1963 Deschutes County Fair opens at Redmond

Jury convicts Ward, after suicide try

LONDON (UPI) — Dr. Stephen Ward, 50, was convicted today on vice charges 12 hours after he attempted suicide with an overdose of drugs.

A jury of 11 men and 1 woman found the society playboy osteopath guilty on two vice counts and innocent on three others.

The jury, which deliberated for 4 hours and 35 minutes, found Ward guilty of the first two counts brought against him—living partly off the immoral earnings of Christine Keeler, 21, and Marilyn (Mandy) Rice-Davies, two playgirls who lived at various times in his flat.

The osteopath, whose introductions of pretty girls to some of Britain's most prominent men exploded this country's greatest sex-and-security scandal of the century, had been tried on three charges of living on the earnings of prostitutes and two charges of procuring young girls for vice.

Ward was in a coma at St. Stephen's Hospital when the jury reached its verdict. During the night he took an overdose of

sleeping pills and was rushed to the hospital this morning two hours before court opened.

Justice Sir Archie Marshall completed his charge to the jury without Ward being present, and the jurors began their deliberations.

The jurors found the society osteopath and artist innocent of living off the immoral earnings of two admitted prostitutes—Ronna Ricardo, 23, and Vicki Barrett, 20.

They also cleared him of procuring young girls under the age of 21, identified at his trial only as Miss R and Miss X, for the purpose of persuading them to have intimate relations with other people.

Ward Gravely Ill

During the day, Ward was given oxygen and other treatment, but remained in a coma throughout and at one point a hospital spokesman said he was "gravely ill and in a critical condition."

The 50-year-old society osteopath and artist was found unconscious and frothing at the lips at the home of one of the defense witnesses, where he had spent the night.

Ward was whisked to the hospital, where he was given emergency treatment with oxygen but remained unconscious for hours. Justice Marshall revoked Ward's bail and completed his charge to the jury of 11 men and one woman so they could determine if the osteopath was guilty of charges of living on immoral earnings and seducing young girls.

Left Two Notes

Ward was understood to have left two notes in the home of Noel Howard Jones, 24, a defense witness who testified that he slept with playgirl Christine Keeler, 21, in Ward's apartment but that it was simply a pickup romance and not paid prostitution.

Ward spent Tuesday night in Jones' apartment. Jones—who anxiously stressed on the witness stand that this affair with Miss Keeler took place before he was married—refused today to say what had happened to Ward.

"I'm sorry," he said. "I am not going to talk."

Ward gave an indication in court Tuesday of the great strain he had been under when, despite warnings from Justice Marshall, he shouted at Mervyn Griffith-Jones during the prosecutor's summation.

"We should not overlook the fact that the North Korean puppets can renew war in Korea whenever convenient to them and whenever they are ready," Kim said.

Creates Tension

"In my opinion, the latest illegal, barbarous attacks on the U.N. troops were aimed at creating tension here in order to check Soviet Russia from making approaches to the West as a result of the Sino-Russian ideological struggle," he added.

(In London, informed sources said today that Communist China, which dominates North Korea, may be planning such pin-prick acts of aggression as part of its anti-Soviet campaign.)

(In Washington, the State Department said Tuesday that the Korean attacks may be part of a Peking drive to increase tension in Asia.)

Kim said South Korean officials have no indication that the North Koreans have immediate plans to renew fighting. Since the truce ended the fighting 10 years ago this month, a state of war has continued to exist between the two halves of the peninsula, but a demilitarized zone marking off their borders has curbed incidents.

Grave Incidents

The attacks on the Americans, inside South Korean territory, were the gravest incidents since the armistice.

Body of Bend woman found

The body of a Bend woman, identified as Annaei Larson, 37, wife of Cyrus Larson of this city, was found in her car Tuesday afternoon on a forest road about eight miles southwest of LaPine.

Mrs. Larson, who recently was released from a sanitarium, had been missing several days. The body was discovered about 4:30 p.m. by Ed Thompson, who lives in the LaPine community. He notified the state police and the sheriff's office.

The body was in the front seat, with a 22 caliber single shot pistol nearby. There was a bullet wound in the chest. Investigating officers said Mrs. Larson had left a note, addressed to her husband. Mrs. Larson was last seen on Friday.

