

# Lumber unions carry out threat of surprise strikes

Northwest lumber unions carried out their threat to call surprise strikes against members of the Timber Operators Council today with shutdowns at Sweet Home, Lebanon and North Bend, Ore.

The closures came hours before Region 3 President Harvey Nelson of the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) and Earl Hartley, executive secretary of the Western Council of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers (LSW), were to meet in Salem with Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield.

The union officials Tuesday accepted Hatfield's invitation to talk over means of settling the contract dispute which has idled more than 29,000 workers in four states since June 5.

**Santiam Plants Hit**  
Pickets appeared today at Santiam Lumber Company's plywood plant and sawmill at Sweet Home, idling about 450 men. The company's Lebanon plywood division and mill were struck at the same time, throwing another 300 men out of work, according to company estimates.

The Sweet Home workers are represented by the LSW and those at Lebanon by the IWA.

Workers walked off their jobs at the Menasha Plywood Corp. plant at North Bend when pickets appeared at 7 a.m. The day shift already had started when the pickets reached the plant. The LSW represents about 325 workers at a plywood plant and stud mill.

Another 100 men in logging crews continued to work today, but there were reports the strike would spread to them Thursday.

**Rainier Firm Threatened**  
Dick Gilmer, public relations director for the IWA in Portland, also announced the Rainier Manufacturing Co. at Rainier, Ore., would be struck today.

However, a company spokesman said 170 workers there already were on their annual vacation and were not scheduled to return until Aug. 12. No pickets had appeared this morning.

The IWA served notice Tuesday night that a strike against the McCloud River Lumber Co. at McCloud, Calif., was "imminent." Paul Pugh, regional area administrator for the union, charged the firm had failed to live up to prior commitments. Talks broke down shortly before the announcement.

PRINEVILLE — Officials of the Ochoeco Lumber Company report that they were scheduled to meet with union negotiators of Region 3, IWA-CIO from Portland tonight, but that union officials called from Portland yesterday and cancelled the meeting.

No explanation was given for the cancellation and no future meeting date is planned at the moment, a spokesman for the lumber company stated.

The Ochoeco Lumber Company is the only union-organized mill in the Prineville area. If Ochoeco were to come in the path of the current spreading strike situation of the lumber industry in the Northwest, it would affect some 165 to 170 employees.

Union negotiators, when they called the Ochoeco Lumber Company yesterday to cancel the planned meeting, asked mill officials to notify local union officials.

## Mid-Oregon students spend summer months in Honduras

(Editor's note: This is the last of a series of articles on Exchange Students, Inc., a unique organization with headquarters in Bend.)

Ten Central Oregon students have been able to spend the summer months in Honduras, with visits arranged by Exchange Students, Inc.

Alic Hirn and Elizabeth Edmonds, both of Redmond, spent the summer of 1960 in Honduras. Last summer, Willis Sintay of John Day and Ruth Morrison, Redmond, were there.

Rene Macy, Tom Waler, Culver; Charles Palmer, David Miller, Burns, and Andy Wayman, Bend, left June 10 to spend this summer in the Central American country.

While visiting, the students live in private homes at the Pan-American School of Agriculture, about 16 miles from Tegucigalpa, the capital.

Activities are planned so the students get to know both the people and the country. They spend two or three days at the United Fruit's banana plantation. This year's group also visited the Mayan ruins at Copan.

Small groups go by bus into remote areas of the country to see native villages. They live there for several days.

On returning to Oregon a two-day stop will be made outside Mexico City to visit the family of Maria Gonzales, who attended school in Bend last year. The tour group also will see Aztec ruins in the area.

Students are selected for the trip in various ways. Bend and Culver students were chosen this year by a school committee. In Burns, students were named by the high school students council.

The total cost for each student is around \$400, of which \$250 is for transportation. Food, lodging, and administrative costs for the trip make up the rest of the total.

Student's families are responsible for expenses unless assisted by the community or school. Service clubs and schools provided funds for the students this year in Burns and Culver.

To date, Exchange Students, Inc., has been supported through the donations of private individuals, two non-profit organizations, and two or three commercial firms in Bend.

Student body associations in Madras, Redmond, John Day, and Burns high schools have contributed scholarships to the Honduran exchange students.

The Wilk Foundation, established by Dr. and Mrs. Bradford N. Pease of Bend, has contributed funds to the organization. Another non-profit organization, S. S. Johnson Foundations, set up by Samuel Johnson, Redmond, has helped put together a brochure for presentation to various institutions.

With the brochure, the organization hopes to get financial backing from larger foundations.

Funds are needed for administrative expenses and for aid in transportation and winter clothing expenses. Students also need adequate insurance coverage.

Interest has been shown and the organization is working to expand. The combination of the two should open opportunities to more than the present total of 25.
