

Nelson Fox on his way to ball fame

Nelson Fox is elbowing his way into the class of baseball immortals, one base at a time.

He won't be remembered for his power, nor for his physique, but the scrappy Chicago second baseman who is a throwback to the long-ago heroes of baseball will command as many lines in the record books as some of the game's most notable sluggers.

Fox reached another milestone Sunday when he notched the 2,500th hit of his major league career. Typically, it was a single, and typically it turned into the winning run as the White Sox beat the Baltimore Orioles, 4-1.

Only 39 other players have reached the 2,500-hit plateau. Five of them were second basemen, and all now have a place in the Hall of Fame. It's big company indeed for Fox, an unimposing

five foot, nine inch, 160-pounder.

In other American League games, the New York Yankees overcame the Minnesota Twins, 3-2, after dropping the opener of a doubleheader, 3-1; the Los Angeles Angels swept a twin bill from the Boston Red Sox, 5-0 and 3-4; the Detroit Tigers beat the Washington Senators twice, 3-2 and 7-4; and the Kansas City Athletics stopped the Cleveland Indians, 3-0, in the first game but dropped the nightcap, 12-7.

In the National League, San Francisco defeated Pittsburgh, 3-1. Philadelphia beat Los Angeles 7-4. Chicago walloped St. Louis, 5-1 and 16-11. Houston topped New York, 8-2, and Milwaukee tripped Cincinnati, 5-2, after a 4-3 loss.

Fox, who led the major leagues in singles for seven straight years, opened the sixth inning at Baltimore with one of his specialties. The score was tied 1-1 at the time, but the Sox moved ahead to stay when Fox came around on a walk and Jim Lemon's single. Dave Nicholson homered for Chicago and Gary Pe-

ters, who went all the way for his 10th victory, took over the league leadership in earned run average.

The Yankees held on to an eight game lead over Chicago when Hector Lopez hit a two-run, bases-loaded single in the ninth inning of the second game. Minnesota won the opener behind the six-hit pitching of Camilo Pascual and the hitting of Don Mincher and Johnny Goryl. The loss broke a 12-game winning streak for Yankee starter Whitey Ford, now 16-4.

Relievers Help Angels

Strong relief pitching enabled the Angels to win both games at Boston and Jimmy Piersall officially marked his return to the American League by engaging in a violent dispute with the umpires in the second game. Piersall, signed by Los Angeles on Saturday, was thrown out of the game. Don Lee pitched shut-out ball for the Angels in the opener but still needed ninth-inning help in the 100-degree temperature and Paul Foytack gained credit for the second game victory.

A sacrifice fly by Gates Brown and a two-run triple by Bill Freeman in the eighth inning provided Detroit with its winning runs in the nightcap after Al Kaline had won the opener with a two-run homer. Norm Cash homered for the Tigers in the second game and Don Blasingame and Jim King retaliated for Washington to tie the score in the top of the eighth inning.

Orlando Pena pitched a two-hitter and Norm Siebern drove in two runs to account for Kansas City's first game victory. The Indians evened the score in the nightcap with a seven-run rally in the sixth inning that included John Romano's first major league grand slam home run. Reliever Ted Abernathy benefitted by the blast with his fourth triumph in five decisions.

Palmer, Nicklaus, Boros after purse

CHICAGO (UPI) — Pro golf's biggest money winners, Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus and Julius Boros, play off today for one of the biggest purses of the pro tour, \$11,000 first money in the \$37,200 Western Open.

It will be the fifth playoff in the last seven pro tournaments and for Palmer, his fourth in his last five outings. He won his last two overtime playoffs, the Cleveland Open and the Thunderbird, but he lost the National Open title to Boros in the previous scrap.

Nicklaus and Boros came from behind with par-shattering play Sunday to catch the slumping Palmer and force today's extra-distance round with a three-way tie at 280, four strokes under par for 72 holes on the 6,867-yard Beverly course.

Palmer slips

Nicklaus had the best round of the four-day tourney Sunday, a 66, and Boros tallied his second 67 in four rounds. Palmer, who had fired 67s in thesecond and third rounds, slipped to a 73 for the fourth 18 holes.

Nicklaus benefitted from a sizzling putter, never going over par in dropping birdie efforts of 35, 15, 12, 8 and 4 feet. Boros

Jose Stable seeking fifth in Saturday tiff

NEW YORK (UPI) — Cuban Jose Stable of New York, second-ranking welterweight contender, will seek his fifth straight victory Saturday night in a nationally televised fight with Stanley (Kitten) Hayward of Philadelphia at Madison Square Garden.

That stands out as the most interesting bout on this week's boxing schedule although Flash Elorde of the Philippines, Junior lightweight champion, meets Love Alottey of Ghana, top contender, in a non-title bout at Manila, Saturday night.

In the New York 10-rounder, Stable will try to improve his record of 20 wins, two defeats and one draw. He knocked out six opponents.

Kitten Hayward, 24, will be making his Garden debut and trying for his eighth straight win. His 16-1-1 record includes seven keyoes.

Sen. Kefauver to investigate Liston and professional boxing

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Boxing is once again a political issue according to Sen. Estes Kefauver, D-Tenn., the chairman of the Senate antitrust and monopoly subcommittee.

Sunday Kefauver said that he would investigate among other things heavyweight champion Sonny Liston's new business organization, mandatory return bouts in contracts of professional fighters, and the "matching and mismatching" of professional boxers.

The investigation, which would be made before the end of the present congressional session, "will just bring us up to date" said Kefauver, in reference to the 1960 and 1961 federal inquiries.

The senator's immediate plans called for a meeting with Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy next week to discuss creation of a federal boxing commissioner in a special section of the Justice Department.

Kefauver's subcommittee approved such a measure last year. The new investigation has apparently been organized as a result of the Sonny Liston-Floyd Patterson rematch last week when Liston knocked out Patterson within one round for the second consecutive time.

Oregon matmen win again

NIGATA, Japan (UPI) — The Oregon high school all-star wrestling team posted a 6-2 victory over the Niigata all-stars Sunday.

The victory gave the Oregon team a 5-1 record in its tour of Japan. The squad is scheduled to meet the Osaka all-stars at Osaka Tuesday.

The Japanese wrestlers took the first two matches Sunday over Rich Henryyot and Rick Sanders of Portland, but Grant Humphrey of Klamath Falls launched the Oregonians on a comeback with a 4-1 win over Masaaki Oguchi. Keith Flack, Canby, followed with a 9-2 win over Hiroshi Kai.

The unbeaten "Big Four" of the Oregon team won to preserve their records. Don Dykstra of Lebanon, Rollin Schimmel of Rainier and Henk Schenk, Silverton, scored pins and Fred Fozzard, Portland, added a decision.

Light duty today for U. S. track squad
