Reminder given on water rules

City Manager Hal Puddy asked cooperation from Bend residents today in observing the following restrictions regarding irrigation and use of water.

Code — It shall be unlawful to use water irrigation any hours other than the regulated ones:

Persons with even numbered houses may use water for irrigation on even numbered calendar days from 5 a.m. to 9 p.m. Persons having odd numbered houses may irrigate on odd days, during the same hours. No irrigation will be allowed on August 31, however.

Puddy issued a plea for irrigators to not waste water and asked water users to keep it from running in the street. Fines not to exceed \$25 will be levied on violators.

Girls in the court this year are Susie Stover, Sally Van Blaricom, Connie and Carolyn Still, Sandra Warner, Judy Culver, Susan Burman, Mary Meteere, Carolyn Cleveland and Kay Norton.

All eight girls are scheduled to ride in the Deschutes county parade and in the rodeo grand entry at that neighboring community Saturday. They will possibly make a re-appearance on Sunday.

Turning towards their own rodeo, the Crooked River Roundup August 9-11, they will first appear in their glamorous court regalia at a talent show Tuesday evening in downtown Prineville, to be held in connection with Crook-O-Dao days.

Continuing with Crook-O-Dao, they will go to the Prineville reservoir Wednesday, when each girl is scheduled to ride in her own speedboat during formation water maneuvers. Beginning in the late afternoon, a public barbecue is to be served and visitors will be entertained with water activities and, later, a giant display of fireworks.

On Thursday, the girls will be put on their mettle for the queen competition. Not until Sunday will the charming octet learn which of them has been chosen Crooked River Roundup Queen for 1963. The coronation will be held in connection with the final rodeo show.

Fire controlled east of Madras

By United Press International A fire in the Crooked River national grasslands area about four miles east of Madras burned 160 acres Wednesday before being brought under control, the U. S. Forest Service said today.

It broke out about 11 a.m. and was controlled 3 1/2 hours later, chief dispatcher Clarence Edgington reported. The blaze was listed as man-caused, but Edgington said an investigation was under way into its exact cause.

The fire was one of 12 reported in Oregon and Washington by the Forest Service Wednesday. Nine lightning-caused blazes in the Okanogan and Wenatchee National Forests of Washington burned less than one acre each, as did fires in Oregon's Umatilla and Walla-Walla forests.

The Oregon Forestry Department reported five fires were brought under control quickly on state-protected land Wednesday. The largest burned about five acres near Pendleton.

Warning issued on unclean eggs

A warning has been issued by the Tri-County Health Department for people to avoid buying or using cracked or unclean eggs.

A number of outbreaks of severe gastro-enteritis have occurred during the past four months, particularly in the East. In a number of instances, substantial evidence has been accumulated to incriminate the use of raw or under-cooked eggs.

Persons who are ill, especially infants, and persons with gastrointestinal disorders and malignancies should not be fed raw or undercooked eggs.

An undercooked egg is one in which the white is not firm. Cracked eggs are used for a variety of commercial purposes. Thorough cooking will effectively sterilize the product.

Storms cover wide area of country

By United Press International Scattered thunderstorms prowled the nation from the Great Plains to the Gulf Coast today and day-long showers were on tap for the North Atlantic states.

Rainfall during the night was generally light with the highest amounts measuring a tenth of an inch through the Great Lakes area.

A tornado spun through the outskirts of Cadillac, Mich., Wednesday night, demolishing buildings, unroofing homes and uprooting trees. The twister came within a quarter-mile of a large crowd gathered at a fair but no injuries were reported.

Gusty thunderstorms Wednesday dropped more than 1 1/2 inches of rain at Robins Air Force Base near Macon, Ga., and other storms drenched the Chicago area and sections of Wisconsin, Michigan and Indiana.
