Jordan wants to return with world track record

LONDON (UPI) — Coach Payton Jordan of the U.S. track and field team says he doesn't want to come home without a world record and predicts his men's 440-yard relay team will set one today against the British.

The Yanks, who have beaten the Russians, Poles and West Germans so far on their overseas tour, were favored to win nine of today's 10 events in the opener of a two-day meet. Sunday will be a day of rest with the meet resuming Monday.

Bob Hayes, the football star from Florida A&M who is tabbed as the "world's fastest human," anchors the 440-yard relay team, also composed of Hayes Jones of Detroit, Paul Drayton of Cleveland, and John Moon of the U.S. Army.

They were shooting at the 39.6 seconds record set by the University of Texas at Modesto, Calif., in May 1959.

"I figure the best chance of a world mark today will be in the 440-yard relay," Jordan said. "However," he added, "our baton passing will have to improve if they are to break the record."

Defense-offense shift aids Rule's golf go at St. Paul

ST. PAUL, Minn. (UPI) — It isn't often that football and golf can be compared, but in the case of professional golfer Jack Rule Jr., a shift from defense to offense is credited for his recent improvement.

Rule, Cedar Rapids, Iowa, who had a four-stroke lead at the halfway mark of the \$35,000 St. Paul Open, claimed aggressiveness "has made me a better golfer."

Rule fired a record 11-under-par 61 Friday to take the 36-hole edge. "You can't shoot a 61 and not be aggressive," he said.

The 24-year-old University of Iowa graduate, who has never won a pro tourney, set a course record Friday with his blistering 61, and came within one stroke of tying the PGA tour record of 60 which is held by seven players.

His 20 on the front side tied a course record and his 128 was a new tourney record and the best showing for 36 holes on the tour this year.

Jerry Pittman, Tulsa, Okla., shot a 65 Friday to take second place, four strokes behind Rule. Don Fairfield, Perdido Bay, Fla., was in third with a 134, and Fred Hawkins, El Paso, Tex., had a 135.

Tommy Jacobs of Bermuda Dunes, Calif., who had a 68 Thursday, started Friday's round with a surge. He was five under after his first four holes, but then ballooned to a 70 and finished 10 strokes off the pace.

Jim Ferree, Corona, Calif., first-round leader with a 64, also fell 10 strokes behind Friday when he skyrocketed to a 74.

The tourney continued today with the 75 professionals who survived the 36-hole cut, and nine amateurs. Those not shooting par 144 for the two rounds were eliminated. The only name player who dropped from the tourney was Bob Rosburg, Portland, Ore., who quit Thursday after shooting a 75.

The championship will be decided Sunday.
