Two building fires cause heavy loss

Building fire at Portland and Salem Friday night and early today caused extensive damage to a lumber firm and the state operated Cottage Farm.

Cause of a blaze that destroyed the crane shed of the Jones Lumber Co. in Portland was under investigation today. The 250-foot long building was engulfed in flames when the fire alarm was turned in shortly before midnight.

Firemen were able to keep the fire from spreading to the mill and company offices. The shed was part of the saw mill and planing equipment which was to be sold at auction Aug. 20.

Damage was not immediately estimated. The shed was used to store lumber stock, but was nearly empty.

Firemen had the blaze under control and nearly out within an hour. Twenty-one pieces of equipment responded to the four alarms.

A spectacular blaze near Salem caused more than \$50,000 damage to the state operated Cottage Farm barns.

Cause of the fire was being investigated.

A barn valued at \$40,000 was destroyed and roofs of a smaller barn and silo were damaged. No livestock was in the barns.

Nine pieces of equipment from the Salem and Four Corners fire departments and the Oregon Correctional Institution fought the blaze. It was under control after about two hours.

Flames shot hundreds of feet into the air and were visible for miles.

The barns supplied dairy products to other state institutions.

A roaring range fire which has blackened more than 450 acres near Klamath Falls was reported still out of control this morning.

It was one of 10 forest and range fires which started in the state Friday.

Two fires near Bend were reported controlled Friday night. The largest charred some 350 acres and the other burned about 80 acres.

Seven other fires, all under 15 acres, were reported controlled around the state.

The 450 acre blaze southwest of Klamath Falls near Keno was in scattered brush and timber. About 80 men were on the fires lines today including a number of volunteers from nearby sawmills and U.S. Air Force personnel.

A new fire trail was cut but high winds made control operations difficult.

CD agency must scrape along with 3 people

SALEM (UPI)—Oregon's Civil Defense agency is going to have to scrape along with only three people.

By a six to three vote Friday afternoon the State Emergency Board turned down a request for \$46,110 to double the three man staff.

The decision came after two hours of discussion where Civil Defense officials argued that the trimmed agency couldn't perform the work which state law sets out for it to do.

The recent legislature cut the civil defense staff from 18 members to three.

Voting against giving more money to the agency were Sens. Harry Boivin, D-Klamath Falls, E. D. Potts, D-Grants Pass and "Vard Cook, D-Portland, House Speaker Clarence Barton, D-Coquille, and Reps. Ross Morgan, D-Portland and Beulah Hand, D-Milwaukie.

More money was favored by Senate President Ben Musa, D-The Dalles, and Reps. Shirley Field, R-Portland, and Stafford Hansell, R-Hermiston.

Hansell said that when the legislature approved the present Civil Defense budget it was believed by many lawmakers that the federal government would match the state money to make a six person staff for the agency.

He said he could support a six member staff but would be against seeking any federal matching money to increase it further.

THREE ESCAPE INJURY

PORTLAND (UPI)—A 28-foot cabin cruiser exploded and burned in the Willamette River here Friday night. Three men in the boat escaped without injury into the water.

The vessel, which was in the river less than five minutes, was destroyed. It was valued at \$11,000.

J. D. Zellerbach reported to be critically ill

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—J.D. Zellerbach, former United States ambassador to Italy and San Francisco civic leader, was reported in critical condition today after brain surgery.

Zellerbach, 71, was stricken Thursday night at his home here and rushed to Mt. Zion Hospital. He underwent surgery for three hours last night and was reported still to be unconscious today.

Doctors said that Zellerbach had been suffering headaches and minor discomforts for the past few weeks, but there was no indication of the gravity of his illness prior to Thursday night.

The operation was performed to relieve pressure on the brain, but doctors have not determined what caused the pressure.

The suddenness of the attack came as a shock to Zellerbach's family. His wife was under sedation at the family home. His brother, Harold Zellerbach, rushed home from British Columbia, where he had been vacationing.

