

Fair board has spent many months preparing '63 event

Meet the Deschutes county Fair Board.

They are Laddie Jordan, Redmond, president; Lowell Hirtzel, Bend, vice - president; George McKinnon, Redmond, treasurer; Bill Mayfield, Redmond, secretary; Howard Silver, Roy Newell, Carl Galloway, John Copenhaver, Claude Tate and Friday Holmes, all of Redmond; Walter Smead and Lowell Jensen, Bend, and C. B. Adams, Terrebonne.

They are the men who for nearly a year have been planning and preparing for the 1963 Deschutes County Fair. Their liaison with the county governing body is the Fair Board, members of which are Roy Newell, president; Ellis Edgington, vice - president; Carl O. Galloway, secretary, and Friday Holmes and Lowell Hirtzel.

Closely working with the association and the board is P. M. Houk, manager of the county fair.

Each member of the Deschutes County Fair Association has his own particular assignment. For instance, Bill Mayfield is working with the Redmond Jaycees as director of the annual parade, and Tate is grandstand director, in charge of tickets.

Howard Mayfield, veteran of many arenas, is rodeo director, and Silver and Smead are 4-H and FFA directors. Newell will be in charge of concessions and will serve as director of food booths.

Hirtzel, Oregon State Police sergeant in charge of the Bend office, will be in charge of policing, and will have the title of parking director. He will also arrange for the grand entry, a feature of the rodeos. McKinnon will be dance director, and Tate will be in charge of commercial exhibits.

Racing directors will be Adams and Jordan, with Galloway again to supervise Indian entries. He will also be grounds director. Butch Sturza will be director of

the queen and court phase of the Redmond show. Copenhaver will be legal director.

Jensen has been named public relations director, and Holmes will be in charge of open class exhibitors. Bill Mayfield will be community booths director.

Houk in his capacity of manager will be publicity director.

Each season, the Deschutes County Fair Association holds one of its meetings in Bend, with Hirtzel, Jensen and Smead as "hosts."

Education seen rich field for female talents

HOLYOKE, Mass. (UPI) — Dr. Marcella R. Kelly, of Holyoke, Mass., does not believe that the variable called sex has anything to do with progress of a woman in an educational career.

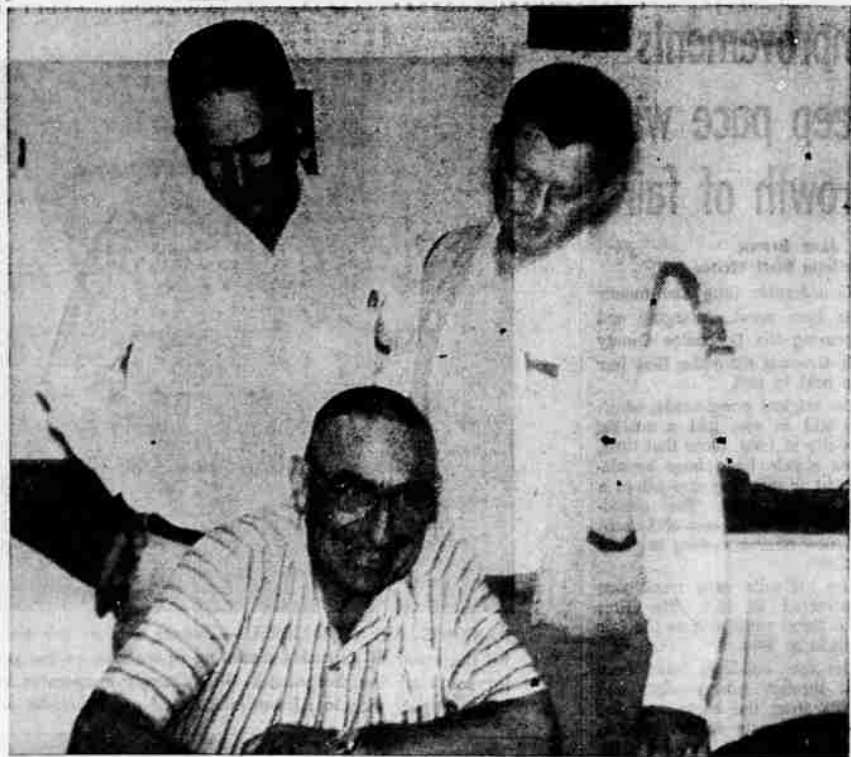
Dr. Kelly is the first woman superintendent of schools in the paper manufacturing city.

The newly appointed administrator of the Holyoke school system says ability, training and effort are the invariables which determine the success climb of man and woman — in education and other fields.

Miss Kelly has nearly 20 years of teaching, and another 15 of administrative experience supplementing her formal training.

The training includes a bachelor's at Fitchburg, Massachusetts State College, a master's from Columbia University, and a doctorate from Yale, plus study at Harvard, Brandeis and the Universities of Oslo and Rome.

Holyoke, a city of 56,000, is satisfied with its selection. The school committee also considered 40 male applicants.