A native of Germany, Mrs. Larson was the former wife of Count Regis de Maleissye, who in earlier years operated a ranch in the LaPine community. Surviving Mrs. Larson are five children.

Several months ago, officers said, Mrs. Larson received medical attention for a slashed wrist. Funeral arrangements are pending.

Queen, princesses list many activities

Three attractive young ladies reign at Redmond

Seventeen-year-old Queen June Butler, and Princesses Andrea Lowe, 16, and Bonnie Lou Nordman, 18, will reign over the Deschutes County Fair all this week.

The three attractive Redmond girls will make their official appearances in chic bell-bottomed saddle pants with harmonizing print shirts, topped with wide-brimmed Western hats. The queen's outfit is tangerine with a white hat; the princesses' are royal blue with black hats.

Queen June, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cal Butler, is an accomplished equestrienne who loves rodeos, quarterhorse shows and horse races, and would like to be a veterinarian. Other enthusiasms are biology, water and snow skiing, swimming, art,

steak and bright colors.

Queen June and her quarterhorse, Andy Sputnik, who learns fast and likes ice cubes, have walked off with enough hardware to fill a good-sized trophy case. These include the Potter award in horsemanship at the county fair last year, grand championship in horsemanship at the State Fair in 1961 and 1962 (reserve championship in 1960), prizes in Redmond quarterhorse shows and the all-around youth rodeo trophy at Eugene the past two years. Miss Butler was queen of the 1962 Central Oregon Junior Rodeo.

A size 12 brownette, she is 5 feet, 5 inches tall, weighs 130 pounds, and stops the tape measure at 35-24-36. She has had all her schooling in Redmond, will graduate in 1964, and plans to attend Oregon State University.

Blonde Bonnie Lou, daughter of Mrs. Lilly Nordman, is a Redmond High School graduate and attended Central Oregon College last year. Her favorite subjects were history and literature, and she plans to continue her education this fall at the University of Oregon, in order to be a high school language teacher.

The model-size lass is 5 feet, 8 inches tall, weighs 132 pounds, wears a size 12 and has perfect 36-26-36 measurements. When she isn't attending rodeos or competing in riding contests, she likes to sew or eat berry pie.

Born in Idaho Falls, Idaho, Princess Bonnie Lou won the senior girls all-around trophy at the Klamath Basin Junior Rodeo earlier this year. Last year, she was queen of the Christmas Valley rodeo and a princess on the Sisters rodeo court.

She gives Shorty, her quarterhorse, due credit for her wins in competition. In the eight years she has owned him, he has proved his ability to perform in any rodeo event.

Princess Andrea, whose family owns a string of some 15 race horses, is the daughter of Mrs. Viola Lowe. A member of the rally squad at Redmond High School, she will be a senior this year and was elected vice-president of the Rally Club.

A diminutive size 10, she is 5 feet, 3 inches tall, weighs 120 pounds, and has a shapely 35-24-36 figure.

Besides rodeos and race horses, she likes swimming, drawing, oil painting and participating in chorus activities at school. She hopes

to be a commercial artist, and will attend Oregon State University following graduation from high school.

Born in Bend, Princess Andrea said that Central Oregon Day at Portland Meadows was a high spot in her experiences as a court member. This is the first time she has competed in a queen contest.

Penny, her four-year-old quarterhorse mare, is a pet who has winnowed ways and "likes to be babied." She climbs up on the corral gate and begs for grain. Princess Andrea trained the horse, which was purchased two years ago from Cal Butler.

The three court members are involved in the busiest week of their young lives, with the event-packed schedule to continue through Sunday, closing day of the Fair.

Full schedule to continue into Sunday

REDMOND — The 1963 Deschutes county fair, 44th in a series dating to pioneer days when potatoes ruled irrigated fields, officially opened here today with 4-H and FFA judging of exhibits and livestock.

The program will continue into Sunday, with Rodeo Days set for Saturday and Sunday. Friday has been set aside as Bend Day. A Bend Chamber of Commerce group will come here to join with Fair Board members at a luncheon, on the fair grounds.

Open class exhibits were being entered this afternoon.

