Many activities pack six days of Deschutes Fair

The 1963 Deschutes County Fair actually will be a five-day show. The county fair program will end on Sunday, August 4, with a rodeo. This will be the second of two arena performances.

This afternoon's program was largely confined to judging of 4-H exhibits, 4-H and FFA judging contests and the dairy judging contest.

Thursday, August 1, will include all day judging of 4-H classes. Open classes will be entered in the afternoon, and at 7 p.m. will come the 4-H interviews.

Friday, August 2, will be a busy day, with judging of booths to start at 8 a.m. Work of judging 4-H exhibits will start at the same hour. By 10 a.m. Friday, all open class livestock exhibits must be in place. There will be all day judging and exhibits.

On Friday at 8 p.m. the 4-H dress revue will be held.

For the general public, Friday, Saturday and Sunday will be the "big days" at the fair. Heralding the start of Rodeo Days, there will be a street parade at 12 noon on Saturday through downtown Redmond. First of the two rodeos will be at 1:30 Saturday, with cutting horse events to be stressed.

Saturday, August 3, the 4-H and FFA market stock auction sale will be held, starting at 7:30 a.m.

Sunday's program will open with the buckaroo breakfast, from 5:30 to 8:30 a.m. The rodeo and races, including cutting horse events, will start at 1:30.

A total of 96 4-H demonstrations were given by Deschutes County youngsters during pre-fair week activities held at Bond Junior High School. Thirty were given in the home economics division and thirty-six in the agriculture.

John Schmid, Deschutes County extension and 4-H club worker, described the demonstrations as the "best tool for developing boys and girls." Each demonstrator must show something new to someone

who knows little or nothing about his or her project. He must also explain the demonstration while it is being shown.

Each demonstrator has a half hour to present their idea and then clear the area. Demonstrations may be given individually or as a two-member team. Both the divisions are divided into junior, intermediate and senior divisions, according to age.

Home economic demonstrations

are related to child care, bachelor clothing, clothing, food preservation, food preparation, home living, knitting, outdoor cooking, junior leadership, safety, health, and creative arts projects.

Agriculture demonstrations are from bee keeping, electricity, entomology, field crops, forestry, safety, horticulture, livestock, marketing, poultry, tractor, wildlife conservation, woodworking, photography, junior leadership and health projects.
