Little Leaguers go wild in 2 contests; Elks, Miller's win

Two high-scoring affairs and a forfeiture marked Little League action in the Bend city ballparks last night.

Hits, runs, and errors were as plentiful as hotdogs at Coney Island at Marshall Field when the Elks overran the Cascade Gas crew in a National League go, 14-11.

Both nines started out like the American pastime was going out of style. It continued that way through the first and second innings. In the third frame, things settled down a bit. Whereas Cascade Gas batters sagged off some, the Elks kept pasting the ball and when the dust cleared, the Elks had their adversaries by the tail, 14-11.

It took a three-run blast in the eighth frame to do it, though. Two errors, a walk, and a hard-banged single by Bobby Backstrom did the trick.

Over at Juniper Park, the Cas-

cade League contest found the Miller's nine holding true to form, as the loop-leading nine tuned its bats up for its city title go next Friday by dumping the VFW squad, 10-5.

Miller's scored two in the first, five in the second, and three in the fourth. The Vets were able to cross the plate with a lone tally in the fourth. A last-inning rally produced four runs, but the Vets were too far behind and couldn't get back into the ball game.

Kevin Rea led the victors, going three for three in the batter's box.

Only a practice game was afforded in the American League, as the Medo-Land nine was forced to forfeit another contest. Medo-Land has been able to field only seven players for its last two contests. Tuesday, it was the Dairy Queen nine that picked up the victory for forfeit, and last night it was the Moose.

Another undefeated PCL hurler bites dust: Padres' Coates

Another undefeated pitcher has bitten the dust in the Pacific Coast League and now there is only one regular hurler left with a perfect record.

Jim Coates, of San Diego, after winning three straight, lost to Dallas-Ft. Worth Thursday 6-1 with all runs coming in the first two innings. He was relieved by Marv Fodor who in turn was aided by Dave Sisler.

The lone unbent hurler is Ray Rippelmeyer of San Diego with a 7-0 mark.

Marv Mecklenburg of the Rangers, held the Padres to five hits, one of them being Deron Johnson's 25th home run of the season. He tops the circuit in that department. The southpaw never gave up more than one hit in an inning in winning his eighth game against four losses.

The Rangers scored two in the first frame on singles by Cesar Tovar and Jay Ward and a two-run double by Sandy Valdespino. They added four more for good measure in the second on three walks, an error, a sacrifice and a single.

In other games Portland edged Oklahoma City 4-3, Spokane came from behind to tie the Denver in the ninth, then went on to win in the 12th 4-3 and Salt Lake City downed Tacoma 5-2. In Hawaii Seattle edged the Islanders 10-9 in a thriller.

The Beavers came back after losing both ends of a double header Wednesday night to score first in the second inning on a single by Chet Bank and a double by Dick Green. They added three more in the sixth on a pair of homers by John Wojcik and Bill Kern.

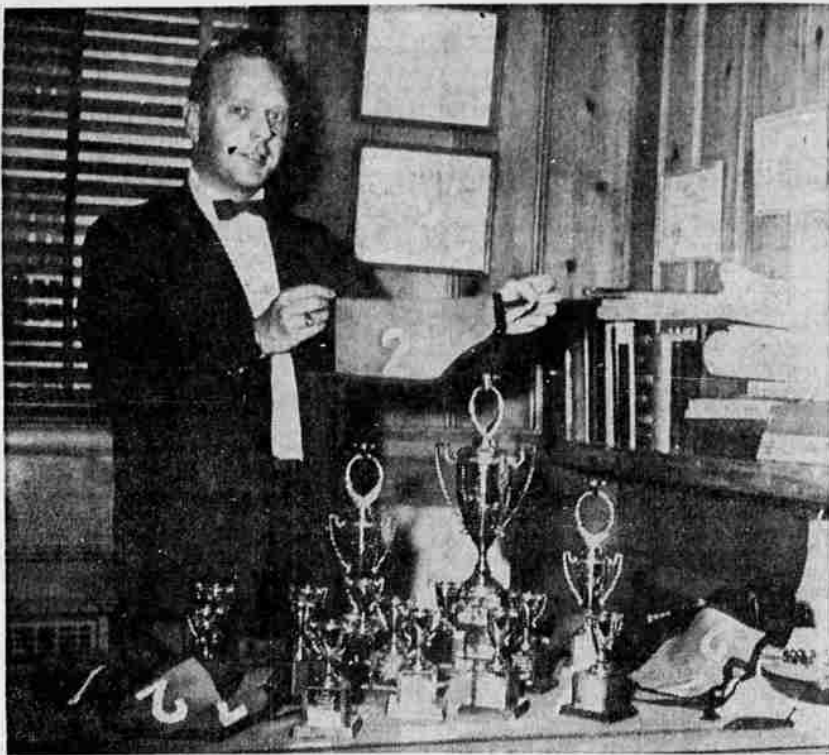
The final match was set today at Portland Golf Club.

A completely wild sixth inning completely turned things upside down at Harmon Field last night as Murray Brothers Construction Rookies suddenly exploded and rocketed right past the Central Oregon Roofers, 10-5.

But it wasn't until the sixth frame that Murray Bros. was even in the ball game. Just before the onslaught, the Roofers were out in front 4-1.

Murray Bros. got the first tally on the board when left fielder Bucky dashed home after an over-throw at third base. The lead was short lived, however, as the bottom of the third frame saw the Roofers take advantage of three Murray Bros. infield errors and a walk to score four big tallies. The Roofers picked up only three base hits in the whole ball game, but the third frame saw none of them.

Nothing more developed until Murray Bros. went berserk in the sixth. In the bottom of the sixth, the Roofers tried to get back, but the effort was nipped in the bud. homer in the seventh that snapped a 2-2 tie. It was Mann's 16th round-tripper of the year. Jim Lynn of Eugene hit a solo homer and Terry Banderas of Tri-City had a two-run shot in the fifth.

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U.S.-Polish track test opens today

WARSAW (UPI) — The United States track and field team, favored to capture first places in eight of the 10 men's events scheduled for today, was expected to break fast from the starting blocks in the opening day of a two-day dual meet with Poland.

The Americans, determined to atone for their disappointing performance at Moscow last weekend, appeared relaxed and finely tuned, a condition which the athletes attributed to the "informal" and "friendly" atmosphere here.

The Yanks were reported in excellent shape following Thursday's light workout in sweltering 95-degree heat with the exception of John Pennell, world record-holder in the pole vault.

Pennell, who suffered an apparent muscle spasm in his spine after landing hard during a practice vault, has been undergoing ultrasonic treatments, and said he felt "somewhat better" and would "probably try" to compete today.

Although Polish trainer Antoni Moronczyk has predicted his team would lose by only a "small margin", many of the U.S. athletes said the men's team was finally in shape to win handily despite an anticipated partisan crowd of upwards of 50,000 in the Warsaw Sports Stadium.

HUMPHREYS BACK

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — Pitcher Bob Humphreys has been reactivated by the St. Louis Cardinals who shipped reserve outfielder Jack Damaska to Atlanta of the International League to make room on the roster. Humphreys was placed on the disabled list after tearing abdominal muscles at Pittsburgh several weeks ago.

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
