Taylor building branch office

The Hap Taylor Real Estate firm will shift some of its business to the edge of town this year, after construction of a branch office at E. Third Street is completed.

First phase of the project — the clearing of trees and leveling of land — is completed, with construction about to start. The new facility is being located on a tract just south of the newly opened Arctic Circle Inn. Initially, the building will accommodate three salesmen, Taylor said, but is adapted to permit expansion as the need arises.

The \$7,300 structure will measure 28 x 28-feet, with space enough for at least a dozen autos on a broad, blacktop parking apron. Old-brick facing combined with rustic siding woodwork will make up the building exterior. Other external features are a drinking fountain and an ornamental umbrella tree.

Walt Norris, local artist, designed the structure. Contractor is Jim Ince.

Roller skating championships due in Portland

PORTLAND (UPI) — Competition in the North American Roller Skating Championships begins in 11,000-seat Memorial Coliseum here Sunday.

About 1,400 skaters, headed by four world champions, will seek titles in 54 divisions in the seven-day meet.

Paul Boehm and Pamela Cornwall, Houston, Texas, are on hand to defend their senior pairs title. They also captured the senior pairs free style title in the World Skating Congress Championships at Brisbane, Australia, last fall, and Boehm walked off with the senior men's single free style title.

Adolph Wacker and Linda Motrice of Canton, Ohio, won the senior dance championship in the North American championships at Lincoln, Neb., last summer and went on to capture the same event at Brisbane. Wacker also won the senior men's figures.

The championships were introduced by a parade through downtown Portland today. Selection of a queen and the "Skating Spectacular of 1963" were scheduled tonight.

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'Shorty' Powers to get new post

HOUSTON (UPI) — Dr. Robert Gilruth, director of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Manned Spacecraft Center has confirmed that Col. John (Shorty) Powers, "voice of the Mercury astronauts," will be assigned to new duties.

There have been frequent rumors that Powers was to be fired from his job. Powers "is on loan to NASA from the Air Force for assignment with Project Mercury," Gilruth said Friday night. "The project is completed and all its personnel are being reassigned."

Gilruth said Powers, public affairs officer for the spacecraft center, will be given new duties within the space program. The new assignment "will be announced as soon as we can determine in what way his talents and experience can best benefit NASA," Gilruth said.

Defense Department takes steps to end bias in towns near bases

The Defense Department took steps Friday to wipe out racial discrimination in towns bordering military bases.

Defense Secretary Robert McNamara said that such communities which practice "relentless" discrimination against Negro troops may be declared off-limits to all military personnel.

McNamara, in issuing the order, said off-base discrimination was as damaging to military effectiveness as off-base vice, which often brings off-limits directives.

The McNamara directive could have serious repercussions in the South, where more than a half-million servicemen are stationed. But many Southern officials believed that recent progress in desegregation in Dixie would restrict use of the off-limits order.

At Sumter, S. C., Friday about 300 persons marched down Main Street in a surprise anti-segregation demonstration, but there were no incidents and no arrests. Police arrested a biracial group

'BLACKMAIL' CHARGED

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Strom Thurmond, D-S.C., today denounced as "economic blackmail in its rawest form" a new anti-segregation order by Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara.

Thurmond said McNamara's order authorizing military communities off limits in cases of serious discrimination is "preposterous."