Zellerbach, long a major figure in San Francisco affairs, is director and chairman of the board of the Crown Zellerbach Corp. here as well as director of several banks and other business firms.

He is also president of the San Francisco Symphony Association and an important figure in maintaining the city's cultural life.

Zellerbach was ambassador to Italy from 1956 to 1960.

Fresh tremors shake Skopje

SKOPJE, Yugoslavia (UPI)—Fresh tremors shook the rubble of earthquake-shattered Skopje today but inflicted no new destruction on the Macedonian capital.

Government officials said Skopje University seismographs recorded nine earth shocks between 2:30 p.m. (9:30 a.m. EDT) Friday and 7:30 this morning, the strongest—five degrees on the standard scale—coming a few seconds after midnight.

Tremors of four degree strength hit at 7:30 a.m. (2:30 a.m. EDT) today and 8:00 p.m. (10 a.m. EDT) Friday.

Rescue workers said the shocks—mild in comparison to the better than 10 degree earthquake that smashed the city July 26—shook the rubble but did not topple any buildings still intact.

Casualty identification officials said seven more bodies were pulled from collapsed buildings overnight but none could be identified.

Landis faces sentence for late returns

NEW YORK (UPI)—James M. Landis, braintrust for three Democratic administrations and one-time dean of the Harvard Law School, was free today in his own custody pending sentencing for filing late federal income tax returns.

Landis is scheduled to be sentenced Aug. 30 on five counts of filing tardy returns. Each of the counts carries a maximum penalty of one year in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

He appeared Friday before Federal Court Judge Edward McLean and pleaded guilty to the charges, all of which are misdemeanors. Representing him was Dean William Warren of the Columbia Law School.

In a statement to the court, Warren pointed out that Landis voluntarily paid all the taxes due the government, along with the maximum civil penalties, as soon as they had been calculated.

U.S. Atty. Robert M. Morgenthau, who filed the charges, said Landis failed to file income tax returns on time for the years 1956 through 1960.

The returns for the five years, Morgenthau said, "were filed at one time—recently." He added, "This does not meet the government standard of voluntary disclosure."

Warren said Landis, a New York attorney who lives in suburban Harrison, sold inherited securities for which the tax base had not been determined, thus creating delays. More delays in figuring and filing the returns, Warren said, were due to Landis being busy in "public affairs and the affairs of clients."

Dr. Ward, key figure in vice scandal, dies

Boy or girl? JFK refuses to speculate

HYANNIS PORT, Mass. (UPI)—President Kennedy refused today to take a public stand on one of the most important questions before him: Will his wife's baby this month be a boy or girl?

In 1960, two months prior to the birth of their son John Jr., Kennedy boldly predicted they would have a boy.

Newsman had asked in Washington several days ago whether the President was making any forecasts about their third child, and the query was repeated at the weekend White House where there was nothing much else to ask.

White House Press Secretary, Pierre Salinger, smiling, said he had taken the matter up with the President, and the spokesman asserted:

"He is going to confine himself to such predictions in election years."

"Does this mean there is going to be another baby next year?" a reporter asked.

"You can read anything into that you want," Salinger replied.

During a whistle-stop train tour from Northern to Southern California in September, 1960, Kennedy predicted his daughter Caroline would be getting a baby brother.

Kennedy went yachting with some family and friends this afternoon. It was an uneventful day at Cape Cod—except for Salinger's news morsel.

The Chief Executive arrived here late Friday afternoon, just after a heavy downpour splashed a half inch of rain on Otis Air Force Base, Mass., in less than 15 minutes.

Kennedy flew by helicopter to the family's "compound" of homes at Hyannis Port, where he was met by his wife, Jacqueline, and their two children, Caroline, 5, and John Jr., 2.

The President's convalescing father, 74-year-old Joseph P. Kennedy, was waiting as usual on the porch of his big home which faces Nantucket Sound and on whose lawn the helicopter landed.

