he told the governor: "I assure you, sir, that in any of your absences from the state you need have no worry that I will remove from office any of your appointments, or discharge any of your employes or assistants. I have no intention to rock your ship of state or to frustrate your administration."

Musa declared today, "no mention was ever made that I would not fill a vacancy in any office if I believed in my judgment it was in the best interest of the state to do so. I shall continue this policy as long as I have the obligation to do so."

Musa assumes full duties of governor whenever Hatfield leaves the state.

### Hatfield Returns Home

Hatfield returned to Oregon last night and spent this morning in Portland. He said the whole issue emphasized the need to change the state constitution to eliminate the governor's surrender of powers when he leaves the state.

He said he did not know Perry at all, and admitted he might be a competent member of the commission, but he added he had intended to announce his own appointment soon.

"I must say this sort of conduct does not add to my peace of mind should I have to leave the state again," the governor said.

## Decrease noted in bank debits

Bank debits for the Central Oregon area including Crook, Deschutes and Jefferson counties decreased in June, 1963, compared to June, 1962, the University of Oregon Bureau of Business Research has reported.

Debits for June, 1963, totaled \$33,008,114. For May, 1963, the total was \$34,159,464, and for June, 1962, the total was \$33,726,597.

Oregon, with 238 banks reporting had a decrease in bank debits in June, 1963, of .74 per cent as compared with May, 1963 and an increase of plus 4.7 per cent as compared with June, 1962.

Total debits for Oregon in June, 1963, came to \$2,228,461,460 and for May, 1963, the total was \$2,406,414,541. For June, 1962, the total was \$2,128,519,770.
