## Hope fading for survivors

BOMBAY, India (UPI)—Three Indian naval vessels with sound-detection gear swept the turbulent sea west of here today, seeking the wreckage of an Egyptian airliner that crashed Sunday.

Hope of finding survivors among the British-made Comet's 8 crewmen and 54 or 55 passengers was abandoned Sunday night. The search ships kept a sharp lookout for the bodies of victims.

Small boats were sent out early this afternoon to investigate an air force pilot's report that five bodies had been seen floating in shallow water near the scene of the crash.

Uncertainty as to the number of passengers aboard arose from a conflict between the passenger list, which mentioned 54, and official radio reports placing the number at 55.

The confusion appeared to arise from reports that Farag Mustafa, the airline's financial adviser here, was on the flight. His wife said he was not, but Mustafa himself could not be located immediately.

Two Americans, M. Floy and Thomas Gnath (not otherwise identified), were listed among the passengers aboard the United Arab Airlines plane. Other victims included a score of Filipino Boy Scouts on the way to a world jamboree in Greece.

The plane was on the way from Tokyo to Cairo when it crashed in monsoon weather 9 miles west of the Bombay Airport as it headed in for a landing before dawn Sunday.

It was raining at the time of the crash and visibility was poor. Radar equipment at the airport was following the plane in when it suddenly vanished from the beam.

Nine hours later, search craft sighted wreckage in the sea.

### Panner wagon heavily damaged

A new station wagon operated by Owen M. Panner, 1208 E. 12th, suffered major damage this morning in an accident at the 700 block on E. Greenwood. No injuries occurred.

Police said the Panner vehicle was headed eastbound on Greenwood when it was struck by a pickup truck turning west onto Greenwood from the roadside. It's driver was Harry L. Fredenhagen, 452 E. Irving.

The Fredenhagen car received slight damage, officers said.

### No rain seen for mid-Oregon

The weatherman issued a five-day forecast from his regional headquarters in Portland this morning and came up with the prediction: "No rain."

Temperatures will average below normal, the forecast adds.

East of the Cascades, the mercury is expected to range in the 75-85 bracket through most of the week, with night lows in the 45-55 range.

Fair weather was general over the state this past weekend.

### Borate dropped on woods blaze

A tanker load of borate from the Redmond Air Center was dropped on a fire in the Ochoco woods Sunday afternoon.

The Ochoco smoke appeared about 12 miles northeast of the Ochoco Reservoir, in the country west of Big Summit Prairie. It spread over about an acre.

On the Deschutes National Forest, a fire spread over about half an acre in the Graham Butte area of the Sisters district Sunday afternoon. It was man caused.

## Board of health sets workshop here on Aug. 6

The chief medical investigator for the Oregon State Board of Health, Dr. Russell C. Henry, today announced a regional workshop will be held for local medical investigators and law enforcement officials including local police departments, sheriff's offices and district attorneys' offices, in the district court room, Deschutes County Court House, Bend, beginning at 9 a.m. on August 6.

William J. Maier, M.D., Tri-County Health Officer and Medical Investigator for Crook, Deschutes, and Jefferson Counties is host and coordinator for the regional session. Other county health officers, who also serve as county medical investigators expected to be in attendance, include Dr. Seth M. Kerron, Klamath county; Dr. Paul G. Kiewer, Lake county; and Dr. John H. Weare, Harney county.

Subjects to be taken up at the all-day meeting include the investigation of a medical investigator's case, followed by a discussion of investigation of specific types of cases including deaths from gun shot, poisoning, and natural deaths masquerading as violent deaths. The afternoon session will consist of a panel discussion in which participants will be Forest C. Sholes, Deschutes County Sheriff; and Louis L. Selken, Deschutes County District Attorney, and Drs. Maier and Henry.

The Bend workshop is one of six being held at central locations throughout Oregon for the purpose of developing uniform procedure for investigating and reporting deaths occurring as a result of specified conditions or circumstances, Dr. Henry concluded.

## Vacation church school planned

## Accidents take lives of six

Five persons lost their lives in traffic accidents in Oregon during the weekend, four of them in one accident near Medford.

Two other Oregonians were killed in New Mexico and Louisiana.

A one-car crash on a Jackson County road two miles west of Medford early Sunday killed Wilbur Swartsley, 33, Medford; his wife, Wilma, 50; Richard Davis, 36, Novato, Calif., and his wife, Ernestine, 33.

Police said the car skidded off the road across a 21-foot irrigation ditch, hit a bank and fell back into the ditch into seven feet of water. Mrs. Swartsley was driving, police said.

James Blanchette, 26, Portland, was killed when his car slammed into the back of a towing truck on the Baldock Freeway in Portland Saturday night.

The truck had stopped to aid a car which caught on fire. Two men in the truck were hospitalized.

Lawrence Wilson, 28, Portland, was one of six persons killed in a head-on collision Sunday night seven miles west of Gallup, N.M. Wilson was an employe of a Warner Brothers movie company which is filming "A Distant Trumpet" at Gallup.

### MOVIE CZAR CRITICAL

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Eric Johnston, president of the Motion Picture Association of America, was reported today in "quite critical condition" from a stroke he suffered June 17.

Johnston, 66, was hospitalized last month after suffering a cerebral thrombosis.

## Wave sweeps child to death

KALAMA, Wash. (UPI) — Two-year-old Steven Aldrich of Kalama drowned when he was swept into the Columbia River by a large wave from the wake of a freighter about a half mile east of here Sunday.

Skin-diving and dragging operations to recover the body resumed today.

The Cowlitz County sheriff's office at Kelso, Wash., said the wave was from the Philippine Mail, which was going to Portland.

The boy was among a group of about 25 persons, many of them fishermen, on the bank of the river when the wave hit.

His father, David Aldrich, 29, Kalama, and several other persons were washed into the river. The father was taken to a hospital at Longview, Wash., with severe arm lacerations.

## West Coast's petition denied

SEATTLE (UPI) — The Civil Aeronautics Board has denied West Coast Airlines' petition for nonstop service between Medford and Oakland, Calif., it was announced today.

The CAB said nonstop service would cut into the revenues of Pacific Air Lines, which now has that authority.

J. Nicholas Bez, Jr., vice president of West Coast, commented after the decision the Pacific has done little to exploit its service and has generated a very small amount of business.

Bez said West Coast would add two flights between Oregon and California to its present route Aug. 1.

## Weiser blaze out of control

Strong, shifting winds swept a fire out of control across 15,000 acres of brush and rangeland near Weiser, Idaho, today, but firefighters had more success with a 5,000-acre range fire on the Yakima Indian Reservation in Washington.

A spokesman for the Bureau of Land Management said 350 men were battling the Idaho fire today and seven planes loaded with borate solution were standing by.

The blaze broke out early Sunday and had burned only about 250 acres in the McCord Butte area 15 miles northwest of Weiser up until 11 p.m. Then winds of 20 to 30 miles an hour sprang up and the fire's raged in all directions," the BLM said.

The Yakima Reservation fire on Ahtanum Ridge was ringed this morning and a helicopter was patrolling the area to spot any new flareups. That blaze broke out about noon Sunday.

Oregon got through the weekend without any large blazes. The State Forestry Department reported seven fires burned six acres. The largest scorched four acres near Pendleton. The U.S. Forest Service reported 29 acres burned in nine fires.
