

Timber operators propose to put wage offer in effect

 The Timber Operators Council, in a stunning step to end the Northwest lumber dispute, today recommended putting its latest wage offer to three lumber unions into effect without their approval.

The council, which represents 196 firms in the Douglas Fir belt from Northern California to Alaska, recommended to its members that its offer of a 25-cent an hour pay increase over three years go into effect immediately.

An estimated 30,000 employees would get a 12-cent pay increase retroactive to June 1, when the last contracts with the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) and the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union (LSW) expired.

No Word From Unions
 Union leaders were not available for comment on the action. Neither was there any immediate word on what effect the move would have on some TOC members already struck or on members of the Big Six bargaining group, also closed.

The TOC said the unions rejected the 25-cent package offer at a meeting in Portland July 25.

Registered letters notifying the unions of the TOC plan were sent Thursday night to Harvey Nelson, president of Region 3 of the IWA, and Earl Hartley, executive secretary of the Western Council, LSW, the association said.

"In making this offer, we are fully cognizant of our legal responsibility of continuing to bargain collectively," emphasized Karl F. Glos, executive vice president of the TOC in Portland.

"We feel strongly that the offer is fair and proper under the circumstances. We are determined to attempt to bring the negotiations to a conclusion as quickly as possible."

26 Cents Maximum
 The TOC said July 25 that the 26-cent offer was the maximum under present lumber industry

conditions and a steady increase in Canadian lumber sales in the United States.

It called the unions' demands for 33 1/2 cents "unrealistic and uneconomical." The unions got 33 1/2 cents from Simpson Timber Co. in a settlement announced July 19.

About 29,000 workers are idle in Oregon, Washington, northern California and Montana in a strike against some TOC members, independent firms, and two members of the Big Six. The other four Big Six members closed in sympathy.

No additional strikes were reported Thursday or today.

Mrs. Dell Cowan dies Thursday

Professional memberships included the Oregon Music Teachers Assn., Mid-Oregon Music Teachers Club, National Federation of Music Clubs, Mu Phi Epsilon National Music Sorority and Delta Sigma Epsilon National Sorority.

Mrs. Cowan attended the Chattanooga School of Music, Sophie Newcomb College of Music of Tulane University, Northwestern School of Music in Minneapolis, McPhill College of Music, also Minneapolis, and the University of New York College of Education in Buffalo.

Petition filed in Portland further complicates Pilot Butte Inn snarl

 The mass of legal entanglements involving the Pilot Butte Inn, sold July 11 to Martin T. Byrne of Seattle, continues to get more complicated.

A petition has been filed by the Pilot Butte Inn Co., in U.S. District Court in Portland, to have the sale set aside, and the case remanded to Deschutes County Circuit Court. William Corbett is the principal party in the Pilot Butte Inn Co. He has been managing the hotel for several months.

The petition contends certain legal requirements were not met

in the sale, and declares that federal courts have no jurisdiction.

Byrne bought the Bend landmark for \$50,000, subject to federal tax liens. The sale was forced to satisfy a judgment in California U.S. District Court against Frank William Corbett, a son of William Corbett.

Lawyers representing the elder Corbett contend that Frank William Corbett was not the owner of the hotel, and that Byrne could not assume ownership through assumption of Frank Corbett's equity.

The sale could have been confirmed 10 days after the auction by Federal Judge William G. East, but Byrne has not yet filed a motion asking confirmation.

The petition to have the sale set aside was filed by a Portland firm of lawyers representing some of the Corbett interests. The Pilot Butte Inn Co. has a judgment against Dickerson, Inc., a corporation comprised of members of the Corbett family and others.

The attorneys representing Byrne succeeded in having the litigation removed from circuit court and jurisdiction transferred to federal court. They said that Byrne is also suing Mr. and Mrs. William Corbett, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Corbett and Mr. and Mrs. Jack Corbett for an additional \$200,000. Jack Corbett is also a son of William Corbett.

The historic landmark was sold on the courthouse steps, by a deputy U.S. marshal. Several other efforts to sell the hotel to satisfy Byrne's judgment had been thwarted by circuit court orders.

Worker dies of asphyxiation

NEWPORT (UPI)—Construction worker Lee Paulson, 22, Ontario, died Thursday of asphyxiation at a construction project 1 1/2 miles east of Newport.

Paulson, an employe of Arenz Construction Co., Portland, was lowered into a manhole about 2:30 p.m. to search for a severed pipeline. When fellow workers were unable to arouse him an ambulance from Newport was called.

Ambulance driver Bob Boyd was lowered into the hole and immediately lost consciousness.

A Newport Fire Department member with a gas mask then retrieved Paulson, who was pronounced dead on arrival at the Pacific Community Hospital here. Boyd was reported in satisfactory condition.

The crew was repairing damage done by a slide last winter on U.S. Highway 20 between Newport and Toledo. The Lincoln County Health Office was conducting tests today to determine what caused the men to become unconscious.

Mental health study planned

The study will begin August 4 with a look at the Mental Health Association, its aims and accomplishments. Mr. Randall Moore is in charge of the first program.

On August 11, Miss Helen Marcy, Tri-County psychiatric social worker, will speak about mental illness, its causes, and our relation to patients in state hospitals under the new state program.

Dr. William Guyer will be in charge of the program on psychosomatic illness on August 18. There will be a discussion August 25 on "Finding Christian answers to the Problem of the Mentally Ill." It will be led by Alvo Martin, retired Navy chaplain.
