

Padres' Coates loses second game in row

On Wednesday, Jim Coates, San Diego pitcher, had a perfect 3-0 record. On Thursday his record was 3-1 and Friday it was 3-2.

Coates lost his second game in as many nights in a relief role Friday night against Dallas-Ft. Worth. He replaced Sammy Ellis in the ninth inning with the score tied at 0-0. In the 10th he gave up a home run ball to Jay Ward with two men on base to lose the 3-0 verdict. Ted Sadowski went the route for the Rangers to gain his eighth victory against as many losses.

The low-hit affair saw Dallas-Ft. Worth collecting but four hits to three for the Padres.

In other PCL games, Spokane downed Portland 5-3, Hawaii nipped Tacoma 3-1, Seattle edged

Oklahoma City 2-1 and Denver and Salt Lake split a double header, both games being overtime. The Bears won the opener 3-2 in 8 innings and the Bees the nightcap, 7-6 in 12.

Bill Spanswick scattered six hits as Seattle downed Oklahoma City 2-1 and dropped the 89ers Southern Division advantage over Dallas-Ft. Worth to one-half game. The Rainier hurler struck out 12 and walked but one. The two Seattle tallies came in the fourth which won the game on a walk and three singles.

Johnnie Seale of Denver won the eight inning opener against Salt Lake City going all the way but was charged with the loss in the 12-inning nightcap when he came in for the Bears in the 10th.

Dick Sovde turned in a four-hit performance against Tacoma to give Hawaii a 3-1 decision. He beat Danny Rivas whose record now is 11-4. With the score tied 1-1, the Islanders iced the contest in the fifth on John Kennedy's single, a single by Herb Plews, an error, a wild pitch and a sacrifice fly by former Tacoma infielder Bob Perry.

Shortstop Bart Shirley led Spokane to a 5-3 win over Portland to push the Indians five games in front of Tacoma in the Northern Division. Howie Reed recorded his 13th victory compared to five losses. He retired 14 of the last 15 men he faced.

Dark looks angry after zany running

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Manager Alvin Dark of the San Francisco Giants looked angry today over some zany base-running that featured Chuck Hiller's two run homer which beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 6-4, in the ninth inning Friday night.

After right fielder Roberto Clemente had made a vain leap for the ball then fell prone, Orlando Cepeda—who was on first base—slowed down when he passed second and began looking toward the fence. Hiller stopped behind him and both stood between third and second until Dark came out of the dugout and waved them around.

"You better ask Cepeda," Dark said briefly when asked about the play and would not elaborate.

The slumping first baseman, who had led off the ninth with a pinch single, said, "I thought Clemente had caught the ball. I did not want to take any chances, see?"

"Nobody knew what happened to the ball," Hiller said. "Finally I asked Umpire Bill Jackowski at second if it had gone over and he said it had."

The blow—and ensuing traffic jam—ruined a record smashing appearance by relief veteran Elroy Face. When he took over in the eighth inning, he set a major league record of 360 appearances without a start.

Some 10,000 watch as Mike loses big one

COCOA BEACH, Fla. (UPI) — There were an estimated 10,000 witnesses to the one that got away from 13-year-old fisherman Mike Douglas Friday night.

After battling an 800-pound jewfish for more than 35 hours, Mike lost the big fish about 11:35 p.m., EST, when the youth's fishing line snapped.

Mike took his loss gracefully. "I'll get him again someday," he said.

The youth had hooked the fish around 3 p.m., EST Thursday with a homemade rig and bream for bait.

"I'm going to keep on fighting it until I land it—or collapse," he said. "I rest when the jewfish rests, but I wonder who is going to give out first."

The manager of the Patrick Air Force Base pier, where Mike latched onto the huge fish, said about 10,000 people had congregated around the pier to shout encouragement to the young angler.

After the battle had been going on about four hours, several divers, went down to see what the boy had caught.

Mike's father, Lt. Col. William K. Douglas, brought his son food and soft drinks during the long struggle.

