



Seismic station records quake

NEW YORK (UPI) — A "very sharp" earthquake occurred today about 3,000 miles northwest of here, according to a spokesman at the Fordham University seismic station.

The Rev. Joseph Lynch, director of the station, said the location of the quake was "still uncertain" but tentatively was placed off the coast of Alaska.

The first shock occurred at 6:30 a.m. EDT and was followed by a second at 6:36 a.m., he said.

Father Lynch said his station registered the shock at least 6.25 on the Richter scale. He said the earthquake which devastated Skopje, Yugoslavia, last Friday was recorded at the station on the Richter scale at about 6.5, but that differences in the distances from the station to the point of the quake had to be taken into consideration.

Nevertheless, he said the latest tremor was strong enough to do damage in a region where buildings were not properly constructed, as was the case in the ancient city of Skopje.

Market observers waiting hopefully for summer rally

NEW YORK (UPI) — Market observers still were waiting hopefully for a summer rally and were keeping their fingers crossed that this week's fair sized advance, ending three weeks of decline, was a signal of better things to come.

While most of the experts agree there is enough technical strength in the market to pull it up—they cite its ability to resist selling pressure and bear up fairly well under adverse news—there is a glaring lack of interest.

The experts were pleased when prices advanced in the opening session and broke a string of 14 consecutive Monday declines but the lack of volume caused many to keep a tight rein on their enthusiasm.

The picture brightened even more Tuesday when prices advanced steadily throughout the day and picked up steam when the 695 level in the Dow-Jones industrial average, a point many chartists felt would be the signal of a firm upswing, was pierced.

Prices continued to push ahead on heavy volume in the early part of the next session but the bubble burst near the noon hour, gains evaporated and the session ended with a small loss.

At week's end the news picture was fairly good. Unemployment eased somewhat and retail and department store sales were up. Auto production was off considerably but this was expected since most car makers are retooling for the start of production of the 1964 model line.

Wall Streeters were cheered by the reappearance of tax legislation in the foreground of the Washington scene and the speed up in the House Ways & Means Committee's passage of various revisions to present tax laws. There has been some doubt that Congress would be able to pass any tax cutting laws before the end of the year.

Dow-Jones industrial average finished up 8.45 to 697.83. Rails jumped 2.22 and utilities tacked on 1.29. Standard & Poor's 500 stock index was up 0.76 to 69.30.

Trading totaled 16,667,250 shares compared with 16,234,722 shares a week ago and 16,890,595 in the same week last year.

Of the 1,426 issues traded this week, 716 advanced, 80 to new 1963 highs and 564 declined, 90 to new lows.

Chrysler topped the market in activity, dropping 2 1/4 to 56 1/4 on a turnover of 375,500 shares. It was followed in activity by Bruns-Weir of 1. National Airlines up 4 1/4. Sperry-Rand up 1/2. Eastern Air Lines up 2 1/2 and U.S. Smelting up 1/2.

Youngstown jumped 2 1/4 in the steel where U.S. Steel tacked on 1/2. Bethlehem dropped 1/2 and Republic gave up 1/4. Du Pont soared 8 1/4 in a sharply higher chemicals section which included Allied up 2 1/2; Union Carbide up 2 1/2 and Eastman Kodak up 1 1/4.

Oils continued in heavy demand. Amerasia shot up 5 1/2. Kerr-McGee 2 1/4. Cities Service 3 1/4 and Standard Oil (Ind.) 2 1/4. Standard Oil (N.J.) and Texaco posted fractional advances.

Child mauled by bear loses her right hand

CANOGA PARK, Calif. (UPI) — Lyn Seely, the 5-year-old girl who was mauled by a circus bear when she petted it, was "resting quietly" today in Canoga Park Hospital following amputation of her right hand, attendants said.

Doctors amputated the girl's hand Friday after a seven-day fight to save it. A blood clot developed, frustrating attempts to save the hand.

Lyn of Simi, Calif., was injured last week when she reached inside the cage of a 5-year-old Himalayan bear to pet it at the Ted Duane Circus in nearby Santa Susana. The bear first licked her arm, then clamped its teeth into it.

The girl's mother and a bystander freed her from the bear's clutches.

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2 boys burned in car blaze

PORTLAND (UPI)—Two small boys were critically burned in a fire in a car in northeast Portland Friday afternoon.

Greg Bethune, 5, and his brother, James, 3, were taken to Providence Hospital here with second and third degree burns. They are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Gary Bethune of Portland.

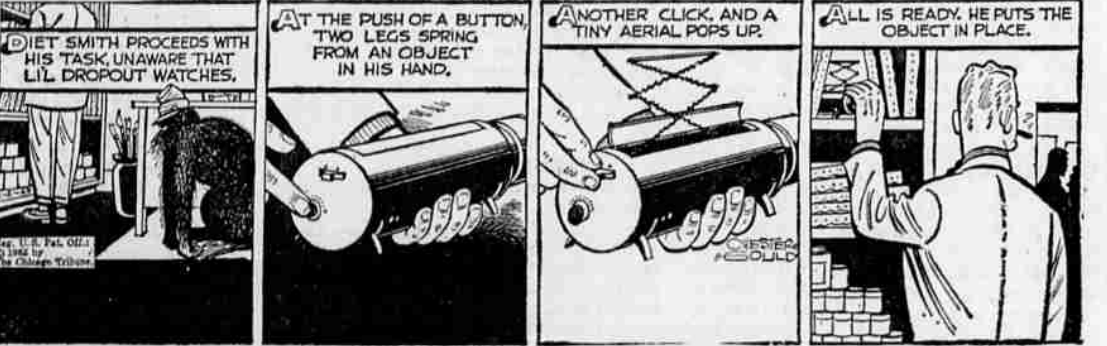
The parents parked their car in a parking lot and went inside the Tate Motor Vehicle Department building.