Kennedy kissed his wife and children, then stepped over to greet some bystanders. Among them was the 1959 Miss America, Mississippi's Mary Ann Mobley, appearing here in a music-television production of "Guys and Dolls."

The President motored the half-mile to his home, and within a short time went to the nearby Hyannis Port Club for five holes of golf on the rain-soaked course.

Kennedy, spending his fifth consecutive weekend at Cape Cod, plans to fly back to the White House Monday morning.

ASTRONAUTS A-OK

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The nation's astronauts are all in tip-top shape — rumors circulating here and in Houston, Tex., to the contrary.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration refuted the rumors Friday after receiving inquiries about the health of M. Scott Carpenter and Walter M. Schirra Jr. Neither Carpenter nor Schirra are in poor health because of their orbital flights "or for any other reasons," the agency said, citing their doctor as the authority.

Heavy thunderstorms still roam Great Lakes region

Heavy thunderstorms roamed the Great Lakes region today with high winds and hail. The toll of dead and injured in two days of storms continued to rise.

The rain storms, which triggered accidents and fires across the Midwest Friday, were expected to diminish during the day.

Winds nearly 100 miles an hour lashed Wisconsin Friday, shredding trees and toppling utility poles. Scattered thundershowers soaked parts of the Southwest and Gulf Coast.

A funnel cloud was spotted near Joliet, Ill., and hailed piled an inch deep on the ground east of Rockford, Ill. An inch of rain hit Fort Myers, Fla., and observers at Key West reported several waterspouts.

Nearly an inch of rain and hail fell at Memphis, Tenn., during the night. Flagstaff, Ariz., was soaked with 1 1/4 inches of rain. Douglas, Ariz., had 1 1/4 inches

and more than an inch fell at Grand Canyon.

At least 20 persons were injured when a city bus collided with another vehicle on rain-slicked streets at storm-battered Chicago. Six persons were killed and another was seriously injured in the head-on collision of a pickup truck and a station wagon on a mountain highway near Silver Plume, Colo., during a driving rainstorm.

Storms along the mid-Atlantic Coast were blamed for two lightning deaths and two boating deaths Thursday.

The first hurricane of the season, Arlene, moved across the Caribbean at about 14 miles per hour during the night. The weather bureau said winds were 100 m.p.h. near the center of the storm, located about 1,000 miles southeast of San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Vessels in the path of the hurricane were warned to exercise extreme caution.

Rusk arrives in Russia for pact signing Monday

MOSCOW (UPI)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk arrived here from Washington today to take part in the signing Monday of the three-power partial nuclear test ban treaty.

Rusk made the journey aboard President Kennedy's personal jet plane, stopping off en route for two hours in Copenhagen. The plane landed at Moscow's Vnukovo Airport at 10:50 a.m. EDT.

Rusk said in Copenhagen that "things are going to move on nicely" in Moscow, where he will discuss other cold war issues with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko in the days following the treaty signing.

British Foreign Secretary Lord Home said as he left London for Moscow that "after the signing we shall talk about the follow-up to the test ban and see if we can identify those subjects which require further examination."

Home arrived at the flag-bedecked airport a few minutes after Rusk. Both were met by Gromyko, U.S. Ambassador Foy

D. Kohler, and British Ambassador Sir Humphrey Trevelyan.

The Soviets were expected to hail Rusk's visit — first by an American secretary of state in 16 years—as a tangible indication the West is willing to negotiate to help end the cold war.

This is the theme Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev stressed when he called for "liquidation of the cold war" following conclusion of the test ban negotiations last month.

Rusk and Home will investigate Soviet intentions regarding a non-aggression pact, proposals for preventing surprise attack, the reduction of foreign troops in Germany, and other measures.

It was understood in Washington that Rusk was carrying a personal message from President Kennedy to Premier Khrushchev.

The British party, which includes Lord Privy Seal Edward Heath and parliamentary Under Secretary of State Peter Thomas, is traveling separately.

After an airport greeting by Soviet and American officials, the delegations will drive into town. U.S. Ambassador Foy D. Kohler will give a private dinner for Rusk and his party.

