

Action aplenty due in rodeo action at Fair

Rodeo riders from all over the country will join fans from all over the state at the Deschutes County Fair Rodeo. This year's action promises to be bigger and better than ever.

Spectators will watch seven action-packed events. Top cowboys will compete in both bareback and saddlebronc riding, two of the earliest rodeo events ever performed.

Dust will fly as the calf roping, team roping, and bulldogging events get under way. Other events will be the wild horse race and the girl's barrel racing, and Brahma bull riding.

Livestock for this Interstate Rodeo Association event will be supplied by Sonny Bain of Antelope. Bain will supply 60 bucking horses and 62 fleet-of-foot cattle.

Entry fees for events will be \$20. Purses for each event will total \$200 plus entry fees. It will be split 60 per cent to first place, 25 per cent to second, and 15 per cent to third place. Each dollar that a cowboy wins counts for one point toward his national standing.

Colorful Indian teepees will dot the fair grounds again this year as the Warm Springs tribe arrives for fair activities. Over 200 are expected. They will have displays in the exhibit building. The Indians will be decked out in their beaded regalia for the Saturday morning parade and will enter in the various races during the rodeo.

Thundering hooves will respond to the starting gun in the races held during the Deschutes County fair. Entry fee is \$10 which must be paid by 6 p.m. the night before the race. Entry fee for the Roman and chariot races is \$25.

This money is added to the total purse. The chariot and Roman races will pay \$150 dollars each day to the winners. Other races will pay \$100.

Seven different races will be run this year on the half mile track. Contestants from all over the state will enter the quarter, half mile and relay races. Other races will be the 220 quarter horse race, and the mile free for all.

The two most exciting races will be the Roman and chariot races. Entries are expected from Lakeview, St. Paul and the local area.

Maurice Roberts, manager and owner of Roberts' Department Store in Redmond, awarded prizes to top scorers in each clothing division.

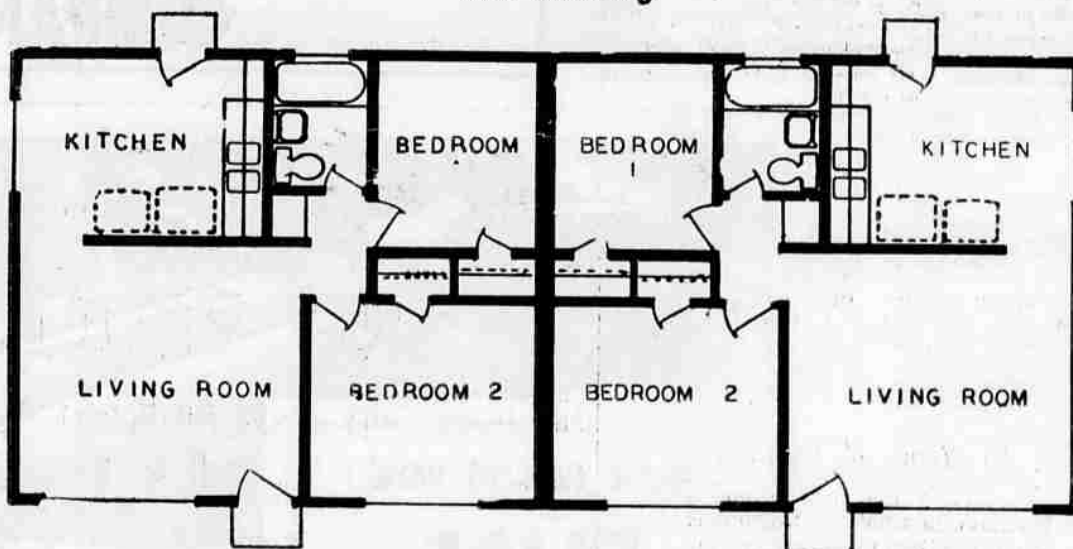