Douglas, former doctor for the nation's first seven astronauts, said Mike had been relieved at the pole only long enough for "the necessities of life."

Mike slept for about an hour Thursday night while the fish rested, and took several short naps Friday night.

He made the fishing rig, a nine-foot pole with 63-pound test line, to catch sharks.

"I sure didn't count on this," he said.

Mamie, Bo in reunion at Tacoma

TACOMA, Wash. (UPI)—Actress Mamie Van Doren flew into town Friday for a reunion with Bo Belinsky, left-handed pitcher with the Hawaii Islanders of the Pacific Coast League.

Asked if his romance with Miss Van Doren was on again, Belinsky said: "Who knows what really can happen? She's a wonderful girl."

Miss Van Doren arrived by plane from Los Angeles Friday afternoon.

Belinsky at first balked against being sent to Hawaii and did not report to the Islanders for several weeks but said he is now happy with the club.

"It's just like jumping in the ocean," he said. "It's cold at first but after awhile you learn to like it."

Good chance Terry to start for Stars

There exists an excellent possibility that Terry Baker, Oregon State University's great All-American and Heisman trophy winner for 1962, will start at quarterback for the College All-Stars, August 2, when they meet the Green Bay Packers at Soldier Field in Chicago.

This possibility loomed even greater this week after Baker figured mightily in a close one-point loss Thursday with the Chicago Bears in a practice scrimmage.

Chicago's Bears outscored the Collegians 13-12. The "scrum" consisted of 144 offensive plays, equally divided between the two squads. In the last play from scrimmage, Charley Mitchell took a pitchout from Sonny Gibbs, Texas Christian quarterback, and sprinted 14 yards to paydirt for an All-Star touchdown.

Gibbs' performance on that and several other plays, gave Coach Otto Graham an even harder decision to make as to who should start in the field general's position.

Concerning his dilemma, Graham said this week, "actually we have too many quarterbacks — it creates a problem. No one quarterback is head and shoulders above the others — they're all good."

Graham said if two or more of his quarterbacks were about even before the game, "I might even toss a coin."

Baker did his stuff Thursday by romping 49 yards on an option play and throwing two key passes while under the rush of mauling Bear linemen.

Gibbs' pitchout play was the only TD scored by the All-Stars. The other six All-Star points were scored when Bob Jencks of Miami of Ohio booted the ball silver true for a pair of field goals.

Though Gibbs' play accomplished the TD, Baker's performance apparently was the most noticeable.

Coach Graham really has a dilemma in making his decision. He has a tremendous passer in Ron VanderKellen of Wisconsin, whose hurling performance January 1 in the Rose Bowl broke all kinds of records. He nearly single-handedly kept the Big 10 men in the

game right down to the buzzer. Graham is sure to use him for passing. However, Mississippi's Glynn Griffing has shown exceptionally well in the collegians' training practices. Then there is Sonny Gibbs who looked impressive on that certain play against the Bears Thursday.

Word has been circulating that Graham plans to use the option play to great advantage, and therefore will have to rely on the best running quarterback for getting the job done. VanderKellen is a great passer and is good at side-stepping on-rushing linemen, but isn't heralded as being a great ball packer or especially agile on option plays.

Griffing is all-around, much like Baker, but he is smaller. Gibbs is a big, tall man... good throwing arm... just right for reaching out and heaving passes over the line. However, Griffing is not regarded as a speedy runner. Baker is the ball packer. A great ball handler and deceiver, Baker is not regarded as being tremendously fast but has "the moves" that make him a top runner.

If the option play offense is number one in the collegian's bag of tricks, Baker should get the nod.

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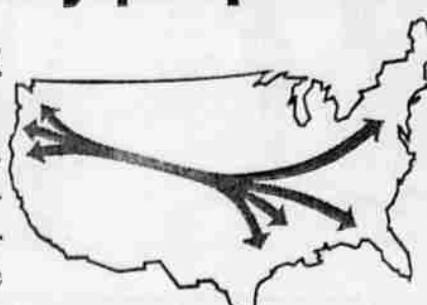
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
