The occasion was "the world's first marriage on water skis," which Sunday attracted more than 5,000 persons to the banks of Lake Como in the middle of the Coney Island amusement park.

Poet Roethke taken by death

SEATTLE, Wash. (UPI) — Prof. Theodore Roethke, 55, a Pulitzer Prize winning poet, died of a heart attack last week after collapsing in a neighbor's private swimming pool on Bainbridge Island. Roethke was stricken on the island across Puget Sound from here where he and his widow, Beatrice, were living during the summer while he was writing a book. He collapsed while standing in shallow water and was immediately pulled from the pool but died about 25 minutes later. Roethke, an English professor at the University of Washington, won the Pulitzer Prize for a book of poetry called "The Waking" which was published in 1953. His simple poetry was widely published and he was the winner of several other poetry awards in addition to the Pulitzer Prize. A popular teacher, his classes at the university were always jammed.

McNamara quizzes military leaders on war readiness

STUTTGART, Germany (UPI) — Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara quizzed the top U.S. brass in Europe Saturday about the readiness of their men to withstand a non-nuclear attack. The star-studded turnout for a top-secret meeting at 7th Army headquarters here included Gen. Lyman Lemnitzer, supreme Allied commander in Europe; Gens. Paul Freeman Jr. and Gabriel Disosway, commanders respectively of the U.S. Army and Air Force in Europe, and Adm. Charles D. Griffin, commander of the 6th (Mediterranean) Fleet. Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and Assistant Defense Secretary Paul Nitze accompanied McNamara here from Washington. Military sources said McNamara is satisfied that U.S. forces in Europe have plenty of nuclear weapons but he is concerned about their ability to fight a sustained battle against "conventional" forces. Allied forces in Germany have been regrouping this summer to strengthen their defenses against an attack by troops, tanks and planes in the World War II pattern. West Germany's growing army has moved up to the Iron Curtain border, enabling U.S. and British commanders to concentrate their forces on narrower fronts. The French are moving an infantry division from behind the Rhine to a point opposite the Czech border. Informed sources said today McNamara had failed in efforts to persuade West Germany to continue to offset the expense of maintaining U.S. forces in this country. The local expenses incurred by Army and air units stationed in West Germany run to about \$650 million a year—a sizeable item in the drain on U.S. gold that President Kennedy is trying to stop. So far, this cost has been offset by West German purchases of military equipment and services worth about the same amount from the United States this year.

Arlene deflated from hurricane into big squall

MIAMI (UPI) — Tropical storm Arlene, deflated from a hurricane into a big squall, joined hands with a moderate easterly wave early today to dump rain on Cuba and extreme southern Florida. Highest winds in the "completely disorganized" storm were 40 miles an hour, and the weather bureau at San Juan, P.R., said that regeneration of Arlene, the season's first storm, is not probable. Small craft warnings were up in south Florida for the wind gusts. Arlene, which at one point headed for Puerto Rico with hurricane winds of up to 100 miles an hour, was first spotted by America's Tires weather satellite as a cloud mass over the Atlantic last Wednesday. The storm was strung out for nearly 200 miles in a north-northeast to south-southwest direction as it pursued the easterly wave which passed between Florida and Cuba early today.

Escapees back behind bars

GRANTS, N.M. (UPI) — Two La Grande, Ore., prisoners who broke from the Grants, N.M. jail Saturday night were back behind bars today. Gerald Guffey, 25, and Harold Cushman, 20, were apprehended by state police late Sunday as they walked north along a highway about 3 miles from Grants. The two tore part of a plaster ceiling from their cell between 11 p.m. Saturday and 6 a.m. Sunday. They wandered through the rugged country around Grants most of Sunday and offered no resistance when picked up. A citizen had seen the two men and called police.

British, U.S. to explore new peace moves

LONDON (UPI) — U.S. and British officials will use today's signing of a partial nuclear-test ban in Moscow as a springboard to explore what cold war issues can be tackled next and how this can best be done, diplomatic observers said today. British diplomats hope the test ban treaty, banning nuclear explosions in the atmosphere, on the ground and under water, may open up prospects for other East-West agreements in "step-by-step moves" later this year. The British hopes stem from the expectation that Premier Nikita Khrushchev, having virtually broken with Red China, now has a freer hand to negotiate with the West. Britain believes the Soviet leader may have reached the crucial stage where he feels he must prove to his own people and to Communists elsewhere that his policy of "peaceful co-existence" is paying off. British and U.S. negotiators hope to sound out Khrushchev's intentions, to determine just how sincere the Soviet leader is in his professed peace drive and how far he intends to go, diplomatic sources said. The Allies have agreed in advance not to commit themselves to any specific accord but merely to set up negotiating machinery, once they have explored Moscow's designs. The immediate issues to be discussed are, according to present indications: East-West non-aggression arrangements in Europe, means of preventing the spread of nuclear weapons, measures against surprise attack and against war by miscalculation. Russia also is pushing the question of thinning out Soviet and Allied forces in Central Europe and the freeing of military budgets.