Produce from field and garden on exhibit today indicates that despite the near-record chill of the present summer, the multi-million dollar crops from the interior country are maturing in fine style. A record yield is in prospect.

In Top Shape

Livestock is in top shape, early visitors to pavilions agree.

This is the first time in the long history of the presentation of the Deschutes County Fair that the fair has officially opened in July. Last year, the fair moved into high gear on August 1, following the 4-H Horse Day. This year, the horse day for the young club members was cancelled due to the prevalence in other parts of the state of equine influenza.

Cancellation of events for Tuesday put the opening date on the final day of July. In early days, county fairs were held around October 1, as the harvest of potatoes moved into high gear.

Rodeo days this year will again start Saturday with a parade through downtown Redmond, at 11 a.m. This feature annually attracts crowds that choke streets of downtown Redmond.

Opening Rodeo Saturday

The opening rodeo will be held at 1:15 p.m. on Saturday, following a grand entry of participants. The final rodeo will be Sunday at 1:15 p.m. There will be races on both days of the rodeo.

Another big event on the week-end program will be the annual buckaroo breakfast, with service to start at 5:30 a.m., about the time the August sun pushes up over the Ochoco. Ralph McNulty is top hand heading up arrangements for the rangeland breakfast. It is expected that around 2800 persons will attend.

New Parking System

Visitors to the fair will find a completely revised parking system. One way traffic will be routed through the original entrance on Highland Avenue to the new parking area located between 11th Street and the grandstand. None will be permitted to exit at this location.

Jaycees this year are handling the sale of fairground admission buttons. All entering the grounds will be required to wear these buttons. Most of the proceeds from the 25 cent buttons will be used in the continued improvement of the fairgrounds.

Council votes to hire Negroes

PORTLAND (UPI)—The Portland City Council today suspended its rules and unanimously approved an agreement to employ two Negroes in the park department in return for withdrawal of a state civil rights complaint against the city.

The council also unanimously adopted a report to shelve the controversial Albina public housing project.

No discussion was held on the issues and there were no protests from spectators.

Mayor Terry Schunk brought up the items. He had recommended the passage Tuesday.

The agreement with the Civil Rights Division of the State Labor Bureau calls for hiring of Samuel Maeon and Nathan Jones, Negro college students, who had claimed their applications for summer work were turned down because of race.

Park orders action against border raids

SEOUL (UPI) — Gen. Park Chung Hee, strong man of South Korea's military junta, ordered his forces today to take "proper punitive measures" against Communist border raiders.

Park issued the order to Defense Minister Kim Sung Eun and Foreign Minister Kim Yong Shik after conferring with U.S. Gen. Guy S. Meloy Jr.

The proposed "punitive measures" were not spelled out.

Earlier, the defense minister had said South Korea's 600,000-man army was alerted to forestall any attempt "to renew the war in Korea." He said the Communist attacks appeared to be part of a plan to increase tension.

Kim Sung Eun made his statements in an interview with UPI after three clashes between American soldiers and North Korean raiders this week left three Americans, four North Koreans, and one South Korean dead.

U.S. forces here also have been ordered on a full combat alert for the first time since the Cuban crisis last October.

The Oregon Highway Commission will meet its promises to complete projects now on the planning board, despite the fact that the state's unfinished highways needs aggregate \$440,000,000.

Glenn Jackson, Medford, chairman of the highway commission, made this announcement at a Bend Golf Club dinner here Tuesday night attended by 96 persons. It was a Bend Chamber of Commerce sponsored dinner, with the highway commissioners, U.S. Forest Service and Bureau of Public Roads officials as guests.

Tax referendum title is upheld by state court

SALEM (UPI)—The Oregon Supreme Court this morning cleared the way for circulation of petitions for a special tax referendum by upholding the ballot title written by Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton.

The court turned down an appeal by a Lane County group that the wording be changed. State Sen. Edward Fadeley, D-Eugene, argued for the change in a court hearing Tuesday.

In a brief opinion this morning, the court said Thornton's title complies with the law.

The Thornton title reads: "To increase state revenues. Abolishes federal tax deduction. Lowers personal tax rates. Provides minimum tax. Increases corporation rates, effective on or after January, 1963."

