### Casey Stengel in birthday wish: win 1!

The "old man" had his birthday wish today, and who is to say he didn't deserve it.

When friends from the baseball and business worlds gathered in the little house in Glendale, Calif., Tuesday to wish Casey Stengel a "happy birthday," the 73-year-old skipper of the New York Mets said he had only one wish.

"One year with the Yankees," he explained, "I win 104 games and lose the pennant. This time my wish is more modest. I want to win just one game."

The Mets, who equalled the all-time record of 22 straight losses on the road when they lost to the Houston Colts on Sunday, obliged Stengel Tuesday night by beating the league-leading Los Angeles Dodgers, 5-1. And if you don't think the "old man" didn't do that little skip dance of his in the clubhouse after Tracy Stallard nailed down the final out, you just don't know Casey.

**Snapped Losing Streak**  
Your joy would be unrestrained, too, if you managed the Mets and had to watch them lose almost every day, and then were presented with a victory over the Dodgers, a club the Mets have beaten only three times in two seasons.

The win not only snapped an 11-game current losing streak for the Mets but also dealt the Dodgers a jolt just when they had hoped to recover from a slump, for both the second-place San Francisco Giants and third-place St. Louis Cardinals won to cut Los Angeles' once "safe" lead to just 3½ games.

The Giants, paced by Billy O'Dell's shutout pitching, rolled to their ninth straight victory, 5-0, over the Philadelphia Phillies, while the Cards, now just 4 games off the pace, edged the Cincinnati Reds, 7-5.

Stallard, who pitched the Mets' last road victory on June 15 at Cincinnati, went all the way for New York and gave up just four hits, one of them Ken McMullen's fourth home run. The Mets' manwhore, raked three Los Angeles pitchers, beginning with ex-Met Bob Miller, for 14 hits in one of their finest hitting performances.

Every Met except Jim Hickman got at least one hit to make it a team "birthday present" for Stengel. Frank Thomas hit his ninth home run and Joe Hicks had three hits.

The Phils pecked away at O'Dell (11-6) for 11 hits but the Giant lefty survived, thanks to two double plays and Willie McCovey's three-run homer, his 51st of the season which gave him the major league lead. Willie Mays, once again the clutch hitter, hit a pair of doubles and scored twice. Ray Culp (10-9) was the loser but the Phils may have suffered an even greater loss when Art Mahaffey twisted his right ankle while pitching in the seventh inning.

The Reds jumped on Lew Burdette for four runs in the first inning but they got only one more the rest of the way as Ernie Broglio and Bobby Shantz combined to hold the fort while the Card hitters caught up. A two-run homer by Bill White and a bases-empty one by Charley James figured prominently in the St. Louis attack. A pair of errors by Leo Cardenas made two of the St. Louis runs unearned.

In the other National League games, the Pittsburgh Pirates backed Joe Gibbon's seven-hit pitching with a 14-hit attack for an 8-1 win over the Houston Colts and the Milwaukee Braves routed the Chicago Cubs, 9-2, on homers by Lee Maye, Eddie Mathews and Denis Menke.

PRINEVILLE — A total purse of \$4275 awaits cowboy winners of the riding and roping events in the 18th annual Crooked River Roundup here August 9-11.

Oregon's cowboy capital offers rodeo - goes top entertainment with the six events and five races, plus several extra - curricular events.

Three performances will be seen in the riding and roping competition. Broken down by events, the large purse includes the following prize monies: Team roping (Daily) has a purse of \$675, with a \$50 entry fee. Calf roping is \$35. A \$900 purse awaits the champions of the saddle bronc riding event. The entry fee is \$25.

Entries close at 6 p.m., August 8. According to the roundup board, all fees must be paid in cash or by money order. The entry fees are added to the purse.

Two of the five races bear \$150 purses. The quarter horse race will run on Saturday and Sunday (August 10-11), with \$75 in prize money offered per day. It will be split \$37.50, \$22.50, and \$15, for first, second, and third places respectively. The "mad scramble" is for local entrants only. The purse split runs \$25, \$15, and \$10 respectively.

A maximum of 30 ropers will be allowed in the steer-stopping event which runs all three days. Here again, the event is open only to local entrants. The entry fee is posted at \$10. The purse is set for \$50 per day.

A purse of \$75 awaits the winner of the girls barrel race. The entry fee is \$10. An age limit of 18 has been leveled on the cowhide race. It has a total purse of \$75, first place nets \$15 and second, \$10.

Crook-O-Doa pre - roundup festivities has attractions every night from Tuesday through Friday. Tuesday night offers viewers a talent show and street dancing. It also will be game night.

Wednesday evening will see a barbecue at the Prineville Reservoir plus a water show. There also will be a fireworks display, Indian dancing, street dancing, events for the kiddies, and games are on the docket for Thursday night.

On top of everything else, the Prineville Golf and Country Club will host the National Cowboy Golf Championship. This event will run both Thursday and Friday.

Patrons will get a chance to feast their eyes on the West's best in the Indian Beauty Contest that runs in conjunction with the Rodeo Dance on Friday and Saturday night. A buckaroo breakfast will whet appetites of early-risers and stay-out-late'ers from 12:01 a.m. to 8:30 a.m.

A professional wrestling card has been added to enhance the annual Crooked River fest. It will be Saturday at the Roundup grounds. Grapple time is 8 p.m.

Two bone benders will vie for the Northwest heavyweight grunt and groin belt. Current champion Billy Whitewolf will face Soldat Gorkey.

Other attractions on the mat card include the Shug Thomas-Pat Patterson match, and another pitting Wild Bill Savage against Abe Jacobs.