Sunday, Rusk and Home will meet for joint consultations and then dine with Kohler.

Soviet news media have been sharply critical of all those who oppose the treaty, including the Communist Chinese, France and some U.S. senators.

Weekend may be warmest

Central Oregon apparently faces its warmest weekend of the 1963 summer season, unless cooling thunderstorms move over the interior country this afternoon.

Forecasters call for "possible thunderstorms." This warning has alerted fire guards in the dry interior Oregon forests, and Bureau of Land Management crews who note that grass in range areas is tender dry.

Central Oregon temperatures are expected to reach close to 90 degrees over the weekend, with lows to drop to the cool 45 degree range.

Mostly sunny weather is the forecast for Sunday.

Medley writ denied by judge

POCATELLO, Idaho (UPI)—A Bannock County jail prisoner's hand written request for a writ of habeas corpus has been denied by Fifth District Judge Gus Carr Anderson.

Anderson ruled Friday John Phillip Medley of Wolfe Creek, Ore., was not being illegally held in Pocatello.

The prisoner had claimed in his 17-page self-prepared document that his civil rights were being violated. The judge ruled papers filed by Oregon officials were in good order.

Girl friend threatening new exposes

LONDON (UPI)—Dr. Stephen Ward, key figure in Britain's sex and security scandal of the century, died today at 3:50 p.m. (10:50 a.m. EDT).

Ward, 50-year-old society osteopath convicted of living off the earnings of prostitutes, had lain in a coma in St. Stephen's Hospital for four days before he died.

He took an overdose of sleeping pills early Wednesday, just hours before a Criminal Court jury found him guilty of the two vice charges and freed him on three others.

As Ward died, Britain waited to see if his last girl friend, 22-year-old red-haired singer Julie Gulliver would make good on her threat to expose the names of the highly-placed figures who did not testify at his trial.

Miss Gulliver said soon after Ward took the lethal overdose of sleeping pills:

"Stephen is not going to die in vain, letting a whole lot of people get off scot free. I'll make sure of that. There's a crowd of them praying for him to die so their names won't be mentioned. But if he dies I'm going to make sure their names come out."

For most of the 80 or so hours since he entered the hospital, Ward had been kept alive by artificial means. He was drip-fed through tubes in his arms and his breathing was maintained by an electronic lung.

But his heart slowly weakened, and early hospital bulletins today indicated the end was approaching fast.

Less than an hour before he died, a hospital bulletin said he was "slowly dying."

More Sensations

With his death, there was speculation that more sensations may follow in the scandal that rocked Britain and almost toppled the government of Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

Ward had been in the hospital since 2:30 a.m. (3:30 a.m. EDT) Wednesday, and had never regained consciousness. He was drip-fed by tubes in his veins and his breathing was maintained by an electronic lung.

Terror tactics laid to Reds

PANMUNJOM, Korea (UPI)—The United Nations Command (UNC) today accused Communist North Korea of jeopardizing the Korean truce by launching "an open campaign of terror" in the Demilitarized Zone bordering South Korea.

Maj. Gen. George H. Cloud of the U.S. Marines, chief negotiator for the UNC, also expressed "outrage" at "provocative, hostile" incidents below the truce line.

Four Communists, three Americans and one South Korean policeman were killed in incidents earlier this week. Cloud warned such acts "seriously threatened" the 10-year-old armistice.

"Mark these words well," Cloud said. "The whole world is shocked and outraged at this open campaign of terror."

He offered to return the bodies of the four North Korean soldiers killed but the Communists, who have disclaimed all connection with the incidents, rejected the offer. They suggested the UNC killed four South Koreans and dressed them as North Koreans.

"Your murderers will be relentlessly searched out night and day," Cloud warned.

Cloud made his statements at the 17th meeting of the Korean Armistice Commission called by the United Nations.

Cloud brought up the shooting incidents and warned that North Korea would bear "full responsibility" for the outcome.