Foes of the 1963 legislature's bill to raise an added \$60 million in tax revenue now have until Sept. 1 to collect 23,185 signatures needed to bring the issue to a vote Oct. 15.

was accompanied to Bend by Commissioners Kenneth Fridley, Wasco, and David Simpson, Portland.

Projects to be constructed in Central Oregon, Jackson said, include the new route across Horse Ridge on U.S. Highway 20, the Tumalo - Sisters route of U.S. 20 and the Redmond - Sisters route of U.S. 126. Also to be modernized as a forest project will be the road into Bachelor Butte, from the forest edge west of Bend.

Jackson said a contract for the Horse Ridge work will be let in November. The overall cost of this work, in two contracts, will approximate a million dollars.

The commissioner noted that modernization work on U.S. 20 and 126 will eliminate the "danger spot" near Sisters, where several deaths have occurred at the junction.

Frank H. Loggan of the Bend Chamber of Commerce presided at the dinner, and introduced local people. William Niskanen served as toastmaster.

The dinner was a homecoming for two members of the visiting group, Forrest Cooper, State highway engineer, and Tom Edwards, assistant highway engineer. Both formerly lived here.

Representing Governor Hatfield at the meeting was Warren Nunn, A. W. Parsons, Bureau of Public Roads engineer, Portland, was in the group, as was B. M. French, regional engineer. Vance Blackwell, engineer, represented the regional office of the U.S. Forest Service. There were 35 in the party.

The group arrived in Bend from Medford Tuesday afternoon, making the trip via Klamath Falls. The highway commission party stopped here near the end of an inspection trip. From Bend this morning, members of the group, traveling by Trailways bus, headed north for the Columbia River, to look over the reconstruction of U.S. Highway 30 in connection with work on the John Day dam.

U.S. delegation to treaty signing to include two Republican solons

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk will head an 11-member U. S. delegation which will leave for Moscow Friday night for the signing of the limited test ban treaty, the White House announced today.

The specific date for signing of the treaty has not yet been set, but it was understood that the ceremony probably would be held Monday.

The delegation will include five U.S. senators—three Democrats and two Republicans.

The inclusion of the two Republicans — Sens. George Aiken, Vt. and Leverett Saltonstall, Mass., tended to convey a bipartisan air for the trip to the ceremonial signing of the treaty.

Some other Republican leaders had served notice in advance that they would not make the trip, even if invited, and there had been reports that only Democrats

would accompany Rusk.

No House members were included in the delegation—apparently because it is the Senate that must ratify the treaty before the U.S. participation becomes binding.

Aiken is a member of the Foreign Relations Committee and Saltonstall is ranking minority member of the Armed Services Committee. Sen. Bourke Hickenlooper, R-Iowa, top GOP member of the foreign relations group, and Senate Republican Leader Everett Dirksen, Ill., had said in advance they would turn down any invitation to join the delegation.

In addition to members of the Senate—where the treaty requires a two-thirds vote for ratification—others accompanying Rusk on the Moscow trip include:

Young plans to move drug store

Allen Young, owner of the Bend Rexall Drug Co., 953 Wall Street, announced today that on or shortly before October 1 his store will occupy a new location, in quarters of the Erickson Supermarket formerly utilized by the Cornett store.

The Cornett Store recently moved into the supermarket's newly constructed addition, at the east end of the big building, on East Greenwood. The drug store has leased two-thirds of the former Cornett quarters, with the Erickson store to occupy a third in its expansion program.

Young has operated the Bend Rexall Drug Co. at the corner of Wall and Oregon since 1944, year he purchased the pharmacy firm from the late Ben E. Whisenand. The building, now owned by Dr. Harry E. Mackey, has a long history of drug store occupancy, dating to early years of the century.

Drug store houses at the Wall-Oregon corner included the Patterson store of pioneer days and the Horton store of the World War I era.

The new quarters in the Erickson Supermarket building on East Greenwood will provide Young with much-needed additional space, he noted. Available for drug store use will be about 3,000 square feet.

Area again coolest in U.S.

Central Oregon again was the coolest reporting spot in the United States, excluding Alaska, this morning. Both Bend and Redmond registered lows of 38 degrees for the night.

Warmest point reporting was Imperial, Calif., with a high of 111. Bend's high Tuesday was 80 degrees.
